

#### From Behind The Iron Curtain

I recently built the Ilyashin II-10 Sturmovik attack bomber, and I must say the the Czechcelovakians are coming along. The Avia B.534 was nice, as was the belfin, but the II-10 is better still. The decals, however, disintegrated upon contact, but the plastic work was excellent. The kit makes up into an impressive model, and comparing it with a photograph of the actual aircraft, it looks very accurate.

Incidentally, I have photos of two Soviet-built aircraft captured by our forces. One is a late model Yak-9, which was around Wright Field for a number of years after World War II. I have a photo coded T2-3002 (the tail code of the aircraft) taken probably during the late forties. I also have another photo of the fuselage sitting derelict behind another aircraft, a C-125, at Wright Field in the middle fifties.

Also, at least one IL-10 attack bomber was captured at Kimpo Field, Souel Korea during MacArthur's drive north during, I believe, 1950 or 1951. On was brought back to the States during the conflict. Does anybody have information on either of these? We'll publish photos of these when the paper gets that sophisticated.

#### Those Morane Parasols

Heller, after several years of advanced publicity, has finally come out with the Morane MS-225 and MS-230. These appear to be excellent kits, with the MS-225 fighter being, in my opinion, the better of the two kits. In fact, the MS-225 is one of the nicest kits I have seen from Heller. Both kits build up into detailed perasol monoplanes, with provision for rigging, if one goes in for acupuncture. I chickened out, so mine are unrigged. The detail is excellent, with finely-done engine and cockpit interiors.

Heller still has a little to learn, though, as some struts are done so that the ends are free and the tree or space attaches in the middle of the strut. This makes it necessary to trim and paint the struts twice, and from the engineering standpoint, it would seem to be relatively easy to attach the struts to the space at one of the ends. This is a minor problem, however, and both kits are really first class, and make up into excellent replicas in 1/72 scale.

Several months ago I reported the emergance of IPMS-Mallari, the IPMS Newsletter of Finland. Their fourth issue has arrived and if your the least bit interested in aircraft of small nations this is a must, particularly in the light of its minimal subscription fee, 6 issues for \$1.00, \$1.70 Air Nail.

These prices are applicable for the first 6 issues, price rises to \$2.00 and \$3.40 for #7 - 12.

Each issue is 8 pages, photographs and drawings, and with Issue #3 a color chip of F.A.P. Field Green (a black olive drab). Concentrating on a particular aircraft, Issue #1 was a French F4U-4 and F.A.P. Vampire, #2 the JU-52 (Civilian and with floats), No. 3 the Curtis Hawk 75 and No. 4 the DH, Beaver, Buffalos and Me-109.

English seems to be increasing and all drawings are described in English, with Finnish and English photo captions, and an English International Corner Column. In all a very well done magazine.

They also accept advertising, and for the benefit of any manufacturers and large hobby shops who might read this, IPMS-Mallari would not be a bad spot to place an advertising buck. I suspect it would gain a different exposure and would certainly assist a unique and deserving publication.

Next month I'll show you the usclessmess of running color chipe. By the time I'm finished you'll have 3 chipe of what is supposed to be the same color (I think): PSS95 34151. At least these are matched to chipe taken from areas that should be Zine Chromato. For that matter not only were they taken from the same plane but both from the same landing ear door! Admittedly it was a big door (604, the B-52 bother Ship for the X-15). This arroraft was maintained well and basical what happened was any wear or desage was promptly repainted - with a different batch. This is a typical on most USAP aircraft I've seen so the lesson it tells the modeller is don't paint your colors flat one shade. Between sun, staining, and repainting whatever color your psinting is going to be at least several different shades, which I've found gives a lot of character to the nodel. A word of caution; to it gentle, you see these colors only about a foot from you. Nove back a scale distance, say 5 or 10 feet and there isn't as much difference.





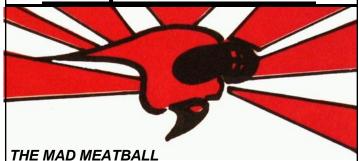
