ARE OLD BOTTLES VALUABLE?

THE FOLLOWING IS SOME INFORMATION ABOUT THE VALUE OF BOTTLES AND HOW TO COLLECT AND FIND THEM.

BOTTLES HAVE BEEN AROUND A LONG TIME. THE EARLIEST BOTTLES THAT EXIST TODAY DATE BACK TO THE ROMAN AND EGYPTIAN EMPIRES WHERE THERE WAS AN ABUNDANCE OF SAND.

WAYS TO TELL THE AGE OF A BOTTLE. 1. AGE OF BOTTLE CAN BE RECOGNIZED BY THE SEAM MARKS. IF THE SEAM GOES STRAIGHT THROUGH THE TOP IT IS ABM (AUTOMATIC BOTTLING MACHINE) PROBABLY 1907 ERA. THE LOWER THE SEAM THE OLDER THE BOTTLE. 2. SECOND WAY TO DATE THE BOTTLE IS TO LOOK FOR A PONTIL SCAR ON THE BOTTOM OF THE BOTTLE THIS WHICH WILL BE A SHARP RING OR GLASS PIECE OR INDENTED IRON DEPOSITS ON THE BOTTLE. THESE ARE USUALLY PRE 1865 AND ADD WORTH TO THE BOTTLE.

- 3. EMBOSSING VERY IMPORTANT IF THE BOTTLE IS TO HAVE VALUE. THIS WILL TELL OF ITS PURPOSE AND MANUFACTURE.
- 4. LABEL ONLY BOTTLES ARE GENERALLY LESS VALUABLE THAN EMBOSSING.
- 5. COLOR AND CONDITION ALL ADD VALUE

6. IF THE BOTTLE IS RARE.

THESE ARE SIX GENERAL GUIDELINES TO FOLLOW WHEN DATING BOTTLES.

COLLECTORS BEWARE OF THE

FOLLOWING BOTTLES.

DUTCH ONION BOTTLES (OLIVE GREEN) SHORT SQUAT WINE BOTTLES, USUALLY MADE BETWEEN 1650-1750 WITH PONTIL. THESE ARE NOW BEING REPRODUCED, THEY LOOK NEW, ANY BOTTLE IN PRISTINE CONDITION BEWARE OF. THEY CAN BE VERY GOOD REPRODUCTIONS. FRUIT JARS: PLAIN JARS ARE BEING COLOR "INHANCED" BY GAMMA RAY'S. THIS IS DONE BY A SPECIAL PROCESS AND MOST OF THE TIME THE COLORS WILL BE DIFFERENT. THEY ARE VERY HARD TO TELL SINCE THEY WERE OLD JARS TO BEGIN WITH. BEST ADVICE, IF THE COLOR JUST DOESN'T LOOK RIGHT AND THE PRICE IS TOO CHEAP BEWARE.

SOME UNCOMMON BOTTLES.

FIRE GRENADES: THESE BOTTLES WERE DESIGNED TO BE DESTROYED IN THE CASE OF A FIRE. MOST COMMON COLORS ARE COBALT, GREEN, AMBER AND CLEAR. THEY USUALLY HAVE BANDS OR QUILTING ON THEM AND ARE

