LAKE NAMES CHRONICLE LIFE

Emmett Peter On History

Magical names come from Lake County's past.

Kismet, for instance, is a now-vanished town on Lake Dom, at the gateway to the Ocala National Forest.

The community was founded in 1884 by the Kismet Land and Development Co., and became an immediate success, attracting a 50-room hotel for tourists among flourishing citrus and pineapple plantations.

The word kismet means destiny or fate, and fate dealt Kismet a fatal blow when a freeze wiped out the plantings. But a part of Kismet survived when the hotel was dismanfied board by board and moved to Eustis where, on the corner of Magnolia and Grove streets, it became the Grand View Hotel.

However, Kismet's most important contribution to the world was a social event that took place there on Jan. 1, 1888. In the living room of the Call family, Elias Disney and Flora Call were married - the couple that would later become Walt Disney's mom and dad.

Lake, Florida's 43rd county, was carved from portions of Orange and Sumter on May 27, 1887, 214 days before the Disney wedding, and named for the large number of lakes within its boundries.

For decades, chamber of commerce people have been claiming 1,400 named lakes, but when an actual count was made in 1969, only 505 could be found, named or unnamed.

Here is how each present-day Lake County community got its name:

*ALTOONA: Named by early settlers for their former home in Altoona, Penn.


*ASTATULA: Although local legends says Astatula means "lake of sunbeams" or "lake of sparkling moonbeams," some authorities contend the name is Seminole for "people of different tribes." Still others say it's the Timucuan Indian word for "arrow."

*ASTOR: Named for the New York financier John Jacob Astor, who in the 1870s purchased the land grant that Moses Levy, a Portuguese Jew had planned to develop as a colony for oppessed European Jews.

*CLERMONT: Established about 1884 by a real estate company headed by A.F. Wrotnisky, a native of Clermont. France.

*CROWS BLUFF: Named in the 1850s for E.H. Crow, one of the early settlers of the St.Johns River.

*EUSTIS: The lake was named for Brig. Gen. Abraham Eustis, who served here during the Seminole wars, and years later the city took the name of the lake. However, what is now the town of Eustis, settled in 1883m was first called Highlands, then Pendryville, then Lake Eustis and finally Eustis. (See next newsletter for part 2)
