

We have been hard at work learning about Lines. Lines are not only an important element in art, they are also the basis for writing. We learned about lines that show direction: Horizontal – side to side, Vertical – up and down and Diagonal – at an angle (like a slide). We also learned about lines that show movement: Curly, wavy, spiral, curve, dot, dash.

Students learn best by using a variety of materials. They painted, assembled, printed, and drew lines to create unique works of art. Below are some project highlights.

Line Quilts — Using all of the lines that we talked about, the Pre-K classes created art quilts. They created a grid using horizontal and vertical lines. Each section was then filled with the many different types of lines.



Curvy Line String Art – The Threes classes experimented with creating curvy and curly lines using string. They dropped pieces of string on the adhesive side of contact paper. The paper was flipped over so that it stuck to a piece of white construction paper.



Relief Sculpture – Kindergarteners created relief sculptures. They glued craft sticks on to canvas using horizontal, vertical and diagonal lines. By layering and overlapping the sticks they created depth. They finished the project by painting it and adding movement lines in glitter.
