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Our Mission

The mission of The Bridge is to prevent and eliminate domestic violence and sexual assault. We work to enhance safety and to promote equality in relationships. We are opposed to the use of violence to control the lives of others. The Bridge is committed to eliminating violence in the lives of women, children and men through empowerment, education and social change.

What We Do

The Bridge is a domestic violence and sexual assault crisis center that serves five Nebraska counties including Burt, Cuming, Dodge, Saunders and Washington.

We provide emergency, confidential shelter, a 24-hour crisis hotline, advocacy, education and youth prevention programs specifically targeting dating violence, bullying, stalking, domestic violence and sexual assault.

CRISIS INTERVENTION & Survivor Support

No One Should Suffer Alone

Our hotline is often the first point of contact for survivors in their moments of crisis, and the vital role it plays cannot be overstated.

In the last year, our dedicated staff and volunteer team fielded more than 3,000 calls, offering immediate support, guidance and a listening ear to those in need. Staff advocates provided crisis intervention support services to 588 families, including 609 children. The team also helped provide safe shelter to 24 families fleeing violence.



These statistics represent not just numbers but lives forever changed and futures potentially saved. The hotline remains the lifeline for survivors, providing safety, empowerment and hope in the face of danger and despair.

We Stand With Survivors

In addition to managing a 24-hour crisis hotline, The Bridge advocates work with survivors to regain control after experiencing the trauma of domestic violence and sexual assault. These professionals provide a wide range of crucial services including emotional support, safety planning and guide survivors through the criminal justice process helping to file reports and protection orders. Our staff is not only a source of comfort but also champions for survivor's rights and well-being, ensuring that their voices are heard and their choices respected.



Celebrating Their Remarkable Work

Our dedicated team of 41 volunteers collectively contributed more than 9,000 hours of invaluable services. Volunteers are the unsung heroes of our organization, providing hope, support and advocacy to survivors during their most vulnerable moments.

This year, we chose to highlight a volunteer whose commitment has truly stood out. She exemplifies the power of compassion, resilience a dedication to making our community a safer place.

Meet Margarita Flores

For nearly ten years, Margarita served as The Bridge's Spanish Services Coordinator before she transitioned to another position in education. But she wanted to still contribute to The Bridge's mission, and so began her volunteer journey.



Since serving as a volunteer, Margarita's impact has been nothing short of extraordinary. Over the past three

years, she has consistently demonstrated her deep empathy and determination to make a difference in the lives of survivors as a bilingual crisis-line operator.

YOUTH PREVENTION & Education Initiatives

Empowering Communities & Schools

At the heart of our mission at The Bridge is a commitment to not only respond to crises but also to proactively prevent and educate against domestic violence and sexual assault. Over the past year, we have undertaken an array of initiatives and renewed partnerships to empower our communities and schools with knowledge, resources and tools to build a safer, more informed environment.

Last year, we reached more than 4,000 students in our local area. These programs, delivered by our experienced educator, Stacey Lichtenberg, have fostered important conversations and provided young minds with the tools to identify abusive behaviors, the effects of violence and the roles we all have in preventing it.

The Bridge also collaborates with community organizations and government entities. By sharing our expertise in domestic violence and sexual assault, we equip these groups with the knowledge and tools needed to recognize the signs of abuse, provide assistance and create a supportive environment for survivors.

Strengthening Partnerships

In a significant step this year, The Bridge presented prevention training to several key Saunders County agencies including victim advocates, attorneys and law enforcement. Training initiatives like these help promote a cohesive and informed community response, ensuring survivors receive the comprehensive support they deserve.

Through the power of education, prevention and community involvement, we are forging a path toward a future free from domestic violence and sexual assault and where everyone can live free from fear.

Shaping Change

Youth prevention education programs play a pivotal role in preventing domestic violence and sexual assault in our communities. By educating the next generation about the principals of healthy relationships, consent and respectful communication, we instill values and knowledge necessary to recognize and prevent bullying, dating abuse and violence.

Not only do these programs break the cycle of violence by addressing the root causes but they also foster a culture of respect, empathy and support that extends far beyond the classroom.

Ultimately, youth prevention programs are an investment in building safer, more inclusive communities where individuals can thrive free from the threats of abuse.

In the stillness of the night, when the world seemed to fade into darkness, a survivor found the strength to escape the grip of domestic violence and embark on a courageous journey toward healing and self-discovery.

Today, she serves as an inspiration to all survivors, and her children as an embodiment of the incredible resilience that can be found within those who have faced unimaginable challenges.

Her story began when she hired a man to train her dog. She was 24 years old and he was ten years older. Looking back, there were several red flags but he said all the things a young woman would want to hear, and he was very persuasive.

"We moved in together and before long, I was pregnant. That's when he first hit me."

Over the next 28 years, his violence escalated and included every kind of abuse, physical, sexual, verbal, mental and emotional. He kicked, punched, choked and broke her nose. He routinely threatened her, called her names and forced her into sexual situations that made her uncomfortable.

"I desperately wanted out. I tried to get away but I had nowhere to go."

She used to work a full-time job early in the relationship, but he insisted she stay home. By that time, she cared for their three young daughters and suddenly found herself isolated at home, unable to support her family on her own and terrified of losing custody of her children.

So she stayed, enduring abuse and trauma for years thinking it was the only way to protect her family. She begged him for a divorce. His response was more threats and violence. Either choice, to stay or leave, she was risking her life.

The night she called the police, he was arrested and charged for making terroristic threats. But after a couple of days, he bonded out of jail and she was preparing for the worst. So she forwarded the detective on the case a phone recordings of his threats. The detective called her back to apologize, he never should have been able to get out of jail. He was arrested the next day and served three and half years in jail.

"It's one thing to read about it in a report but after listening to bis threats, the detective was mortified at bow extremely disturbing and violent be was."

She shares her story in the hope that it will bring awareness to the tragic epidemic of domestic violence. Her message to survivors is simple but powerful,

"Domestic violence thrives on secrecy and silence."

Finding her advocate, the team at The Bridge, helped her take the first steps on a transformative journey from violence to hope; from victim to survivor. Today, she stands as a beacon of hope for other survivors. Her journey is a reminder that every survivor has the potential for a brighter, more hopeful future. With courage and resilience, they can rewrite their stories and find the strength to heal, grow and thrive.



We take great care to maximize the impact of every dollar we receive, ensuring that our financial stewardship reflects the trust placed in us by our dedicated supporters, donors and communities we serve.

Our commitment to fiscal responsibility allows us to sustain and expand our efforts in advocating for a world free from violence and abuse, and we remain deeply appreciative of the collective support that makes this mission possible.


