hree of the minor prophets (**Jonah**, **Nahum**, and **Zephaniah**) clearly condemn the dominance and cruelty of Assyria. Let's learn a little more about this most brutal nation of antiquity and see why the Lord was so serious in His condemnations of this nation.

- Assyria is known as early as Genesis 10.
- This nation was first settled by Babylonian immigrants that came from the north.
- Assyria was centered on two rivers (Tigris and Khoser) and a man-made canal.
- Assyrians most commonly honored their major deity, Assher, but they had a large pantheon beyond that which was generally mutually shared with Babylon.
- The major city (and capitol) was Nineveh.
- Other Assyrian towns of note were Calah and Ashur.
- The geography of Assyria allowed for wheat and barley in the plains and grapes, olives, cherries, apricots, and other fruit in the hill region.
- Assyrian kings enjoyed drinking from goblets shaped like animals' heads.
- A number of Assyrian kings enter into various Bible stories... Shalmaneser III, Tiglath-pileser III (Pul),
 Shalmaneser V, Sargon II, Sennacherib, and to a lesser degree Shamsi-Adad V and Adadnirari III.
- Several Assyrian kings worked at building up a major repository (library) of multiplied thousands of clay tablets.
- They were noted for iron weaponry, brutal sieges, and cruelty to the conquered as they sought to break
 the spirit of their enemies by horrific atrocities.
 - ► Impaling enemy soldiers in view of their families was a favorite tactic.
 - ► Another Assyrian favorite was to skin the captured alive.
 - lacksquare The Lord intended to turn one of their own tactics back on them...

the old ring in the lips or the nose trick. (See II Kings 19)

Assyria/Nineveh came to the exact end that Nahum prophesied in August of 612 b.c.

Elijah in the New Testament

The sense of Elijah was prominent in the Gospel era mentality. You would do well to spend some time chewing on some of those passages. Here are some I'd suggest...

Matthew 17, Mark 9, and Luke 9 • He is present at the Transfiguration event.

Matthew 11 • John the Baptist is compared to this dominant Old Testament figure.

Matthew 16 • Some believed that Jesus might be Elijah.

Matthew 27 • A misunderstanding at the cross assumes Jesus is crying for Elijah.

John 1 • Some challenge John as to his identity, thinking he really might be Elijah.

Romans 11 • Paul harkens back to the powerful intercession of Elijah for the people.

James 5 • James encourages us by the power of one as frail as Elijah, yet effective.

Conclusion

It appears that one simple prophecy (**Malachi 4**) really made an impact on the mentality of those who yearned for Messiah. This is still true to many observant Jews to this day. There is an aching for Elijah for if he were to appear could Messiah the Prince be far behind?