EMBOSSED WITH THE MANUFACTURES NAME THESE ARE USUALLY THE EASIEST TO FIND AND SELL FOR ABOUT \$75. THE RARER THE COLOR THE MORE EXPENSIVE. THEY ARE ABOUT 6-8" HIGH WITH A NARROW NECK AND A ROUND BODY. CAN BE FILLED OR EMPTY. VERY GOOD ONES GO FOR AROUND \$2000. WITCH BALLS: UNLIKE FLOATS THESE GLASS BALLS HAVE A OPENING AT THE TOP FROM 1/4 TO 1 1/4 WIDE. THEY COME IN A VARIETY OF SINGLE COLORS OR MAY HAVE WIDE LOOPING'S, SWIRL'S AND SPECKEL'S AND SELL FOR AS LITTLE AS \$25 TO \$1000. TARGET BALLS: THESE ARE LIKE A WITCH BALL BUT ONLY SMALLER AND HAS A LITTLE OPENING WITH A SMALL NECK. THEY USUALLY ARE COLORED BLUE. GREEN, LAVENDER AMBER. VALUE IS FROM \$65 TO \$2000. WHERE TO FIND AND DIG BOTTLES: BOTTLES TURN UP ALL OVER. FARMS, AUCTIONS, UNDER PORCHES, BEHIND WALLS BASEMENTS, ATTICS, OLD HOMES. FLEA MARKETS, ANTIQUE SHOPS, THRIFT SHOPS, BOTTLE SHOWS AND IN THE GROUND. WHEN SEARCHING FOR A PLACE TO DIG LOOK AT THE SURROUNDING AND ASK YOURSELF IS THIS AREA LIKELY TO HAVE BEEN NEAR WHERE PEOPLE USED TO TRAVEL OR LIVE. IS THERE A HOUSE FOUNDATION OR A TRASH PIT OR PRIVY? THE BEST PLACE TO DIG IS IN THE TRASH PIT OR PRIVY. IT'S A GOOD BET THAT A DEPRESSION THAT SINKS IN THE GROUND WILL LIKELY YIELD SOMETHING. WHILE **OUTHOUSE DIGGING MAY SEEM STRANGE** AND FRIGHTENING YOU MUST PUT IT INTO CONTEXT THAT THIS WAS OVER A HUNDRED YEARS AGO AND THE REWARD CAN CERTAINLY BE WORTH IT. IT WAS COMMON PRACTICE IN THOSE DAYS TO THROW GARBAGE INTO THE PRIVY OR IN THE LOCAL TRASH PIT. THE BOTTLES FOUND IN PRIVY WILL MOST LIKELY BE ON THE BOTTOM (4' TO 15') DEEP WITH THE OLDEST BEING DEEPER. THE BEST DIGGING IS IN THE EASTERN PART OF THE UNITED STATES WHERE MOST OF THE HOMES WERE FIRST SETTLED. THE WESTERN STATES ALSO HAD AN ABUNDANCE OF GOOD DIGGIN AREAS

BECAUSE OF THE GOLD RUSH OF THE

LATTER 19TH CENTURY. THE MIDWEST HAS STILL A LARGE NUMBER OF SPOTS TO DIG BUT THE QUALITY OF THE BOTTLES ARE USUALLY LESS VALUABLE.

CLEANING BOTTLES:

AFTER DIGGING BOTTLES MOST OF THEM NEED SOME TYPE OF CLEANING. BE CAREFUL HOW YOU CLEAN THEM. IF THERE IS ONLY DIRT AND DEBRIS IN THE BOTTLE JUST WASH OUT WITH WARM SOAPY WATER. IF YOU NEED TO GET SOME MORE DIFFICULT DEBRIS OUT THEN USE RICE, COPPER BB'S OR SAND. SWISH AROUND WITH SOME WATER ADDED. IF THERE IS A LIGHT HAZING IN THE BOTTLE THAT WONT CLEAN UP TRY MURIATIC ACID AND LET THE BOTTLE SIT IN THE SOLUTION FOR SEVERAL DAYS. A STRONGER SOLUTION OF WINK (RUST REMOVER) DILUTE THIS A LITTLE AND DON'T LEAVE FOR MORE THAN 20 MINUTES. LIME AWAY IS GOOD FOR REMOVING WHITE CALCIUM DEPOSITS. FOR A HAZED BOTTLE THE ONLY SOLUTION IS TO HAVE IT PROFESSIONALLY CLEANED/ THEY USE A TUMBLING DEVICE THAT HOLDS THE BOTTLE IN THE CENTER, THEN THEY PUT CUT COPPER WIRE INTO THE BOTTLE WITH A SOLUTION OF WATER AND ALUMINUM OXIDE. THE BOTTLE IS RUN FOR 3-5 DAYS AND CYLINDER IS TURNED ONCE HALFWAY THROUGH. MACHINES LIKE THIS CAN BE ORDERED THROUGH MAGAZINES. THEY CHARGE ABOUT \$20-30 A BOTTLE. SOMETIMES • THERE IS A RISK OF BREAKAGE SO USE YOUR OWN DISCRETION.

