Sad News:

The Osceola Historical Society informed me of a treasure site that was lost to bulldozers last month. A future industrail Park contractor uncovered a Kissimmee dump site of the 1850's.

The historical society was notified but due to the shortage of experienced treasure hunters, they had to rely on museum staff who recovered many fine bottles and artifacts. Betty Metzger, Fresident of the Osceola branch, stated that many humdreds of bottles were still in the ground but they were holding up progress and the excavation was terminated. Today there is only dirt covering the site with a building going up there soon. This was located on Central Avenue. This is why I strive to get club members involved with historical societies.

Treasure Sites

The Florida Gold Rush occured in Dunellon on May Day of 1889. A formation of hard rock phosphate was discovered by Albertus Vogt, a local native and businessman. The "Phosphate Boom" lasted until World War 1. During that time, Dunellon and other mining communities (Floral City, Hernando, Holder and Inverness resembled am early gold mining twom of the old West. Saloons and dance halls were everywhere and coroner's inquest followed each weekend. A payroll robbery took place near Hernando in which the paymaster was murdered. The robbers were lynched but no mention of the payroll was mentioned as recovered.

It may pay to investigate this further.

Over 10,00 men worked the phosphate mines at a dollar a day. I once found a broken Bitters bottle near a pit, north of Hernando. Several mines lie within the Withlacoochee State Forest. I asked the park rangers if bottle hunting was legal in the park bounderies. They stated that it's OK as they are only interested in Indian mounds. Fort Alabama is located on the south bank of the Hillsborough River near the state park. It was built in 1836 by Alabama volunteers. Shortly after leaving about 40 soldiers behind, the fort was attacked by about 400 Indians. The resisted attacks for 25 days when reenforcements arrived. Fort was booby-trapped with two kegs of powder. Osceola lost 4 scouts when they enterred the fort and set off the trap. Fort should be on the south side of the H. River and north side of the Blackwater Creek near their junction. Some reports say that Ft. Foster sits on the site but according to Gray's "Florida Forts", 1972. They are separated by two miles.

Fort Andrews is located on the west bank of the Fennahallawa River, 6 miles above its entrance in the Appalachee Bay. Built in Dec. 1838 by the 6th US Infantry and occupied until 1840.

Camp Brisbane is located on a plantation site called St. Joseph in St. Johns Co. It was on the Matanzas River and belonged to a General Joseph W. Hernandez. Occupied by US troops and fortified. *Report of Congress #58, 28th Congress, 1st Session, Book 426. Write to National Archives for this in Washington, DC

Camp Center was located in Manatee County in 1839. See: Niles Register, volumn 56, pg 386. Either National Archives or Library of Congress in Washington, DC will have it.

Camp Charley O'Mathla was located on St. Johns River. Army & Navy Chronicles, vol. 2, pg 87.

Fort Crum was located two miles north of Micanopy near the Withlacoochee River. See: Army/Navy Chron., vol 5, pg 386 & 391.
