Hello, Lions!

I'm sorry this is a bit delayed, but I wanted to give this to you with some purpose instead of just a quick email. Recruiting and retention is so vital to the sustainability of our organization and impact on our communities that it deserves the time I'm spending to send this to you.

Some quick reminders:

1. Your Club, Your Way - great eye-opener for any club who is stuck in the "It's Always Been Done That Way" rut.

2. Community Needs Assessment - if you are focused on the needs of the community instead of what you *think* the needs of the community are, you will recruit more people. It's how you know *what will sell* essentially. Once you are tackling things on your needs assessment, then you can ADVERTISE that and more people will come forward to help. Put another way: if the community thinks childhood hunger is a problem, and you are focused on bicycle safety - both important, but the community will see your projects as less important on the priority list.

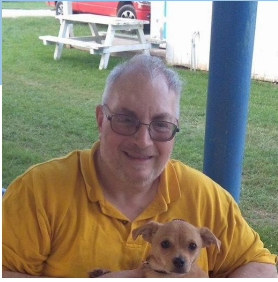

Childhood Cancer

Governor Justice has declared September to be Childhood Cancer month. Hearing that on the news makes a Lions ears perk up because that has been one of the focuses of Lions for several years.

57% of childhood cancer goes undiagnosed in some parts of the world. Survival rates are less than 20% in undeveloped countries and greater than 80% in developed countries. It is the leading cause of death in children and there are 300,000 new cases annually in 0–19-year-olds.

LCI has a plan of action for Lions and Leos that allows us to serve this group.

***Help families and children affected by childhood cancer by increasing acts of support. This might include gift cards to help with expenses incurred by traveling to treatments or partnering with another service group to provide meals.**

***Help communities improve diagnostics, treatment, and continued care to those children. This can be done by having fundraisers or applying for grants from LCI.**

***Help the world by increasing awareness for childhood care as a global priority. This can be as simple as handing out brochures at a health fair and these can be obtained free of charge by contacting LCI.**

Remember that no act of service is too small.

990-N Non-Profit Tax Filing

July 1st – November 15th

It is very important that all tax-exempt organizations complete their annual tax filings with the IRS in a timely manner. If your organization's exemption status is automatically revoked by the IRS it will be necessary to apply for reinstatement. Such a process can be very time consuming and expensive in terms of both accounting and legal fees as a new Form 1023 [must be filed](#) with the applicable application fee.

‘Without host families, there’s no program’

Sophie Weber, an exchange student from Rosenheim, Germany has been exploring West Virginia and participating in the local gatherings here. Through Lions Youth Exchange program, Steve and Terry Bales opened their arms and doors for Weber’s 4-week homestay. “It was my idea,” explained Weber.

Through the international program, Weber had options to visit several other U.S. states and countries, but opted to explore the magic of the Mountain State. “I love being in nature and West Virginia is close to D.C.,” Weber continued. When asked what her favorite visiting locations were (so far), she admitted she couldn’t decide. She narrowed down her list to DC, Luray Caverns and Harpers Ferry. “It’s all quite impressive,” Weber said.

In some ways, it seems like Weber was meant to stay with the Baileses. The couple are retired teachers and it turns out that the 18-year-old Weber plans on pursuing a teaching career.

Weber laughs when she recalls her experience with Steve. “I feel like he knows everyone,” she smiled.

Weber visited Bent River Trading Company, Capon Bridge Elementary and Middle Schools, attended Capon Bridge Library’s annual Rain Crow concert, the River House for some Old Time Jammin’, swung by the Campfire Cooking at Fort Edwards and so much more. Take note: her stay is only half way over.

Steve and Terry Bailes are no strangers to hosting exchange students. In fact, Steve was the 1st person in mind when

Germany’s Lions members contacted the Chair of WV’s Youth Exchange program Henry Krautwurst.

“Students from around the world have the same opportunity through their local Lions Clubs,” Krautwurst explained. He points out that eligibility requirements may differ from country, to state and even districts, but ultimately, all applicants have the option to go pretty much wherever they want. It is then up to the different Lions member coordinators to find their correspondents/ host families in those locations of interest, he said. Even with all the moving pieces and communication required for the program, Krautwurst said that it is all worth it. One thing he struggles with (on the West Virginia end) is finding host families.

