I've had the old Revell X-3 kit since the 1960s (did not get around to building it until the 1980s). It's still in my display cabinet but it is an odd scale at 1/65. When I saw a new release in 1/72 scale at the 2021 IPMS National Convention I grabbed one. AZmodel is a fairly new (to me at least) kit manufacturer from the Czech Republic.

It's a small model so assembly is rather straightforward. Although the X-3 was purely a research aircraft, a pair of wingtip Sidewinder missiles and mounting rails are included as optional parts. Panel lines are recessed and subtle. The surface is smooth but construction had a few challenges. The cockpit and main wheel well seemed too wide, as the fuselage halves would not mate without shaving some of the sides of those assemblies. The wheel well box is made of three parts and the fit is a bit loose, as the edges are not exactly square and the alignment strips on the inside of the fuselage are not crisp.

There are accuracy issues. The cockpit instrument panel and side consoles use nicely molded detail for dials and switches. But after reviewing photos of the real aircraft, the kit's panels only vaguely resemble the real aircraft. Frankly that was not a big deal for me, since you won't be able to see much inside the cockpit thru the small windows, anyway.


AZmodel X-3 Stiletto 1/72 scale injection molded kit

The two jet engines are built using four parts for each one (exhaust tubes with interior molded detail, a fan disk, and an aft ring. This ring is provided with after-burned type petals, but the actual engine exhausts have a smooth surface at the outlet ring. The fuselage-to-engine exhaust junction shape is off as well but not a big deal. The instructions would have you put the nose landing gear door on the wrong side (it is hinged from the starboard/right side of the opening). The smaller main gear doors are not the correct shape.



The boundary air slots at the engine inlets are poorly defined (soft). The clear window part fits poorly and I had to add some clear glue and putty to clean that up. Note that it's not really a canopy as the windows are fixed. The ejection seat was electrically lowered through a hatch below the aircraft to enable the pilot to access the cockpit. The transparencies should be smoothly blended into the mold lines and the kit does not come close. I had to apply several thin layers of putty to clean this up.

Photos of the actual aircraft show many variations in finish and markings over the active life of the X-3. Some photos show the horizontal tail surfaces were bare metal (like the wings) in early testing while later images show them as painted white. The images with the NACA marking on the tail show more bare metal around the engine exhaust and the bottom of the rear fuselage. Markings seem to have changed once it got on display at the museum. There seems to be four or five distinct marking schemes and the kit does provide nice drawings for three of them. Some of the small stenciling seen on some photos are not provided.

I eventually cleaned up the engine nozzles to my satisfaction and blended in the canopy. This took many rounds of putty and primer. I used Tamiya spray can white primer followed by Tamiya X-2 gloss white from my airbrush. Kit decals were applied, and the fuselage was sealed with Vallejo gloss varnish. The wings and horizontal stabilizers were covered with Bare Metal Foil chrome foil. I applied a thin coat of Micro Foil adhesive to the wings since the edges had a tendency to come loose. Landing gear and doors were painted with Vallejo Aluminum. The gear wells were likely also bare metal but the instructions suggest a chromate green. My museum photos were unclear on the correct color (looks more like bare aluminum but I used green).

Once the decal sealer coat was allowed to dry overnight, the wings were attached, followed by the landing gear. While not a simple build, it will be a nice addition to my collection of experimental aircraft.


