### Pro-Modeler F4U-5N Corsair By "Mark Rossmann"

History: F4U-5 is post WWII aircraft differing from the F4U-4 by use of a redesigned engine mount, by pushing the mount on the frame further forward resulting in a longer cowling area. Along with moving larger air intakes to the right and left side of the cowlings, this became the most distinctive features of this aircraft. The F4U-5N differed from the -5 via a Radome installed in the right wing, gun flash suppressors for the four 20 mm cannon, autopilot to reduce pilot fatigue, exhaust suppressors and an extra radio antenna. A -5NL version was equipped with de-icing rubber on the leading wing edges, water and methanol-injected de-icing system for the propeller leading edges and the front windshield, all specifically designed to cope with the harsh Korean winters. Total production of -5N Corsairs was 214, 101 -5NL Corsairs were produced.





### Pro-Modeler F4U-5N Corsair By "Mark Rossmann"

Construction: Kit was built OOB, and is a Hasegawa F4U-5/5NL kit #JT75, right down to the part numbers. The instructions are all in English and appear to be more simplified than the Hasegawa version and call out the how to build the -5, -5N and -5NL versions. Decals are for one F4U-5NL from VC-4 in Korea or a F4U-5 from NAS Glenview. (These were not used for this build). The Pro-Modeler kit is a lighter gray plastic, otherwise no difference in the build of the kit from Hasegawa's version. Please see other F4U-5 Hasegawa build articles for information.



Painting: This article and pictures were written/taken about 15 years ago for Aircraftresourcecenter.com web site. Using the Tamiya spray synthetic lacquer paint for the first time. The following information taken directly from the Tamiya site explains:

### Pro-Modeler F4U-5N Corsair By "Mark Rossmann"

#### **TAMIYA COLOR SPRAY PAINTS (TS)**

These cans of spray paint are extremely useful for painting large surfaces. The paint is a synthetic lacquer that cures in a short period of time. Each can contains 100ml of paint, which is enough to fully cover 2 or 3, 1/24 scale sized car bodies. Tamiya spray paints are not affected by acrylic or enamel paints. Therefore, following the painting of the entire assembly, details can be added or picked out using enamel and/or acrylic paints. By combining of three different paints, the decoration of plastic models will become simpler and more effective.

#### TAMIYA COLOR SPRAY FOR AIRCRAFT (AS)

The new Military Aircraft Sprays are available with six colors each for US, German, UK, and Japan color schemes. The new Aircraft Sprays are a welcome solution for that next military scale plastic project as well as the new closed cell foam R/C Park Flyers.

I wanted to use one color for starters, so building an all black F4U-5N seemed to be the right fit to use the semigloss black #TS-29. The output of spray is very fine, which will cause you to spray two coats or possibly three to get full coverage. I find this to be a good thing, where as the enamels come out very heavy, if you loiter for to long of a second you will get a glob of runny paint. With this paint it is nearly impossible for this to occur, it sticks and dry's very fast. I used enamel silver spray paint as an under coat in order to create the paint chipping affect by using tape to pull off the upper coat of paint. This turned out to be a little more difficult, the Tamiya paint adhered to the enamel almost too good, I needed to press the tape on 4 to 5 times before any black paint started to "chip off". The nozzle is well constructed and the can easy to hold, Paint can was easy to clean, one short 1 second burst (upside down) did the trick. I have yet had paint clog the nozzle. When dry this paint has a very smooth satin type finish.

Decals: From Hasegawa kit #JT75, VMF(N)-513, Capt. Eugene Derrickson, Korea 1951. Decals adhered fine to the Tamiya paint, using Solve Set to snug them down. I usually spray a gloss coat on before decaling, but it did not seem to need it. My hunch was correct, no problems with the decals.

Conclusion: The kit was excellent and had no build problems. If you want a F4U-5/NL this is a couple of bucks less than the Hasegawa version. The paint is the way to go, with Tamiya's new line of military colors for Japanese, U.S., German and British, some color limitations, there is *No Runs, No\_Drips, No Errors!*

## **EDITORS CORNER** BY LYN GORTON





Isn't it great to have survived another Arizona Summer. Now we get our payback as we sit outside most mornings and evenings through the winter.


Just as a reminder this issue of Dirty Plastic is from January 1972

As a memory Jogger here are some of the TV shows and Movies that you could be expected to see at the start of the year











The F-5's use the ASIA MINOR camouflage pattern in T.O. 1-1-4 as do the F-4's. The color side view of the F-4 in the September AIR ENTHUSIAST is very accurate in color and markings. Notice on the side view, just below the RESCUE placard on the nose, there is the Iranian Number 3-602 (on tail) in Farsi ( $\Upsilon - \Upsilon \bullet \Upsilon$ ); these markings switch positions on the right side. National insignia in 6 positions (remember you saw it first in DIRTY PLASTIC, Ed.) F-5's are identical with two exceptions, IIAF is on the nose, just below cockpit and National insignia on fuselage and upper left wing only, very close to fuselage.

The C-130's here use the ASIA MINOR pattern with some slight variations as the green is deleted. I'm making some sketches of these".

For those few modelers who might not be familiar with IPMS - this is the parent organization from which all of the chapters that follow were derived. The publications are an absolute must for the serious modeler of both aircraft and armor.

\* IPMS/Canada Random Thoughts Address - P. O. Box 626 Stn. B, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada Sub rate - \$2.50 per year (12 issues)

This is the tops in chapter publications. At its most modest price it represents the greatest bargain available to the modeler and is an absolute must. If you can't afford any other chapter publication take this one. Get all of the back issues that you can. Issues contain articles, drawings, kit reviews, book reviews, actual color chips, etc. Semi-hard cover and the artwork is beautiful. This publication has shown constant improvement over the years and just gets better and better.

\* Modelcraft (IPMS Australia) Editor - F. G. Harris Address - P. O. Box 71, Thomastown 3074, Australia Sub rate - Quoted as \$4.50 per year (4 issues) but better send \$5.00 if by check

While rather high in price and slow in coming due to mail from Australia being terribly slow, this one is worthwhile because it is very professionally done. It is as good as Random Thoughts although at a higher price (much). Contains much information, color schemes, actual color chips, photos (some in color), reviews, etc. This is the new title of the old IPMS/Australasia publication (which should also be obtained if any issues are still available). The new publication is only up to issue no. 3 and back issues should be available and should be obtained. They

have so far indicated a reluctance to handle airmail subscriptions so don't expect a very prompt reply unless you include an airmail postal reply coupon.


