The Denver mint is totally funded by the mint itself through the sale of coins and most years sells enough to meet its budget which runs about 40 million a year. It is not reliable on taxpavers to fund their expenses. To mint a penny it cost about \$.006 while the quarter only costs 7 cents. When the new quarter program was introduced the demand for the quarters is such that the current projections call for 360 million to be produced for each state. The Denver mint also predicts great demand for the new Dollar. The Susan B. Anthony quarter was such a bust that it went from 288 million minted in 1979 to 3.25 million in 1981. ### **BUYING A METAL DETECTOR???**

OK, so you are interested enough to think about getting into the hobby! Some people like to fish, build things of wood and do other hobbies. We metal detectorists are in the hobby of world minority. This is why, unless you know where to look, there is not many places in the retail world to ask about metal detecting. To many mainstream hobbyist, metal detecting is a hobby for old people or for those that are definitely different. Your first step is to find the detector that's going to be right for you. So welcome to the hobby of metal detecting.

#### **BRAND CHOICE**

The most reliable brands are your name brands. The main brand names are WHITES, GARRETT, FISHER, TESORO AND MINELAB. These are the manufactures that you will hear the most about. There are several other manufacturers out there and as you get into the hobby you will hear more about them. Some brands are more sophisticated and there are others that are ready right away. Either way these are all quality machines. Most TH'ers (treasurer hunters) are loyal to the brand they are using so asking which detector is the best sometimes is not the best answer you can receive. If Whites, took a stick and put an extension cord on it and called it a metal detector and it pointed to a penny on the ground, it would be the best detector you could buy. At any rate, avoid buying a detector from a company not in the business of selling metal detectors. Some places like Radio Shack, Sears and Ace hardware might sell metal detectors. These places might know a lot about televisions, washers and dryers, and nuts and bolts but they don't know squat about metal detectors. You can also buy detectors at Flea Markets and yard sales but if you have problems later on who is going to help you. If you buy from a Web site make sure you know who you are dealing with. Some places sell out of their homes but make sure they are a manufacturers representative.

#### PRICE, VALUE AND PERFORMANCE

For anyone who is serious about metal detecting, a good new metal detector can start at \$250 and go up to \$1300 or more. Most people will probably let price decide but that shouldn't be the only consideration. You might think that a \$150 detector will do a good job but more than likely you will be disappointed and eventually throw your detector in the closet and never touch it again. Most of the time you will take up another hobby and spend more money on it than if you had purchased a good detector in the first place. Buying a more expensive machine doesn't mean you will find more stuff than someone with a less expensive machine. If you purchase a good machine and learn how to use it properly, you will find just as much as the guy with the expensive machine. If you use it and know what your machine is telling you, you will be successful. The best advice is to buy the best machine that you can afford and learn how to use it.

#### TYPES OF DETECTORS

There is basically, two types of detectors, manual and automatic. This means that they will suppress signals from iron (ferrous metals) either manually or automatic. This is called ground balancing. Some detectors come from the factory with the ground balance already in a pre-set level. Others allow you to do the ground balancing. If you are going to hunt for coins and relics on land, beaches, parks and around old sites, then the automatic is fine. If you are going to hunt for gold or relics where there is a lot of ferrous oxide, you will need a detector with a manual ground balance. There is also those detectors that are made for water hunting or hunting on beaches with lots of mineralization. Sometimes wet sand will take on a conductive property and cause your detector to give off false signals. The machine is simply doing what its made to do, which is to detect items with conductive properties. The pull tab of an aluminum can is less conductive than a coin, but its more conductive than a small gold ring. This is where discrimination, the most important feature of any detector, comes into play. Discrimination lets you cancel out metallic trash like pull tabs, screw caps and iron objects when detecting for coins and jewelry. However if you cancel out some pull tabs you will cancel out rings and nickels. Some detectors use a notch system which relies on a dial or switch to accept or reject items.

#### BELLS AND WHISTLES

The less money you spend the fewer bells and whistles you get. The more expensive detectors use LCD target target identification and depth meters. One of these days I hope someone makes a detector that will suck up the coin without digging for it. Target I.D. isn't fool proof, even with the most sophisticated machine. While most target I.D. machines are accurate to only about 5-6 inches, the depth readings are generally accurate. Do you really need all these features, nope, no more than a person needs that expensive car that has all the knobs and big engines. Once you get the hang of using a cheaper metal detector, you can always upgrade to one with all the bells and whistles.

#### WEIGHT

This is probably a very important part of choosing a detector. Most detectors weigh about 2 to 4 pounds. Get the lightest model you can find for the money you plan to spend. Swinging a heavy detector for a length of time will certainly tire out your arms. The lighter machine will only wear out your arm more slowly.

#### **NEW OR USED?**

Most TH'ers take good care of their machines. They also upgrade to the newest machine on the market. So, the probability of getting a bad used detector is statistically slimmer than buying a used car. Sometimes it is difficult to find someone with a used detector, that has the model or make that you want. Therefore, sometimes it is easier to buy a new machine. Most of the time the warranty will not be in effect on a used detector. If you have the time to hunt the classified ads and look on the Internet and read the treasure magazines you might find that detector that you want. For the time that you spend doing this you could be out detecting with your new detector.

#### WHOSE GOES DEEPEST?

The answer to this question is!!!! NOBODY'S. But, there are a lot of detectorists out there that will disagree. A lot of Ther's are loyal to the brand of detector that they use. There are too many variables in metal detecting for any one brand to claim to be the GREATEST DETECTOR EVER INVENTED. Most of the major brands will find objects in the 5-8 inch range. This is about where you will find most of the targets that you dig. Most detectors in the \$200-\$300 range will find object in the 5-10 inch range. Most of the time anything deeper than 12-15 inches you become an excavator, and operate a backhoe. Most of the time if you get a signal deeper than 15 inches it most of the time is a piece of iron or a aluminum can. Sometimes there are good targets deeper than 16 inches but this is when you need to know what your machine is telling you.

#### ANALYSIS PARALYSIS

Finally, figure out what kind of detecting you want to do, how much you can comfortably spend, and which model from which manufacturer will do the best job for you. After you have decided then go out and buy the machine of your choice.

If you only have \$300 to spend, don't waste your time looking at a manufacturer's higher line models. If you can't afford it then don't look at it. Putting more on your credit card or digging into the cookie jar might make you regret that purchase latter on. Don't look at the cheaper models either, because they just will not do the job that you expect of them. If you have \$300-\$400 dollars to spend then you are specially interested in devoting some serious time and effort toward getting good at finding coins and relics in the most trying of conditions. A cheaper detector will just discourage you and you will give up the hobby. One last word, if you buy a name brand detector, don't worry about whether you paid too much. This all depends on what you find with your detector. Sometimes one or two good finds will pay for that detector. Don't worry about what other people tell you what they bought their detectors for because sometimes people just like to rub others the wrong way. BUY YOUR DETECTOR-ENJOY IT-AND HAPPY HUNTING.
