Why This Book Over Any Others?

I have, for myself, resolved why I choose to accept the Bible as the definitive authority of truth. Have you? As shared in our broadcast, it is neither sufficient nor intellectually honest to just say, "Because the Bible says so..." That just doesn't hold water. Please indulge me as I share the three reasons for the Bible being the fullest revelation of truth we've ever been given and the anchor of my faith.

I choose this book over any other because —

1) The scope of the Biblical authorship could not have been directed by the simple intention of man.

The text of the Bible is the work of dozens of different writers, written over a time period spanning roughly 1,600 years before Jesus until about 60 years after the crucifixion. These writers come from all levels of the strata of society and literary ability. Yet, even with this diversity, there is a common thread and theme and unity that is beyond comprehension.

2) No other book has proven itself to be so very accurate in issues of the scope of history — past, present, and future.

Archeology and the development of world events show that the Bible is a source of understanding that goes far beyond speculation. There is, within this book, the evidence of a Power that is not limited by time. Too much prophecy fulfilled and historic record confirmed shows that this cannot simply be the conjecture of man.

3) This book fulfills its most incredible claim.

No other work in history has had the impact of changing lives for the better. The Bible claims that anyone who spends time with it will find a richer, more satisfying, and fulfilling life. Millions of transformed lives give testimony to this truth. Addicts have been delivered, families restored, hardened criminals have been turned into productive members of society...

No other work has benefitted society as this.
