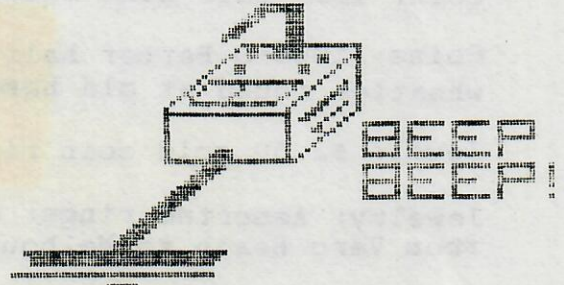

EAST LAKE DRAWDOWN
