WHY KEEP RECORDS?

This record is a part of your Market Livestock Project and must be entered for judging at the Northern District Fair. Failure to do so will result in losing 10% of your money you earned in the livestock auction.

Good records will:

- Help you learn about animals, their rate of growth, the feed they require, the cost of the feed and their habits.
- > Help you plan future projects.
- Let you know if you made or lost money and how much.
- Improve your management practices.
- Give you a record of your project activities.

Keep this record as part of your Personal Records. This information is helpful for you to plan future year's market projects, as well as if you ever apply for awards or a scholarship.

Remember – Records are no better than what YOU put into them!


