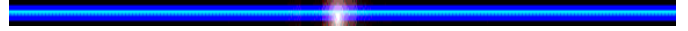

Ray noted that the storms have been washing out all of

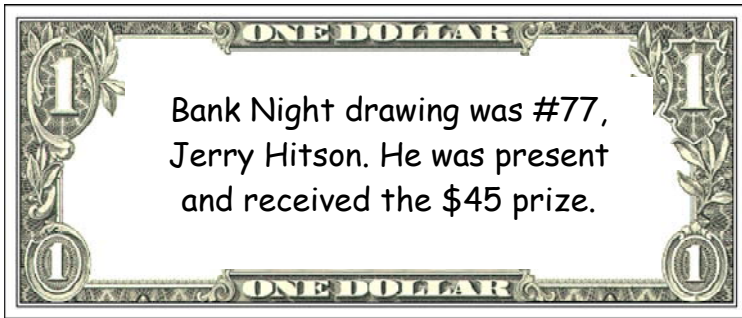

This list is by no means complete and you may want to add things you find would be useful to you.

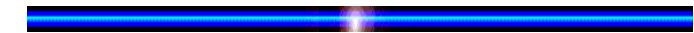

Set heat to med-low and heat till warm. This keeps the crust crispy.

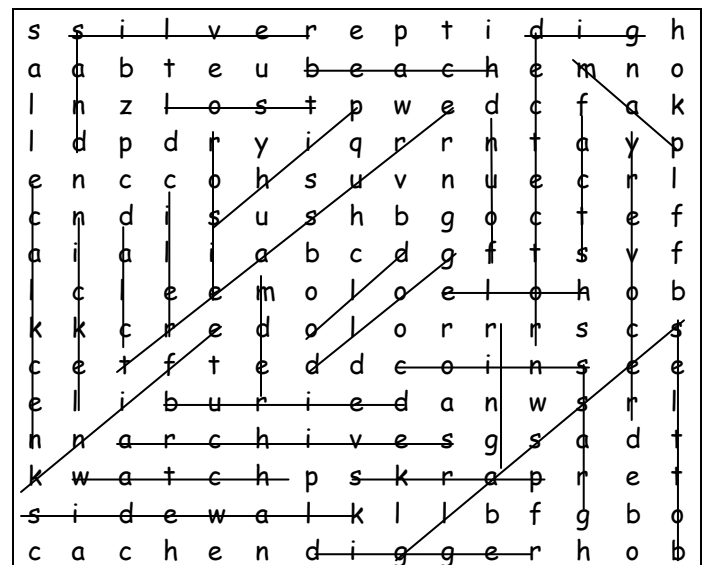
No more soggy microwave pizza.
