After being closed for exhibit upgrading all of February, the museum reopened on March 3rd, and then closed again on March 18th.

Did You Know?

The (Bloody) labor Strike of 1892

In June of 1892, the workers who unloaded and loaded lumber from and onto the lake freighters and canal barges in NT went on strike. They wanted the abolishment of the "Stevedore System" and recognition of their union.

Stevedores were work gang bosses who hired the men. They would pay the men less money or hire fewer workers than they were allotted, and pocket the rest of the money.

Any worker who complained was fired and blackballed.

The lumber dealers reacted to the strike by hiring strikebreakers. On June 11, 600 strikers with guns, rocks, and clubs, confronted the strikebreakers at the docks of the Weston Lumber Company. NT Police who were on hand fired their guns into the air in an attempt to disperse them. Some of the strikers then fired their guns at the police and strikebreakers. Others used their clubs to assail the strikebreakers, injuring several.

Eight of the ringleaders of the rioting strikers were subsequently arrested and the local militia was activated. All work had stopped on the docks with the militia patrolling the area.

A few days later the state of NY was able to negotiate an agreement that settled the dispute. The workers got the Stevedore system abolished, but did not get their union recognized.


Here are photos of some of the exhibit enhancements made in February, 2020.
