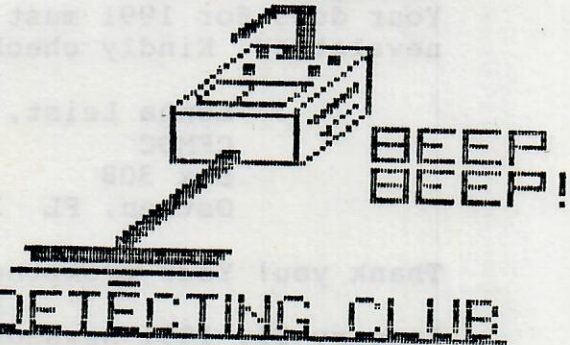

January 11, 1991 newsnotes.....

The club is feeling the budget crunch and anticipating an increase in monthly dues raised to \$47.70 per month starting March 1991. In addition the postal increase scheduled for February 3, 1991 will bring the cost of mailing the newsletter up to .04¢ea. letter mailed. We now have 90 members as of January 11, 1991.

Discussion at the meeting centered around other possible sites in the Central Florida area, costs per night, obligations of the members insofar as cleanup and maintenance were concerned. Negotiations will be attempted again to achieve an amicable agreement between the Goldenrod Civic Center and CFMDC.

Bank night and  $\frac{1}{2}$  and  $\frac{1}{2}$  finally had two winners. The winner of \$33.00 was Mrs. Don Hurtig and that number #52 belonged to Herb Phillips who lined his wallet with \$40.00 extra folding green!

The discussion continued over possible sites for a hunt- one possible site- Camp WeWa in Apopka was suggested by Herb Phillips. The site must have sufficient interest to go- to cover camping overnite, et cetera.

It was suggested and offered as an incentive to anyone finding a relatively large site with overnight accommodations that they could be rewarded with \$50.00 for checking it out and making arrangements. This was encourage more members to participate and to find sites off-the-beaten track that are known by members in the Club as a whole. Any concrete and large sites should be considered particularly ones that are considered uncovered or unsearched. Driving distance should be within 2 hours and the month of March or April open for a hunt date.

The slate of officers for 1991 was announced by President Ray Leist. An introduction of the officers followed and copies for the members of the meeting dates for the year and the phone numbers of the officers was supplied by Secretary Madeline Corder.

#### Annual Find-of-the-Month Winners

Plaques and congratulations were in order for some members of the CFMDC who had participated in the find of the month in 1990. The winners and the categories they placed in and the month they originally won in are noted on page 3.



1st. Single Coin: December 1, 1990 by Duane Carter. Duane's find was a Spanish Silver 2 Reale coin found on the Southeast Fla. coast.  
2nd. Single Coin: August 2, 1990 by Barbara Phillips. Barbara's find was a 1900 Indian Head Penny.

1st. Group Coins: Ron Wagner found in February of 1990 3 Seated Liberty Dimes dated 1843, 1853, 1857 respectively. He also found 2 Large Cents.  
2nd. Group Coins: In May of 1990, Barbara Phillips found the following: 1895 & 1897 Indian Head Pennies; 1932, 1937 & 1959 Silver Quarters; 10 Nickels dated from 1900 to 1943; a no-date Standing Liberty Quarter; and 9 dimes dated from 1918 through 1957.

1st. Single Jewelry: Charlie Petersen won't this hands down with his find in October of a fabulous diamond ring worth retail a whopping \$17,000.00!  
2nd. Single Jewelry: Ray Leist found in May 1990 a flashy gold nugget bracelet. No book value on this but between Charlie and Ray they have enough to stake a business with these and other finds!

1st. Group Jewelry: Bill Ackerman found these in September: A 10kt. class ring, Initial ring, pearl ring, child's ring with stone, a child's band, sterling Indian ring, 14kt. heart pendant, sterling silver necklace, and a large and small cross.  
2nd. Group Jewelry: Herb Phillips found in August 1990 a 10kt. Ruby Ring, 18 other rings, 2 Watches and 2 Crosses.
