Sumter towns' titles hold pieces of past

If it's all the same to you, I'd just as soon stay on good terms with Halleck-Tustenugee, the Seminole chieffain who used to hang his feathered hat in the Sumter County town of Panasoffkee.

Halleck-Tustenugee was described in the 1939 Florida WPA guidebook as "one of the most feared of the Seminole chiefs." And well he might be, for during the Seminole Wars of the 1830's, the chief not only led raids on white settlers' villages and shot U.S. soldiers, but was given to biting off the ears of his own people who disagreed with him.

The guidebook says of Panasofficee, which means deep valley in the Indian language:

"The valley was the hiding place of Halleck-Tustenugee....He agreed several times to surrender, but on every occasion, after obtaining supplies, fied to the wilderness. On Dec. 20, 1841, his men raided the town of Mandarin, near Jacksonville, killed several inhabitants, fired the town, and escaped.

"Not all of the men approved of (his) obstinate resistance to the whites; some deserted. In April 1842 the chief came voluntarily to the camp at Warm Springs, near Lake Panasofikee, and was induced to go to Fort King (Ocala) where he was held captive.

"Meanwhile, his band had been enticed to the camp, captured, and taken to Fort King. They were surprised to find their leader in captivity, and some accused him of having betrayed them.

Aroused to fury by this insinuation, Halleck-Tustenugee raged like a madman, prostrated two of his followers, and bit off the ear of a third."

This is a sample of what the historian finds when he delves into the orgin of place names. Most of us learn from our parents where our names came from. A favorite aunt named Jennifer, maybe. Or a movie star like John Wayne. Or just some word that sounded good to Mom and Dad at the time.

Fewer of us know that our home counties, cities and towns get their names in much the same way, except they're picked by politicians instead of parents.

Let's start with Sumter, Florida's 29th county, founded Jan. 8, 1853. Sumter was named by the Florida Legislature for Gen. Thomas Sumter (1736-1832), a Revolutionary War hero in the southern campaigns of the Revolutionary War.

Why a native South Carolinian? Because many of the original settlers came here from that state, and Sumter was a big heroic name to them.

in a while I'll get back to Fanasoffkee, and the Indian braves' lost ears, but for now let's consider each Sumter County place name in alphabetical order: (to be continued)
