

CARDINAL DOLAN EXPRESSES VIEWS ON DENYING COMMUNION TO PARISHIONERS

Cardinal Timothy Dolan of the Archdiocese of New York has responded to questions about the denial of Holy Communion to former Vice President Joe Biden.

In an interview with Fox News, Dolan said that he thought the incident was a good teaching moment about the Eucharist and the seriousness of denying Church teaching, but that he would not himself deny anyone reception of the Eucharist.

"Whether that judgment was wise, I don't want to judge him," Dolan said of Fr. Robert Morey, who denied Holy Communion to Biden. "I wouldn't do it"

Receiving the Eucharist "...implies that you're in union with all the Church believes and stands for. If you know you're not, well, integrity would say, 'uh oh, I better not approach Holy Communion.' That's always preferable than to make a split-second decision and denying somebody," Dolan added.

Morey stated, "Holy Communion signifies we are one with God, each other and the Church. Our actions should reflect that. Any public figure who advocates for abortion places himself or herself outside of Church teaching."

In denying Biden communion, Morey was following a diocesan policy set forth in a 2004 decree signed jointly by the bishops of Atlanta, Charleston, and Charlotte. The decree states that supporting pro-abortion legislation is "gravely sinful" and that public figures who do so must be denied communion until they repent.

"I think what he said was very to the point, I thought that was a good teaching moment," Dolan said.

The cardinal said the issue has never come up for him personally. He has never seen a public figure in his Communion line who he knew was publicly advocating for policies that violate Church teaching. "I've never had what you might call the opportunity, or I've never said 'Uh oh, should I give him or her Holy Communion', it's never come up. Sure could," Dolan said.

Dolan said that he frequently sees public figures at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York, and that he "admires" them when they do not approach the Eucharist out of their own awareness of their sin and separation from the Church.

"They seem to know – 'I shouldn't do that. That could be hypocritical at this moment," Dolan said.

"I personally can never judge the state of a person's soul. It's difficult, that's what I'm saying. I'm not up there as a tribunal, as a judge, distributing Holy Communion, I'm there as a pastor, as a doctor of souls," Dolan said.






Later in the day my conscience began bothering me, so I got the receipt

Why We Celebrate Christmas December 25

On December 25th, nine in 10 Americans will celebrate Christmas, but few understand why. Everyone knows the trappings associated with the holiday—Christmas trees, red and green ornaments, presents, etc.-but its origins are less familiar.


Although Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus on December 25th, his exact birthdate is unknown. In the first 300 or so years of Christianity, the celebration of the leader's birth was usu-



ally lumped in with Epiphany (January 6), if it was even observed at all. According to Christianity Today, it was around the year 273 that the church considered commandeering the exist-

ing pagan festival of winter solstice as fitting time to honor the son of God. It helped that December 25th already hosted two debaucherous holidays: natalis solis invicti (the Roman "birth of the unconquered sun"), and the birthday of Mithras, the Iranian "Sun of Righteousness." It was considered a way to teach the masses a lesson or two about sin and redemption.

Christmas wasn't widely observed until after Emperor Constantine converted to Christianity and declared it the Roman empire's favored religion. Western Christians officially began celebrating December 25 as the birth of Jesus in 336 AD.



In 1969 a book by the name of Naked Came the Stranger was published. Its editor was man by the name of Mike McGrady who talked a group of 19 men and 5 women, journalistic friends of his, to take part in ridiculing the novels of the day, because in his opinion, they were nothing but trash. Two popular authors then were Harold Robbins and Jacqueline Susann who were noted for their sexually-motivated plots. Although I have read nothing from either author, I have a feeling that compared to Fifty-Shades of Grey (which I have not read),

published a few years ago, Naked Came the Stranger would seem tame.

Each of the book's chapters was written by a separate author who knew only enough of what preceded him or her in order to be able to write something more than a mishmash novel. They succeeded. Its author was a fictitious Penelope

In only a few months, the book had sold more than 20,000 copies, far more than McGrady expected. Elated, he decided to let the world in on the joke. Rather than feeling duped, the public continued buying the book. As an English teacher at the time, I bought one myself after I learned it was a joke and still have it. It's been over 40 years since I read it and I have no recollection of whether I was shocked or not. Probably not, since I knew it was a spoof.

Where am I going with this article? Read on.

The bible was written by approximately 40 writers. I say approximately because it's difficult to determine who wrote a few of the books. Scholars have concluded that the 66 books were written over a period of roughly 1,500 years. Catholic scholars feel that there are 7 more books that should be and are included in the Catholic Bible: Tobit, Judith, I Maccabees, Il Maccabees, Solomon, Sirach, and Baruch.

