
































Awards Dinner






I fully appreciate all of you who are regular contributors to this newsletter. I know most people look forward to reading about your various builds. I also know that I am constantly asking for more contributions. Last Christmas I was lucky enough to come home from the Christmas dinner with a 1/32 scale kit of a P51 Mustang. So just to prove that I also build I decided to write a review and add some technique notes.

I do not have enough room in my display cabinet for anything bigger than 1/48 and I detest aircraft that hang from the ceiling with props stopped with gear up. Jets of course do not have this problem but my preferred genre is 1/48 aircraft of WW2 so to deal with it I decided this model would be fitted with a prop blur propeller (Check out PropBlur.com)






I believe that this kit is a new retool from Revell who look to be making a comeback much the same as Airfix did.

The kit has lots of detail but because it is going to be wheels up in-flight I started with the cockpit. I usually start with the landing gear because that is usually the most fiddly bit.

There is a lot of detail in the cockpit and worth taking your time with. The floor was done by painting it with a light deck color and then dry brushing with a dark brown on a stiff brush to get a wood grain effect.







The side walls and instrument panel went together well after painting with the interior green color The Decal for the instrument panel settled well with microset.

I always put a layer of clear gloss on anything that requires a decal as it helps create a smooth surface for the decal to sit on and thus better adhesion

The rest of the side wall instruments were applied after first painting them on the sprue which I find is good for holding them in place—I usually scrape off any flash first and then spot touch up once the part is cut from the sprue and Applied.

The component parts of the cockpit were then assembled with no problems—nice touch is the labeling on the batteries.





Next up was the wing assembly and as I said previously this is a wheels up model so no undercarriage to do but if it were wheels down there is also some good detailing there including the cockpit floor which is painted zinc Chromate and the joystick fitted to it—the cockpit assembly fits over this









The fuselage sides are then fitted to the wings—no real problems there as it was a good fit.

The only complaint is the usual with the wing roots needing to be filled and sanded to get rid of the gap. As you can see from the pictures the cockpit assembly fitted well and looks good with all the detail

Next up was to fix the wing root gaps. I use this method whenever I have to sand and scrape near any surface detail. First I apply tamiya (or similar) masking tape either side of the gap to protect any surface detail. I then fill the hole and sand down the filler—this leaves a nice smooth joint with no damage to the surrounding surface








A similar treatment was given to other slight gaps such as fuselage seam and wheel well doors etc





If you have not used Prop Blur before give it a go. I like the result I get and as far as I can se it is a viable alternative to having an actual rotating prop. I know some people use a fan to rotate the prop when taking photos or even installing an electric motor connected to the prop.

Both those methods are fine but for a model that is hanging from the ceiling it is not a viable fix

Prob blur props come in all sizes and you just need to order the amount you need. This model is a 4 bladed prop so each blade is an individual item. Smaller scales have 3 blades and even 2 blades as one item.

First off you need to fit your blades to the hub, I just used a razor saw and super glue. Make sure that you note the rotation of the prop blades before you remove them from the hub. Also make sure that you install them so the prop appears to be turning in the correct rotation direction.

The blades are PE so make sure they are clean and apply a very thin coat of a light gray undercoat. Do not use thick paint as it will clog the holes in the blades and ruin the effect.

Once it is dry apply a dark gray (not black) color starting from the hub ie the part of slowest rotation making sure you do not over do it—work towards the tip making the shade lighter as you go.

Do the same with a light yellow for the blade tips.



A quick word about painting. I decided to do this as the Mustang flown by Colonel T.J.J. Christian. As you can see it is an unusual camo pattern with the bottom and some of the fuselage as Polished aluminum and a mixture of greens on the upper surfaces with a bright yellow nose. I always have done mustangs in the polished aluminum and for this I had enough Alclad polished aluminum to do this model.


I first applied a primer of Alclad gloss black as this gives a better base for the polished surface. Once that was dry (24 Hours) I applied the aluminum to the whole model and again left 24 hours to dry.


