Test your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. If the batteries are dead, replace them immediately, and replace any smoke alarm over 10 years

Create an emergency preparedness kit in case of prolonged power outages, floods or other emergencies. Make sure you and your family can be self-sufficient for up to 72 hours.

Practise your home escape plan so everyone in your household knows what to do

Check every window to ensure it opens and closes

Check outdoor electrical outlets and appliances for animal nests or chewed wiring.

Check fuel containers for leaks and make sure they are properly stored.

Never use a portable propane heater inside a tent, cottage, or any enclosed space.

Carbon monoxide is colourless, odourless, tasteless and will cause serious injury or even death.

Fire pits, campfires, and wood-fuelled chimineas are not allowed in Clarington. All it takes is one spark for things to go wrong. Be a responsible neighbour and choose a natural-gas or propane-fuelled option instead.

## DURHAM REGION WINS GOOD ROADS' MUNICIPAL CONCRETE AWARD

## Whitby, Ontario - At the Roads recent Good Conference, representatives Regional from The Municipality of Durham and Soncin Construction were presented with Good Roads' 2023 Municipal Concrete Award for the Cochrane Street Bridge Replacement Project, located over the Canadian

The modern design has active transportation features for both cyclists and pedestrians to cross the rail corridor. Sidewalk and on-street bike lanes safely transition into a three-metre-wide shared multi-use path on the

Pacific Kansas City (CPKC)

bridge. The project involved complex work within a busy rail corridor. Construction was performed safely and finished on schedule at the end of

The Cochrane Street Bridge Replacement Project was identified as a priority due to the original bridge's end of service life and the vital need to deliver transportation projects that ensure effective asset management, and improve active transportation as identified in Durham Region's Regional Cycling Plan.

Municipal Concrete The Award, sponsored Concrete Ontario, annually

FOR THE COCHRANE STREET BRIDGE PROJECT recognizes successful municipal-private sector collaborations in concrete road and bridge construction in Ontario. Criteria for the award considered conformance to specifications based on testing, aesthetics, workmanship, innovation and the method on how the work was completed including public engagement. Good Roads is a municipal association that focuses on the quality and design of roads in Ontario. They have been devoted to the cause of better roads since 1894. Originally known as the Roads Ontario Good Association (and still using that name corporately), their

members include most of Ontario's municipalities and a growing number of First Nations as well as dozens of affiliated corporate members in the transportation and infrastructure sectors. For more information, goodroads.ca.

The Cochrane Street Bridge Replacement Project was an innovative opportunity for a modern bridge design that will provide decades of service to the local community and a safe crossing for mixed-use traffic over the railway.

Selection of bridge design elements was based on constructability within an active railway corridor with unique ground conditions.

Design incorporates CPKC Rail design criteria and includes railway horizontal and vertical clearances that exceed CPKC Rail's minimum safety requirements.

The bridge design meets the standards for Transportation Association of Canada (TAC), Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA), Canadian Highway Bridge Design Code and Ministry of Transportation Ontario (MTO) Structural Manual.

Design commenced in 2019 and was completed in late 2022, with all permits for construction obtained, ready for public tender and construction in Spring 2023.