Scholars feel that the first book of the New Testament, Matthew, was written about 400 years after the last book of the Old Testament, Malachi.

I think it's appropriate to now ask these questions: Why would these men conspire to fool their readers when they didn't know each other and most of them didn't even live during the same time frame? How foolish would they be to waste their time writing something they couldn't be sure would be read or preserved? How could they possibly profit by being a part of a stunt? The answer, of course, is that they knew what they were doing. The bible even helps us deal with that problem: Timothy 3:16-17 All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work.

Here is a quote from Bible.org.

The bible is one complete book consisting of Old and New Testaments. In other words, there is direct continuity of Divine revelation and authority running right through all books of the bible. No one part contradicts another part, and if one part were to be missing there would be an obvious gap in the whole book. There is not the slightest hint in the bible that the earlier revelations were to be contradicted or cancelled by the New Testament. Serious study makes it clear that the later parts of the bible are not contradictory but complementary. They are given as a further development of the earlier revelation in order to give a wider understanding of an important subject. For instance, when a child commences school, he learns the basic use of the alphabet and numerals. For the rest of his school life he learns additional facts about the use of letters and numbers until he is acquainted with extensive literature and able to handle advanced mathematics. The things he learns later do not ever contradict his beginning lessons; they simply add to his original inadequate understanding. This was the method chosen by an all-wise God in revealing Himself to mankind.

Now note the theme of the following quotations. Isaiah says, The decree of our God is forever reliable. Matthew says, I tell you the truth, until heaven and earth pass away not the smallest letter or stroke of a letter will pass from the law until everything takes place. Peter says, But the word of the Lord endures forever. These three verses plainly state that God's Word will never pass away. Note that one quotation is from an Old Testament prophet, one is from the teaching of Jesus Christ and one is from the teaching of the Apostle Peter. This shows that the bible is the record of a continuous, coherent, developing revelation which will never pass away.

What a blessing it is to be able to have faith in the bible. In so many respects it has to be the word of God. The mindset with the authors of Naked Came the Stranger is completely foreign to God's. Why would God deceive us when He determined to let His son die on a cross for us?

"The Age of Miracles Has Not Passed" The Remarkable Story of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini's Cure of Fr. Peter Smith.

On March 14, 1921, Peter Smith was born in a newly built annex to Columbus Hospital on 34th Street in Manhattan. The hospital was a charity institution originally founded by Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini in 1892 to render free service to the poor immigrant population of New York. When little Peter was born, it was still staffed by the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, who were established by Mother Cabrini back in Italy in 1880. The newborn was handed to his delighted mother Margaret, who commented on how beautiful her son's blue eyes were. She reluctantly relinquished hold of her little bundle of joy to one of the lay-nurses so he could be cleaned. It was a common method at that time to put a one percent solution of silver nitrate into a newborn's eyes to protect them from any bacterial infections that could have occurred during birth. But the nurse was in a hurry and made a terrible mistake; she realized, to her dismay, that instead of the one percent of silver nitrate, she used a 50 percent solution. She ran down the hall, child in her arms, screaming: "Sister! Sister! Come and do something. I've done a dreadful thing. Get a doctor!"

Peter was evaluated by two doctors and an eye specialist. The specialist said flatly: "The corneas are gone. No-body can do anything."

The Superior of the hospital disagreed. She certainly knew of someone who could do something. She touched a relic of Mother Cabrini, who had only died less than four years prior—on December 22, 1917—to little Peter's eyes. She then pinned the relic to his nightgown and with her sisters spent the entire night praying in the hospital's chapel. When they arrived to begin their prayers, they found the despondent nurse already in the chapel, kneel-

ing before the Blessed Sacrament. She was pleading aloud: "Please Lord, please Lord! Don't let that baby get blind! Mother

Cabrini, won't you work a miracle?!" After the nurse and sisters spent all

night in the chapel, their prayers were answered with the requested miracle. When the doctors came to inspect the eyes of the baby again, they could not believe what they found: the corneas were intact and the eyes were perfectly normal. Peter's eyesight had been restored!

The joy of the moment was short-lived, however, when that same day little Peter got double pneumonia. His mother Margaret was exhausted from the emotional stresses. Taking her son into her arms, she looked into his miraculously cured eyes, but then felt a feverish heat on emanating from the sick baby. Peter's temperature reached 108 degrees. It was one thing to fear that he would be blind throughout his entire life, yet now his poor mother feared he wouldn't live to see another day.

