## Treasure hunt targets Palm Beach County Park

Local man thinks he can find pirate gold at DuBois

A modern-day treasure hunt is in the works to find out what set off a local man's metal detector at DuBois Park in Jupiter.

Longtime Palm Beach County resident William Mooney says he knows where X marks the spot at the waterfront park near the Jupiter Inlet.

Mooney suspects his treasure hunting equipment has detected a chest of riches, possibly buried hundreds of years ago by shipwreck survivors or even by pirates making a stop along the <a href="Palm Beach County">Palm Beach County</a> coast. County officials are skeptical, but still curious enough to be working on a proceeds-sharing deal.

Making a deal with Mooney also ensures that the county supervises the dig, which otherwise is not allowed in county parks. State regulators also must sign off before the dig can proceed.

"Maybe there is something significant, some old Spanish coins. ... Who knows?" said Eric Call, county parks and recreation director.

While Call jokes about finding a Jack Sparrow-style solution to county budget problems, he acknowledges that the proposed dig is more likely to come up empty.

Mooney could not be reached for comment, despite several attempts by phone and email.

After 30 years of archaeological digging at DuBois — which includes an American Indian mound and the DuBois Pioneer Home — "you would have thought somebody would have found something by now," Call said.

County Archaeologist Christian Davenport called the likelihood of Mooney finding anything of value "very low," but that "every once [in] a while hunters do find a cache of goodies."

Mooney proposes keeping 25 percent of the value of whatever he unearths. County attorneys are working on

terms, but they envision offering something closer to 10 percent if they allow the dig.

This isn't <u>Palm Beach County</u>'s first attempt to cash in on buried treasure. In 1992, the county struck a deal with a Fort Lauderdale treasure hunter looking for Blackbeard's loot and the cargo of sunken Spanish ship. The hunt, along the coastline from Highland Beach to Jupiter, failed to strike gold or any other treasure.

Mooney's plan isn't nearly as involved as the county's past treasure hunt experience with a professional salvor.

A "strong metal reading" on Mooney's metal detectors indicates a 2-by-11/2-foot item, which he believes to be a chest, just three feet below ground, according to his proposal to the county.

But why does he think it may be a pirate's chest? Mooney's dowsing instruments — also know as divining rods — "indicate precious metal," according to his proposal.

The history of local shipwrecks and pirates passing by Florida's East Coast also factor into why Mooney thinks this is more than buried junk.

Proximity of the find to the Jupiter Inlet and the DuBois Park Indian mound makes sense, according to Mooney.

The inlet is a natural spot to come ashore, and the mound would have made an easy marker for someone looking to bury loot 200 years ago, according to Mooney.