If you have never used Alclad before it is a good paint but very unforgiving if you do not let it dry. I also use gloves when handling after the paint is applied.

The camo patters and the Invasion Stripes on the underside and sides were masked off and appropriately painted.

I used an Olive matt and dark green for the Camo and the tailplane—this was the tricky part of the job masking out each color whilst making sure the aluminum remained intact and not over sprayed















The finished work hung from the ceiling using a small cup hook and nylon (Fishing line) thread



San Salvadorian Goodyear FG-1D

The beer commercial that says that you only get one chance in thi life may usually be accurate, but the photographing of this Latin American FG-1D is an exception to that rule.

I first saw a group of about six Salvadorian FG-lD's during an escorted photographic tour through the now-defunct Naval Air Facility at Litchfield Park, Arizona, on April 9, 1958, but I was not permitted to make any photos, since they were on the flight line and were, incidentally, the property of a Foreign Government. So much for a rare bird — or so I thought.

Later, on July 9, I had a chance to fly right side with my brother on a charter trip to Alpine, Texas, and when we landed at El Paso, I discovered a somewhat battered San Salvadorian FG-ID parked on the Municipal Airport ramp. Camera in hand, I descended like a cloud of locusts on the aircraft, photographing it, unfortunately only in black and white, from all angles, I was determined not to miss it again.

The aircraft had apparently been groundlooped on its delivery flight-from Litchfield Park to El Salvador. Thanks to an abstinance of right for was it left) rudder, DyP is able to publish these drawings, which were taken directly from my photographs. Perhaps a reader can fill us in on the subsequent service life of these aircraft.

I was born and raised in San Diego, California and graduated from San Diego State College in 1964. Since entering the Air Force I have been working in aircraft maintenance and have been stationed in New Mexico, Vietnam, Germany, California, Arizona, Iran, and now Ohio (Wright-Patterson). My experience has been with P-84's, F-100's, F-4's, and A-7's. The overseas assignments presented some excellent opportunities to get information and photos, where possible, to put more accuracy into my model building.

I have always tended toward building model aircraft and was around 10 or 11 when I built my first kit. I think one of the earlier ones was a Revell B-36 which is still in storage somewhere in San Diego. My attention was attracted to 1/24 cars during high school and I built around 200 or those, most of which are also in storage in San Diego. My family has a few things to say about that!

I got back to aircraft during college and initially concentrated on 1/72 fighters only but now just about anything from the mid-30's to the present is fair game. I first heard about IPMS while stationed in Phoenix and have been a member since late 1970. Since my present assignment at the Air Force Institute of Technology takes up about 30 hours a day, the stack of unbuilt models keeps getting bigger. I hope to begin correcting that problem later this year.

It all boils down to this, it you can't say anything nice, then keep your mouth shut, maybe that's the best he can do! Could this be why our members are not showing up at the meetings?


HAWKER HUNTER T-7

Not long ago I wased never to convert again, due in part to 6 months building a Privatier, and also to the west variety now scalable from our friendly Hobby Shops. Price was a bit steeps at \$1.75, however quality is very good. The parts are cast from a material which looks very much like some, but glues, works and paints like plastic. The canopy is a good clear injection molding. Extra parts needed are the tail fairing, which I made from the top of a Bic pen, and the seats, which come from the spares file, origionally from a jet provost I think. Pollow the directions in the AC kit after assembling the body per Airfix, and you will have no trouble. This is the most trouble free conversion I have ever done, and I've done many. Airfix magazine has a good feature on this job on Page 382 of March '72 issue, complete with several color reference drawings.

However, odd ball that I am I choose to paint my model as WV 253 of the Empire Test Pilots' School, Parmborough. Profile center spread #167 gives good color side view. Top white, from canopy down spine and all of rudder and fin. Res of aircraft red, including horizontal stab. Large white 24 aft of fus. rour white WV 253 near tail, black chest line from nose to lower intake lip.

