THE REST OF THE STORY

We have all heard the haunting song, "Tap's". It's the song that gives us that lump in our throats and usually creates tears in our eyes.

But, do you know the story behind the song? If not, I think you will be pleased to find out about it's humble beginnings. Reportedly, it all began in 1862 during the Civil War, when Union Army Captain Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate Army was on the other side of the narrow strip of land. During the night, Captain Ellicombe heard the moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, Captain Ellicombe decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention.

Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the Captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment. When the Captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead. The Captain lit a lantern and suddenly he caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son. The boy had been studying music in the South. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial despite his enemy status.

His request was only partially granted. Captain Ellicombe had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But, out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one musician. The Captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted.

The haunting melody we now know as "Tap's" used at military funerals, and at the end of each

DETECTING TIPS

Here is a site that is giving away a new Whites DFX detector:

When detecting in cold damp weather get a pair of dishwashing rubber latex gloves. This will still let you feel what you find as will as keeping your hands clean

You can also try this for detecting gloves. Get a decent pair of leather gloves that fit fairly snug. Then treat them with a baseball glove conditioner that you can buy from a sports store. Good for detecting where you might encounter broken glass or old pieces of metal.

When you want to cover the most area that is possible use this method. Make a couple of picks, something that you can insert into the ground easy. Tie them together with about 25-30- of twine. Set these two stakes apart in a line. Then start sweeping the ground while walking on the right side of the twine. When you get to the end, then move that stake over 2 feet and start sweeping on the right side again. Continue this moving the stake 2 feet at a time. This will let you cover all the ground throughly.

If you live in a town where the storm drains empty into a lake or stream, then when the water gets low, check these drains out for lost items.

While out metal detecting try to take along a disposable camera. Never know when it will come in handy.

When metal detecting carry along some different colored golf tees to mark spots where you get a signal. After several spots have been marked then go back and dig. Make a note as to how deep and what kind of signal it made.

The most important tip is to PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE. Get to know your detector by what kind of sounds you get and where your machine is telling you to dig.