One of the the doctors told the sisters that they had more praying to do. The Superior replied: "Doctor, Mother Cabrini has not cured his eyes just to let him die of pneumonia." The sisters prayed yet again for a miracle and by the next morning another one came. Through the intercession of Mother Cabrini, all traces of the pneumonia in the boy had disappeared.

Peter left the hospital ten days later with the the traces of the miracle upon his face in the form of two scars from where the silver nitrate ran down from his eyes. These scars would eventually dissipate as he grew older.

Fourteen years later the Smith family had another boy. They named him John Frances Xavier Smith after Mother Cabrini, in thanksgiving for the two miracles she worked for his older

He remembers being three years old and crying with disappointment when he was told by his mother he was not old enough to endure the long journey to Rome by boat. Margret and her 17-year-old son Peter would be leaving the family on a trip to Mother Cabrini's beatification, which took place on November 13, 1938. The miracle of Peter's restored sight was accepted by the Vatican as corroborative of Mother's sanctity, which brought about her being raised to the rank of Blessed. On the same boat Peter and his mother took to Rome was the nurse who accidentally put the 50% solution of silver nitrate into little Peter's eyes.

When Mother Cabrini was canonized on July 7, 1946, by Pope Pius XII, Peter was unable to attend any festivities celebrating the moment. He was still finishing up his military service after nobly serving our country in the fierce fighting that took place on the island of Okinawa in the Pacific theater of World War II. His younger brother was eleven at the time, and he and their mother attended a Mass celebrating the event in the chapel of Mother Cabrini High School in upper Manhattan, where the saint was then interred. Mother and son would come to the shrine regularly on Sunday afternoons to pray together. Each time they arrived the sisters would treat them as honored guests. Both boys grew up to become priests.

Fr. Peter generously answered the call to serve the Diocese of Corpus



Christi in Texas, which was in great need of priests. He was ordained at Mother's Shrine in New York in 1951, and served the parishes of his diocese until his death in 2002. Monsignor F.X.

was ordained in St. Patrick's Cathedral in 1961 and served the parishes of his family's home Archdiocese of New York. At the age of 84 he is still active in offering Sunday Mass at two different parishes.

Prayer

You take on the story of the Israelites and are guided by daily meditations that open up the Sacred Scriptures in new and enlightening ways. But this isn't just a bible study, Exodus 90 is much more.

Brotherhood

Exodus 90 is not a self-help program. You'll invite 5-7 men to journey with you, and where possible, your priest will serve as your spiritual director. These meetings are an opportunity for men to give a self-report for accountability, to receive encouragement from the brotherhood, and wisdom from the spiritual director.

There's no better way to re-awaken your diocese, parish, or men's group in these dark times that call for prayer, penance, and renewed trust.

Asceticism

We cannot say "yes" to God until we have said "no" to the world and its comforts. During Exodus 90, you will return to the Church's ancient (and largely lost) tradition of asceticism. Essentially, asceticism is the spiritual discipline whereby a man practices self-denial, self- restraint and selfmortification, and, for those who desire greater growth, a more rigorous self-denial, more extreme abstinence, and increased austerity – all for the purpose of growing in personal freedom.



What Does the Catechism Say about the Word *Amen*?

1061 The Creed, like the last book of the Bible, ends with the Hebrew word amen. This word frequently concludes prayers in the New Testament. The Church likewise ends her prayers with "Amen."

1062 In Hebrew, amen comes from the same root as the word "believe." This root expresses solidity, trustworthiness, faithfulness. And so we can understand why "Amen" may express both God's faithfulness towards us and our trust in him. 1063 In the book of the prophet Isaiah, we find the expression "God of truth" (literally "God of the Amen"), that is, the God who is faithful to his promises: "He who blesses himself in the land shall bless himself by the God of truth [amen]." Our Lord often used the word "Amen," sometimes repeated, to emphasize the trustworthiness of his teaching, his authority founded on God's truth.

1064 Thus the Creed's final "Amen" repeats and confirms its first words: "I be-

1064 Thus the Creed's final "Amen" repeats and confirms its first words: "I believe." To believe is to say "Amen" to God's words, promises and commandments; to entrust oneself completely to him who is the "Amen" of infinite love and perfect faithfulness. The Christian's everyday life will then be the "Amen" to the "I believe" of our baptismal profession of faith.

1065 Jesus Christ himself is the "Amen." He is the definitive "Amen" of the Father's love for us. He takes up and completes our "Amen" to the Father: "For all the promises of God find their Yes in him. That is why we utter the Amen through him, to the glory of God".