The T-7 is the real color bird of the Hawker Stable and there is no reason why any two models should be the same, as from all perference no two of the aircraft looked allke


If you wish to do a further conversion on this bird you may model the Denish version, which did not have the notified wing. Carve off the extended leading edge — plug hole — shape, fill and sand.





The wings on the Airfix Kit also benefit from a bit of sanding on the interior surface before assembly. This will thin the section and sharpen the trailing edge to a more scale shape. The conversion kit was purchased from V. C. Hobbys in San Diego, the Air Fix Hanter Kit from Wagon Wheel Hobbys, Phoenix, and the infro from Profile (167, Airfix Megazine, plus my own files.


I see by the semi-official grapevine that Air Conversions are soon to have a kit for the two seat lightning out. This is a logical step as the lofting for the Hanter was used by English Electric to produce their trainer version, therefore some of the necessary places should be very similar. Also I seem to have half a dozen Air Fix Kits for the EE lightning just waiting for the scalpel.

In some places, the zinc chromate was touched up with a medium green that comes close to FS 34108 (there was a chip in D/P #13 and maybe we'll repeat it sometime in the future).

Last month we reviewed Micro <u>Scale's Quick Silver Putty</u>. I understand they have now issued instructions for use - if you do purchase this be sure to obtain the printed instructions as it explains a lot.

Our display this month is small Air Force's, any period.



PzRw. XIII V2SIW with A-4S-R/1 Missile

Dubbed the VZErsatzelliteragon by the development staffs, the VZSLW version of the Pz&v. XIII was evolved by Doktor Werner von Brain's research groupe at Penneaunds, on the Baltic Coast. Strange as it may seem, the VZSLW variant actually come about as a direct result of the R.A.F.'s first 1,000 plane bumbing raid on the Anny's rocket research center on the night of Pebruary 30, 1944. The very successful incending vattack set off disasterous fires, and the resulting chaos in the blueprint storage area somehow caused the prints of the A-4 missile (V-2) to be merged with a set of blueprints of a rare photoreconiassance variant of the original Montpolfier balloon. The result was truly unique in the history of aerial warfare - - - the first "Spy in the Sky" satellite.


The V2S, or A-4S-R/I missile/satellite combination, was transported and launched from the P2Nv. XIII V2SIN tank carriage, as illustrated. The standard A-4 which are also as the place by the satellite in compact form, complete with a folded up hydrogen balloon. (The ddirty Yanks still refused to sell any helium to the Geneus, despite the Hindenburg incident.) When the satellite reached orbital selections are also as a latitude regulating devices consisting altitude, originally specified as fifteen meters, was later increased eighteen by direct order of the Pulmer, while orbital velocity, first calculated at six knotes, was later raised to eleven by the installation of a hydrogen ejed at six knotes, was later close of the balloon. The photo-reconsistence version carried a 122 size Voltander folding bellows comera mounted on a leather strap banging bellow the satellite. The shutter was mounted by a Zeiss timing mechanism, and photos were possible even on cloudy days.

The first operational use of the A-4S-R/l, launched from PZRW. XIII VZSIW's coursed during the preliminary operations associated with the German Ardennes offensive during the winter of 1944-45. The plan was to have the satellites obtain photos of the critical Bastogne region, but, unfortunately, a strong northeasterly gale, variously estimated at from ten to thelve knots, blee the satellite off course, resulting in some remarkably clear, but militarily useless, photos of the red light district in Cairo, Bypt. The only military result of this operation was therefore, the subsequent discovery of these photos by advancing Israeli forces during their 1956 offensive sweep through the Sinai Desert, which prompted Israeli military leaders to abandon Cairo as a military objective.



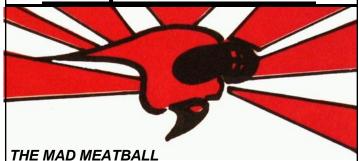
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
