

# From Rev. Haydie

Happy May! It's a month full of celebrations, in church and out of it. May brings graduations and Mother's Day, Pentecost and Trinity Sunday.

Of these, Pentecost is the day the church gets most excited about. On May 19, we'll hear how the Holy Spirit whirled through the room where Jesus's friends and followers were praying together. How tongues of fire danced over their heads. How the believers found themselves able to speak in words they'd never known, words in which those around them heard them praising God.

It's the church's "birthday," we sometimes say. For weeks Jesus's followers had been huddling together, almost paralyzed, waiting for... they hardly knew what. In that moment, though, they suddenly understood. Their job was to share their experience of God's love and power with those around them. They started doing so, and the church has never stopped.

We often tell this story as if, in waiting for the Spirit, Jesus's followers had been waiting for something they didn't have. Even now, as a church, we often live our common life in the same way: waiting for God to nudge us, waiting for the Spirit to patiently walk us over to whatever we're supposed to do next.

I wonder, though, if we might want to think about those tongues of flame a little differently. And I find myself remembering a different shiny red image: Dorothy's ruby slippers in *The Wizard of Oz*. The ones that could have taken her home all along.

Like Dorothy, we often assume that what we need most is something we don't have. It's over the next hill or around the next corner. It's something we'll need to ask for, or something we'll need to work for. At the end of the 1939 movie, however, Dorothy learns that none of those things are true. (cont.)

She just needs to focus on her deepest truth... and to get her heels moving.

I wonder if Jesus's followers had a similar realization on that first Pentecost Day. Wind ignites flame, yes. We know this; most of us have blown on coals to get a reluctant fire going. But the coals have to be there! And there has to be fire... which requires air... already inside them.

I think Jesus's disciples already had what they needed, just as Dorothy did. That day in Jerusalem, the Spirit stirred among them to help them recognize that. They'd known Jesus. They'd seen him work miracles when he was alive, and they'd seen even more astonishing things after his death. They knew a lot about God's love and power.

On Pentecost, the Spirit reminds us that we know it, too. That it's our job to share what we know with those around us, and to get our heels moving. So if you've got a pair of ruby slippers, by all means wear them on Pentecost! Wearing something red is traditional, after all. It's a reminder that the Spirit is with us yesterday, and today, and forever. That God's kingdom is our home, and there's no place like it.

## Why do we...

Have that big candle standing next to the pulpit? It's called the Paschal Candle ("Paschal" means related to Easter or Passover). It burns at all services from Easter through Pentecost and is also lit at baptisms and funerals, representing new life in Christ. When not in use, it stands behind the last pew on the pulpit side of the church, not far from the baptismal font.

Each year at the Easter Vigil, the Paschal candle is lit from the new fire. It is carried up the center aisle in darkness as the cantor sings "The light of Christ," and the people respond, "Thanks be to God." Worshippers light their own handheld candles from its flame, symbolizing the spreading of Christ's light of Christ into the church and the world.

## Episcopal Church Weavers (ECW)


