2. No ISW were discovered in Serials (a), (b) and (c), when overrun.

3. Serial (d). Buildings undamaged but filthy; no water, no supplies, no cooking facilities. Of the 82 persons uncovered, some were women; all were treated as DIS although 25 French claimed to be ex-ISW.

4. Serial (e). This was not overrun, but the German guards fled, and 1220 of the inmates escaped through our lines, and were collected and taken to ST AVOID. The French were turned over to the French authorities, and the Italians to IOW cages, the Poles being evacuated to AVIGNON. Evacuation of the remainder to LE MANS was being arranged.

The hospital is said to be a large stone building with 800 beds, and six wooden buildings with 400 beds. The equipment (mostly French) was adequate for dealing with typhus and tubercular cases, incurable diseases such as cancer, and surgical cases (e.g. appendicitis). The hospital was in charge of a French Army doctor assisted by 5 French, 7 Yugoslav, 4 Italian and 11 Russian doctors.

XI B and Stalag 357.

Stalag II B      1000 area Malchin-Teterow (Via Neubrandenburg).

Stalag II D      7400 British, Yugo-Slavia et al directed Jarmen-  
Friedland, (Via Neubrandenburg).

Oflag II B      1200 French prisoners to Seest Oflag VI A, VI D, and  
Sandbostel, Lingen X B.

Oflag II C      500 Polish officers arrived F.L.M. (Via Neubrandenburg).  
4000 Poles overrun by Russians.

Oflag II D      1500 ladies to Neubrandenburg.

Oflag 65      1470 Yugo-Slavs proceeding WOLDECK (Via Neubrandenburg).

WEHRKREIS III

Stalag III A      950 Polish officers arrived from Hungary in poor  
physical condition.

Stalag III B      4600 US arrived at Stalag III A - after few days  
stay were to be marched 18 kms west of Luckenwalde.  
Now at Maerkisch-Rietz ( $52^{\circ}4'N$ : $12^{\circ}48'E$ ).

Stalag III C      Evacuated west of River ODER but are close to military  
operations so may continue westward. Now at Werneuchen  
( $52^{\circ}30'N$ : $13^{\circ}40'E$ ).

Stalag Luft 3      4000 US arrived Stalag VII A.

Stalag Luft 7      Have now reached Stalag III A, where they will be moved by train or other means to Moosburg or Nurnberg.

Stalag VIII A      Now reached Naumburg ( $51^{\circ}10'N$ : $11^{\circ}50'E$ ) enroute to Stalag IX C. Two-thirds to be divided between Stalag IX A and Stalag IX B, remainder to new camp in region of Goettingen. 1370 US/BR unable to march sent by rail to unknown destination.

Stalag VIII B      Moving to Stalag 344, and then subsequently on foot across N. Bohemia towards Mantova. Advance group passed through Melnik reached Rakovnik (Bohemia).

Stalag VIII C      Head of Southern group near Gorsund, west of Eisenach. Head of Northern group west of Sommerda.

Stalag 344      Moving Southwest across Bohemia. Advance group now near Carlsbad. Rear of column near Brux. 4000 US/BR sick and wounded to go by train to Stalag XI B, Stalag XIII C, Stalag VII A, and Stalag IX B. 800 sick BR/US to Stalag XVII A.

BAB 20 & 21      Ordered to Stalag 344, and proceeding with them to new areas.

Bad Schwarzbach      Reported being sent to Spitzburg bei Eisenstein (Upper Bavaria).

Ilag KREUZBERG      To Spittal/Drau; civilians from Tost to Spittal/Drau.

WEHRKREIS XX

Stalag XX A      7600 French, British et al moving towards Boitzenburg, area of Malchin-Teterow. Portion will be transported unknown destination by rail.

Prison GRAUDENZ      Moving towards Wehrkreis II.

Stalag XX B  
36      891      9000 British and others. Area Malchin-Teterow near Dommin (Via Neubrandenburg). Large number in Marienburg surrounded by Russians.

WEHRKREIS XXI

Oflag XXI C/ii	Number of Norwegian officers arrived Stalag III A in good condition.
Oflag XXI C/2	To Stalag II A.
Oflag 64	600 US near Jondon bei Schinomund. 260 officers reached Stalag III A by train. 500 US officers of train reached Tarchim (53°26'N; 11°55' E) going to Stalag XII C. 2000 IWs left andimentary abandoned on road.
Oflag 64 Z	Moving towards Nurnberg/Langwasser (Oflag 73).
Stalag XXI D	No information.

