

# HOLY FIRE. . . God's Sacred Flame

First an overview...

Just for starters, let's run a listing of some of the many, many Bible stories that have flame as a meaningful element. This can serve as a starting point that will be more extensive than we could ever do in only six broadcasts on the air...

## Fire As A Positive Element...

We easily focus on the destructive nature of fire. That's certainly not to be ignored, but it denies the other side of what fire can (and will) accomplish in a positive manner for God's people. Perhaps we could take a moment to reconsider a few more passages in a new light and see if they might not be something that we praise Him for instead of fearing....

Judges 13:	We find a remarkable fire-enactment as God announces a special initiative to a poor couple who live under the heel of the oppressor. Oh that we might see such a portrayal in our day!
Isaiah 10:	Messiah is equated to the astounding fire of God in every good way!
I Kings 18:	Perhaps His fire will soon, once again, reveal fully who is God for all to see. Oh pray for it!
Malachi 4:	When it all said and done, evil will be simply ash. That's all.
Ezekiel 28:	Evil is so self-destructive that it is destined for flame, even from the inside out.
Acts 28:	I really like the prophetic nature of this narrative. The child of God casts the serpent into the flame and the ancient prediction of Genesis 3 is fulfilled. How cool!

## In Conclusion...

James said every good and perfect gift comes from the Father of lights? (1:17) Is it completely illogical to read that passage backward and consider that if it comes from the Father of lights it MUST be good?

If that's fair, then we shouldn't be terribly surprised that the fire from God is not an evil thing. It must be a true gift if, "The Lord is righteous in all His ways, and holy in all His works." Psalm 145:17

#### Insights From Judaism...

Once upon a time I wanted to translate the commentary of Leviticus Rabbah, the chapter 10 episode of the Holy Fire judgment against Nadab and Abihu. Instead I ended up moving to another topic from Bereshit Rabbah on the death of Jacob from Genesis 49. Still, I'm intrigued by this and promised on our broadcasts that I'd give you a bit of a sampling from Judaism on the concepts of "Holy Fire" and "the Sacred Flame." Let's finish this study guide by sharing these...

- "Do you know the story of the ironmnonger (blacksmith) who wanted to become independent? He bought an anvil, a hammer and bellows and went to work. Nothing happened- the forge remained inert. Then an old ironmonger, whose advice he sought, told him: 'You have everything you need except the spark.' That is what Hasidim is: the spark." Elie Wiesel \$
- "While praying one day, Reuven experienced an intuitive flash: that the child Zahava was carrying would be a boy, and that his name was Esh Kodesh, meaning 'Holy Fire; or 'Fire of the Holy One.' According to the Sages, parents experience a kind of prophecy when they name their children. Questioned after his son's death [killed by a terrorist] Reuven insists that he did not choose the unusual name based on any connotations of sacrifice nor even as a reference to the Chassidic Rabbi of the same name who perished in the Holocaust. 'Esh Kodesh was simply his name. That's who he was.' Zahava adds, 'I always felt that his name referred to the special spark of holiness that every Jew has inside." Ŷ
