State parks ban metal detectors

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's 110 state parks have banned metal detectors to keep them from being used to loot historic or archaeological artifacts.

"If the artifacts are carted away by people using metal detectors, we're losing a valuable piece of history that belongs to all the people," said Steve Martin, a cultural resources manager with the Florida Park Service.

The policy is part of a new emphasis on preserving the state's cultural and archaeological heritage, Martin said. It is also a way to keep opportunists from taking lost items, such as jewelry and watches, left by park visitors who

might want to find the items in a \$500 fine or 60 days in jail, themselves, he said.

Metal detecting is most popular at beach parks and historic sites, such as old forts, encampments or battlefields.

"There have been people out here with metal detectors and, without a doubt, a number of artifacts have been taken," said Bob Baker, manager of Egmont Key State Park, an island at the mouth of Tampa Bay that was occupied in the 1800s by both pirates and soldiers.

Although the island's artifacts are protected by the designation on the National Register of Historic Sites, Baker said the rule will make enforcement easier. Disobeying the edict could result

in a \$500 fine or 60 days in jail, although officials said they plan to issue only warnings for the next month.

The rule does allow metal detectors to be used for genuine archaeological research and by residents who want to find a lost possession, with permission and supervision of park managers.