“Without host families, there’s no program,” Krautwurst pointed out.

He tries to make sure the host family is able to show the student around the area. Krautwurst explained that there would be no point in the student coming to the U.S. if the host family is busy with work all the time.

Besides Sophie Weber, Germany was looking for another family in WV to host a 2nd student. Krautwurst would have happily hosted had his health been in better shape during the time of filing the paperwork. Krautwurst admitted his disappointment in saying no to the 2nd student, especially because he has been hosting foreign students since 2013.

He still stays in touch with the 1st student he and his wife hosted. The student – a young lady from Lima, Peru – has invited him to her wedding and other family affairs. Krautwurst even found himself in Taiwan when the student invited him to her graduation.

It is evident that the Lions Youth Exchange program has the potential to shape life-long relationships.

Trust is necessary from both sides. An eagerness to learn and accept different cultures can be a rewarding experience. Krautwurst and his WV Youth Exchange panel work every year to accept applications for WV students aged 16-21.

Each year, Krautwurst tries to communicate with school counselors to spark interest in WV students who are looking for an opportunity that they would otherwise never be able to experience. The scholarship application consists of an essay and different eligibility requirements. Oh, and a willingness to present their foreign experience when they come back to the Mountain State.

The deadline for this year is November 11. He reminds the scholarship winners to be mindful of their actions and responsibilities as “ambassadors” of Lions, WV and America as a whole.

As for the families that are interested in hosting an exchange student?

“Don't be afraid to encounter an experience that will forever enrich your life,” he said.

We neither sent out from WV nor received incoming exchange students during 2020 and 2021. At the end of 2021 five WV students wanted to go on their exchanges. Unfortunately, they all dropped out for various reasons. We will be launching our program once again in September 2022 seeking students wishing to travel abroad and host families in WV who would like host a Youth Exchange student and learn about another culture.

However, this summer we have received one student from Germany. Her name is Sophia Weber and she is being hosted by Terry Lynn & Steve Bailes of North River Mills, WV (Hampshire County). This is the second Youth Exchange student they have hosted. Being who we are we wanted to meet Sophia and Steve had a meeting to attend on Thursday August 18, 2022 so Lorrie and I had the opportunity to spend the day with Sophia.

We started our day at 9:30 am meeting Steve and Sophia in Gore, VA. Our first stop was the Route 11 potato chip factory in Mt. Jackson, VA. Rather than driving south on Rt. 81 I chose Rt. 11 which would take us through all the small towns along the way. Now, this may not be the most exciting tour in the world but it does give an insight to what goes into making various flavored potato chips. After sampling ALL the various chips Sophie took home a 24oz bag of the Dill Pickle flavored chips and then we were off to Luray Caverns.

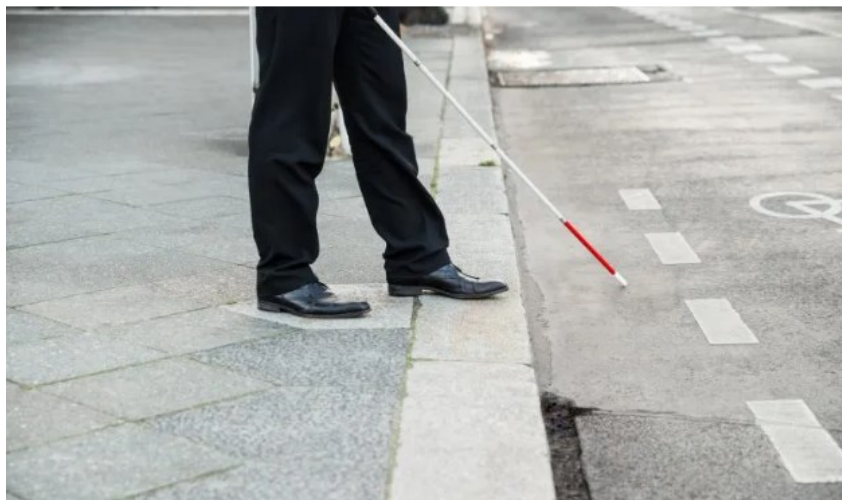
