



There was a moment during our trip in January to early Christian community sites in Greece and Turkey when I got completely overwhelmed by what I was experiencing. I had wandered away from the group, down an alley in the ruins of Ephesus. I ducked under an archway and found myself alone for a few moments. The layers of history surrounding me swept over me. The universe felt vast and close all at once. I don't know exactly what happened in that moment, but as I reflected on it later in my journal, I kept returning to the phrase "ruins, foundations, and remnants."

I have continued turning this phrase over in my mind (and in writing) since we returned from seeing so many sites – ancient Corinth, modern Athens, the hill where a temple to Aphrodite once loomed – the earth itself ancient and modern all at once.

Most of the places we saw were ruins – looking carefully I could imagine what events may have taken place among the grown over rocks and ledges. Family life and commerce, religious gatherings, political debates, betrayal, reconciliation. We often saw only the foundations of the former buildings – the outline of a shop or a room or marketplace. The base that remained showed us what had existed centuries ago. The remnants of the communities that had existed in these places continued as seeds for new life – new communities that formed, new ways of living, new faith practices and families. In fact, part of the emotion I was feeling was that I realized as we walked among these stones forming ruins, foundations, and remnants that I was having an entirely new experience of God's presence in this very old place.

Or – to use words from the letter to the community living in Ephesus in the first century CE -

So then you are no longer strangers and foreigners, but you are fellow citizens with the saints, and are of God's household, having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus being the cornerstone, in whom the whole building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord, in whom you also are being built together into a dwelling of God in the Spirit. Ephesians 2:19-22

This Easter season, I pray we look among the ruins, foundations, and remnants for signs of new life. May we discover the ways in which we are being built together into a dwelling of God in the Spirit, Christ Jesus being the cornerstone.

Get Involved with Poz Cafe

OSLC will co-sponsor TIHAN's POZ CAFÉ monthly luncheon on **Thursday, April 18, 2024 -** a monthly luncheon to provide folks living with HIV/AIDS. Hot meal, fellowship, and a Care Package.

OSLC will be collecting the following: 480 rolls of toilet paper, 360 disposable razors, and 40 small bottles of laundry detergent. (Sounds like a lot but TP and razors come in multi-packs.) I also need to recruit several OSLC volunteers to help out before, during and after the Poz Cafe.

Here's how you can get involved (note: these roles are very active, requiring standing/walking/bending/lifting):

- Wednesday, April 17th from 9-11 am transport Care Package items from Our Saviour's to St Mark's Presbyterian (Speedway/ Alvernon) and help pack the care packages (1-2 people).
- Help on Thursday, April 19th from 9:30 am to 1:30 pm. Duties will include set-up, check-in, socializing with CarePartners, serving the buffet meal, bussing tables, distributing Care Packages and event clean-up (3-4 people).

Another option for **anyone at any time** is to decorate paper bags to use for care packages. Done on your own - we'll provide bags, glue, decorative photos and other needed supplies.

Faith Formation at OSLC - Pastor Glenn Schrader

What does it mean to be "church" today? "In many societies of the modern Western world, Christians believe dramatic change is soon to come – and is in fact underway – for the church as we have known it....Many fear these changes a great deal, thinking they represent the death of authentic church life and turn to something much worse." So begins the challenging book *Rooted and Renewing: Imagining the Church's Future in Light of Its New Testament Origins* (Fortress Press, 2019) by Professor Troy Truftgruben of Wartburg Theological Seminary (ELCA). The premise of his book is

that whatever the church hopes to be in the future, it must start with understanding its roots while being receptive to the inevitable changes the church has always experienced – and successfully overcome – throughout the ages.

Beginning on April 14, the Sunday Forum will explore the origins of the early Christian communities as recorded in the New Testament, coupled with the promise that the church would continue to be sustained and formed by the work of the Holy Spirit. We will utilize Professor Troftgruben's book outline as a guide for our discussions:

April 14: "Introduction" and "Sacred Spaces for a Church on the Way"

<u>April 21</u>: "Being True Siblings in a Divided World"

<u>April 28</u>: "Being a Body in a Stratified Society"

<u>May 5</u>: "Practicing the Things that Matter"

May 12: "Bearing Distinctive Witness" and "Conclusion"

Although purchase of the book (available through Amazon or Fortress Press) is not necessary, I think you would find it informative, thought-provoking, and reassuring – all at the same time. The chapters are neither very long nor a "difficult read". A limited number of copies will be available upon request for checkout from the OSLC library. We also hope to have Professor Troftgruben meet with us via Zoom for one of these sessions.

Then, as we approach summertime in Tucson, how could our faith continue to be nurtured and "re-formed"? I've already received some suggestions for Sunday Forums, workshops, and different types of gatherings that might be possible. What would you like to suggest? How would you like to participate? Let's explore the possibilities!
