PLACES TO SEARCH IN ANY NEIGHBORHOOD

When searching for any treasure FOLLOW THE CROWDS-FOLLOW THE MONEY. The most productive places will be grass or dirt covered. Productive almost every time—

Amusement parks, fair grounds and carnival rides Rides that spin, enough food to bust a gut, stands that sell trinkets and games of chance all are ingredients for a lot of coins and jewelry laying around.

Football and soccer fields.

Sweep carefully just behind the goal and along the sidelines to about the 20 yard line. This is where people crowd in to see all the action. Sometimes you can find items on the field itself.

Old Churches.

Most Churches have outdoor activities such as picnics, festivals and revivals. Look for any large open spaces. Check the sidewalks.

Concession stands.

Refreshments=Money=Whoops there goes?
Shorelines of fishing lakes and ponds.

Coins dropped from the pocket of people fishing and toy's left behind by children. Highest concentration will be 2 to 3 feet from waters edge. In the water you might find a fishing reel.

Wet sand areas of beaches.

Good source of rings lost while engaged in activities. On with the sun tan lotion, off with the ring. This doesn't happen often in dry sand so start with the wet sand first. In dry sand some people lay their jewelry on towels then shake off.

Shallow water of swimming lakes or ponds.

Another good place to find jewelry in ankle to waist deep water.

Fence lines and fence posts

A favorite place to hide caches, especially in rural areas where homes stood during the 20's and 30's when people didn't trust banks. Fences posts were a favored hiding place because the location was easy to remember. Check to see if the post was securely anchored in the ground. If it isn't, see if it pulls out and check the hole. Also check to see if anything was nailed to the top of the post.

Large isolated trees.

These were big draws for romantic picnics. At old homesteads, sweep the base and look up for any hollows or hidey-hole. Make sure nothing is in these hidey-holes before you stick your hand inside. Storm drain outlets.

Where do all those coins and jewelry go when it rains? They get washed along with the water into the municipal storm sewer line. Eventually all that water goes to an outflow. Once you locate the outflow you'll find an expanse of cement surrounding the end of this huge drainpipe. Use your detector to check out the expansion joints and the cracks where those treasures may have fallen.

Paths to the outhouse or barn.

Every rural homestead had a outhouse and a barn. Check the pathways from the house to these sites. Check the old foundations for locations to the house and barn.

Campgrounds

A virtual buffet for coins, jewelry and toys. Playgrounds.

A kid and his loose change are soon parted. Around old building foundations.

This can be somewhat of a difficult area to work with a metal detector. This is because there is usually a lot of trash in these areas. If you can pick out the good stuff then you are really good. If you don't want to mess with this then start your search about 5-6 feet out from the foundation. Under bleachers.

If this area is dirt or grass, this could be an excellent opportunity.

Old train and bus depots.

Sweep the platform and cargo areas. Also sweep the perimeter of the building or foundation.

Drive-in theaters and outdoor flea markets.

Start at the concession stand then if there were any picnic tables check those out. Also if it had a playground for kids check that out.

Beneath old wooden porches.

Could be a hiding place for caches or dropped coins. If you can brave the spiders, varmints and all that dirt, it could pay off.
Old school sites.

This is where research comes in. If you will search for the old rural school sites that probably no longer in existence this could be a TH'ers dream. Embankments.

These are good if around old swimming areas or around fishing ponds.

Dirt parking lots.

Good place especially if around a tavern. Early in the morning a lot of change is lost from pockets. <u>Under clothes lines.</u>

A good place to start when searching old homesite Around phone booths(grass areas)

A lot of change is lost here.

Bus stops.

People who ride buses always have change. Along sidewalks.

Especially between the sidewalk and the curb.