DAMAGE TO BOTTLES AND WHAT CAN BE DONE? SOMETIMES YOU MIGHT HAVE A ONCE IN A LIFE TIME CHANCE TO PURCHASE OR FIND A VERY RARE BOTTLE. UNFORTUNATELY THIS BOTTLE MAY HAVE A CRACK OR PART OF THE LIP OR BOTTOM MAY HAVE A CHIP. WHAT CAN BE DONE IF THIS BOTTLE IS INDEED A GREAT FIND AND IF THE BOTTLE HAS A CRACK IT IS ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE TO REPAIR. THE VALUE OF A CRACKED BOTTLE WILL BE MUCH LESS AND THERE IS ALWAYS THE CHANCE THAT THE BOTTLE WILL CONTINUE TO CRACK. IF YOU CAN GET THIS BOTTLE CHEAP ENOUGH AND IT IS A GOOD BOTTLE THEN BUY IT. CRACKS CANT BE REPAIRED BUT CHIPS CAN. THEY CAN BE FILLED AND MADE TO LOOK PRETTY GOOD. MOST OF THE TIME YOU CAN STILL TELL WHERE THE DAMAGE WAS BUT IT WONT CONTINUE TO CHIP LIKE THE CRACKED BOTTLES WILL. BOTTLE AUCTIONS--- PRO'S AND CON'S: PRO'S:

BOTTLE AUCTIONS PROVIDE A CHANCE FOR ALL

INDIVIDUALS TO BUY BOTTLES THAT THEY MAY NOT NORMALLY HAVE THE CHANCE TO FIND. YOU NOW DON'T HAVE TO DRIVE OR FLY OUT TO BOTTLE SHOWS BUT CAN FIND BOTTLE AUCTIONS CLOSER TO HOME. MANY QUALITY PIECES ARE OFFERED FOR SALE AND SOMETIMES YOU CAN GET A BARGAIN EVEN IF THE PIECE IS DAMAGED. IF YOU WANT THE ITEM ALL YOU HAVE TO DO IS BID HIGHER. BOTTLE AUCTIONS ALSO LEAVE BEHIND A GOOD REFERENCE SOURCE TO LOOK AT AND LEARN FROM. THEY MAKE FOR AN EASY WAY TO OBTAIN SOME GOOD ITEMS.


CON"S:

BOTTLE AUCTIONS ARE DEPLETING THE SHOWS OF QUALITY BOTTLES. MOST PEOPLE FIND A SCARCE BOTTLE AND JUST ASSUME TO PUT IT UP AT AUCTION. WHY DO THEY DO THIS? PEOPLE USUALLY WILL PAY MORE AT AUCTION. THIS MEANS THAT BOTTLE AUCTIONS WILL DRIVE UP THE PRICES. THIS MEANS THAT THE SCARCE BOTTLES ARE NOT BEING FOUND AT SHOWS ANYMORE. ALSO IF THE **BOTTLE BROUGHT \$600 AT THE AUCTION** THE LAST TIME IT SHOULD ALSO BRING \$600 OR BETTER THE NEXT TIME. A LOT OF THE BOTTLE AUCTIONS ARE HELD AT BIG AUCTION HOUSES. THEY IN TURN SEND OUT A VERY COLORFUL CATALOG AND SOME TIME THESE PICTURES MAKE THE BOTTLE LOOK VERY GOOD. MAYBE EVEN BETTER THAN THE ITEM REALLY IS. CONSIGNERS OFTEN HAVE TO PAY THE **AUCTION HOUSE 20-30 % AND WITH BUYERS FEES OF 20-30% THE AUCTION** HOUSES ARE MAKING OUT REAL WELL. SOME TIMES MINIMUM BIDS ARE SET TOO HIGH AND THIS ALSO IS A BAD WAY TO SELL AND BUY BOTTLES AT LARGE AUCTION HOUSES. HOWEVER IF YOU CAN FIND SMALL AUCTIONS IN SMALL TOWNS YOU CAN SOMETIMES COME AWAY WITH A VERY GREAT PURCHASE.
