One step at a time. One step at a time through the darker and more challenging moments of our own lives. One step at a time through the darkest and most challenging moments of Jesus's life. If in Lent we walk with Jesus in the desert, in Holy Week we follow him through his last days. The entry into Jerusalem. The last supper. The crucifixion. The burial.

We'll hear one version of this story on Palm Sunday. A few days later, beginning on Maundy Thursday, we'll walk through it more slowly and prayerfully: one day at a time. And then, on the Friday and Saturday of Holy Week, we'll follow Jesus's last hours one **step** at a time, walking the Way of the Cross.

It's been some time since Trinity's done any version of the "Stations of the Cross." In this mini-pilgrimage, 14 stations are set up around the church, each focusing on a particular moment from Jesus 's last hours. Participants step from one to another, stopping at each to remember Jesus's experience and connect it to their own. This immersion in the Gospel story is a timehonored way to mark Holy Week and to prepare our hearts for the astonishing joy of Easter morning.

Walking the Way of the Cross

The Way of the Cross is designed as a self-guided, interactive walk through Jesus's last day. You are welcome to attend at any of the posted times and take as long as you want.

Each station will include an image, a reading from scripture, a prayer, and a reflective, hands-on activity. These activities are designed to provoke a state of mind that is both meditative and emotional. It will be particularly appropriate preparation for the Good Friday service on March 29 at 7:00. But if you can't make it on Friday, we hope you'll come by on Saturday morning.

We're using the "Scriptural Stations of the Cross," meaning that we are observing only events described in the Gospels. The Episcopal Church refers to this service as the "Way of the Cross," and we have built on this theme in the prayers we have chosen. We are excited to share this experience of walking the Way of the Cross and hope to see many of you in the sanctuary!

Easter Sunday is such a special day. The church is filled with joy as the excitement builds. God's table is dressed in white with lilies and lighted candles as accents. Music fills the air. I can just hear us all say, "Alleluia, he is Risen!"

Some years I have still set a big table and helped get a big Easter dinner. Those dinners were with friends from Trinity who helped serve My Brothers' Table on Easter Sunday. Maundy Thursday

This first service of Holy Week brings us into the room with Jesus and his disciples as they share their last supper together... the very first communion meal.

Our gospel reading reminds us that after the meal, Jesus washed his friends' feet, and told them to do the same. So anyone who chooses then comes forward to have their feet washed, and to wash someone else's. Others stay in the pews, and sing, and pray.

After communion, we don't leave. Instead, we "strip" the church, silently moving all the candles and linens to the sacristy until we're left in a bare space.

We return to the pews and the lights are turned off. In the bare, dark church we hear the story of Jesus praying in the Garden. We respond with some simple Taizé hymns. Then we leave, in silence, to return on Friday.

My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want.

Good Friday

On Good Friday, we remember Jesus's death on the cross. How much pain he endured on it. How much love brought him to it. How much hope it would come to hold for us.

You are invited to walk
The Way of the Cross
during any of these times:

Friday

11am - 2pm or 5pm - 7pm **Saturday** 10am - 2pm

It's a simple prayer service in a barren church. The stations for the Way of the Cross line the outer walls, but the altar linens, the candles, even the little statue of Mary are gone.

We read St. John's Passion Gospel. We pray for the church and the world. We sing. We contemplate the big wooden cross, now brought to the front of our altar. And we leave again, in silence, to return on Saturday.

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Easter Vigil

On this holy night, Jesus's tomb is still sealed. The disciples' grief is still shattering. Yet our vigil reminds us that God has always done marvelous things and always will: it invites us to nurture the hope in our hearts.

As the service begins, the new flame is brought in to the darkened church. It's our first glimpse of the light that Easter morning will bring. The cantor's voice soars. We hear stories of other times when God has brought hope out of despair, joy out of suffering. We sing. We remember our baptismal covenants and make those promises again. We pray.

If this were a midnight service, it would move on to all the joy and light of an Easter celebration. But our service is earlier, seeking us out in the middle of all our darkness and doubt. *Keep waiting*, it says. *Keep hoping*. *The light is coming*.

How blessed is this night, when heaven and earth are joined and man is reconciled to God.

Easter Morning

Welcome, happy morning!

At dawn the women come to the tomb... and the stone is rolled away... and the tomb is empty. They can't yet imagine what that means, but we can.

On Easter day, we tell that story. We celebrate its good news: Christ is risen!

In church, light pours in on the lilies in every window. Streamers wave from the rafters. The choir sings out in joy.

Don't forget:

Trinity's Easter Celebration starts at 9:00 am, an hour earlier than our usual Sunday services.

After the sermon, we add flowers to a cross, celebrating God's readiness to bring beauty and blessing out of pain. We share communion at God's holy table. And then we go back into the world, rejoicing in the one who was, and is, and is to come.

Christ is risen!
The Lord is risen indeed.

During Lent...

- Don't we usually use ceramic plates and cups for communion during Lent? Why are we using silver this year? Yes: we've often switched to pottery vessels during Lent. But this is the first year since Covid began that we've offered the common cup, and ceramicware doesn't have the same antiseptic properties that silver does. Since Covid's still very much around, silver seemed safest.
- *Food Drive*. Each Sunday during Lent, we're collecting food for My Brother's Table as part of the Feeding the 5,000 families campaign. Bring a box, a can, or a case; bring them in one week or every week!
- Learning to Walk in the Dark. Join us for book discussion, faith exploration, and worship in this 5-week Lenten Series. It's at 7pm each Thursday through March 21, in the Parish Hall.

People signed up to bake cookies and help deliver the bags the week of February 26th. Many of us helped fill the bags at coffee hour on February 25th. We have two projects in March. The first is filling 12 Easter bags with candy and trinkets for the children who attend church on Easter Sunday, March 31st. We have enough plastic eggs but we need wrapped Easter candy and little Easter trinkets for the bags that will be filled at the March 16th meeting.

The second project is a deep cleaning of the church kitchen at 9:00 on Saturday, March 16th. This includes cleaning the inside of all the cupboards and refrigerators, as well as scrubbing counters, stove tops, floor, etc. The drawers were recently cleaned by Angela Fults, so we can skip them. Bring buckets, rags, sponges and your rubber gloves if you use them. We need all the help we can get! The church will supply cleaning supplies.

We would like to thank Rev. Diane for the new large coffee pot. She reported to us that PWCC is still in need of 2024 calendars. If you have one you are not using please bring it to the church. She also needs people to make prayer beads. They all have to be alike so she will supply the materials needed and instruction.

Rita reminded us that we are collecting canned food (chili, tuna, fruit, vegetables) and starches (ramen, macaroni and cheese) for Feeding the 5000. All the food brought to Trinity stays here for My Brothers' Table. Sign-up sheets will be posted for the food drive at Ridleys the Saturday before Easter and baking cookies for the Progressive Dinner.

Our next meeting is March 16th beginning at 9:00 to clean the kitchen and make Easter bags. Coffee, juice and snacks will be served. Everyone is welcome, and the more hands we have the faster the work will go. Think of it as a Lenten offering of your time and talent. See you there.