GENERAL NOTES:

Hagenau and Boitzenburg (Wehrkreis II) are the assembly points, with destination Fischbeck, Lübeck, Sandbostel and Marlog-Milng Nord for the following:

600 US officers from Oflag 64.  
6165 US/ER POWs from Stalag Luft 4.  
3000 BR and other nationalities near Demmin from Stalag XX B.  
7600 BR and other nationalities near Demmin from Stalag XX A.

40 officers and 2,000 other rank ex-prisoners of war are in Russian hands and moving to Odessa, where a Transit Camp is being established (capacity 5,000).

A large number of liberated British prisoners of war are at large in the Radomsko area. (Lodz Area)

2,000 British prisoners have been liberated from Gleiwitz and are being assisted by theoles.

A great number of British officers and other ranks are said to be at Kracow.

There is a new Luft camp under construction, vicinity Nurnberg.

10,000 IWs formerly in coal mines of Southern Silesia are going to be moved into the Ruhr and into Lignite mines in Saxony.

Work detachments east of Stalag IV F evacuated. Main camp remains as before.

PART III

Emergency Relief Measures

1. Following is information on measures taken by SHAEF and INTER-CROSS for the relief of United Nations IW in GERMANY.

2. Due to the RUSSIAN advance, approximately 500,000 United Nations Prisoners of War in Eastern Germany were displaced by German authorities to Camps in Western and Southern Germany. However, of this total it was officially reported that 260,000, divided into three groups, are moving in three general directions:

- a. From Camps in North East Germany Westwards in the direction of HAMBURG.
- b. From Eastern Germany towards Central Germany in the direction of BERLIN and MAGDEBURG.
- c. From Eastern Germany towards Southern Central Germany in the direction of MUNICH and MOOSBURG.

3. At the time these movements started, the normal flow of Relief Supplies from LUBECK in the North and SWITZERLAND in the South was virtually suspended due to the lack of available transportation within Germany.

4. To meet the urgent needs of the IW, the IRCC obtained from the Swiss Government, 50 railway cars. On 6 March 1945, 48 of these cars containing food and 2 containing Medical supplies, departed from Switzerland under German safe conduct to MOOSBURG. The train arrived at MOOSBURG on 8 March 1945, unloaded and returned to Switzerland on 12 March 1945.

5. On Wednesday, 8 March 1945, the IRCC dispatched from Switzerland into Germany, under safe conduct, 25 trucks. Nineteen of these carried food and medical supplies to CARLSBAD and MARIENBAD in Southern Germany. The remaining six carried gasoline and oil North to LUBECK, where they will remain, using LUBECK as a base of operation. In addition to the six trucks, the German Government has made available to the IRCC, 2-22 ton trucks, making a total of 8 trucks available for use at LUBECK.

Two notes of interest are:

1. Gasoline and oil for the operation of vehicles was provided by the U.S. Army from American sources on the Continent.

2. The 19 trucks dispatched to CARLSBAD and MARIENBAD serviced on one trip, 20,000 Prisoners of War.

36 893 6. The IRCC has available in Switzerland:

a. 25 trucks procured by the ARO from the U.S. Army and transferred to the IRCC.

b. U.S. Army has provided 50 trucks to the IRCC.

- c. 50 trucks provided by the Canadian Red Cross.
  - d. 159 freight cars provided by the French Government.
  - e. 175 freight cars provided by the Belgian Government.
  - f. 80,000 tons of Red Cross supplies for movement in Southern and Central Germany.
  - g. 30,000 tons of Red Cross supplies for movement into Western and Central Germany through LUBECK.
- 60,000 tons of Red Cross supplies are stored in various ports of Southern Europe for movement into Switzerland as required.

7. The IRCC has available in SWEDEN:

- a. 50 trucks procured from the British Red Cross and transferred to the IRCC. (These trucks will be sent to LUBECK).
- b. 30,000 tons of Red Cross supplies.

Information contained above includes all data available as of 16 March 1945.

8. Over and above these emergency measures the following amounts of regular Red Cross supplies were dispatched to designated PW Camps in Germany during February and the first twelve days of March:

February : approx. 5000 tons from Switzerland  
approx. 2400 tons from Lubeck  
March 1-12: approx. 500 tons from Switzerland  
approx. 1200 tons from Lubeck.
