Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

We are in the middle of the season of Lent, but before we know it we will be entering Holy Week and then celebrating Easter. Last month I had my eighth grade New Testament classes do a quadriga on Mark 16. A quadriga is an ancient practice of looking at a passage of scripture and asking four different questions of the text. One of the questions to be asked is, "What is the Church to believe?" The most important answer to this question in Mark 16 is that we are to believe that Jesus rose from the dead. Some of my students missed this important point. One of the young ladies did a great job of picking up on this point and wrote, "We are to believe that Jesus rose again. This is the pinnacle of our religion and is the most important belief." She is exactly right.

Some have argued that the greatest proof of Jesus' resurrection is the existence of the Church. If there had been no resurrection the Christian Faith would not exist and there would be no Church. In the first century this argument was not needed because they had eyewitnesses whose personal testimonies were proof that Jesus had risen from the dead.

Paul tells the Corinthians in 1 Corinthians 15, "I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15:3-4).

Paul then gives a list of those who were eyewitnesses to Jesus' resurrection. Jesus appeared

to "Cephas," that is Peter, and then to the twelve. Paul then tells us that Jesus appeared to more than five hundred people at one time. This is an event that the gospel writers do not record. Some have conjectured that it was at the Ascension. The problem with this hypothesis is that if Paul's list is chronological, this event would have had to have happened before the Ascension. Paul mentioned that most of these people were still alive. Paul was writing this sometime between 53 and 55 A.D., roughly 23-25 years after Jesus' resurrection. Paul goes on to tell us that Jesus appeared to James (probably the half-brother of Jesus) and then to all the apostles. Then he tells us, "Last of all, as to one untimely born, He appeared also to me" (1 Corinthians 15:8).

In a court of law, two eyewitnesses were what was required. In 54 A.D. there were more than enough witnesses to prove the fact that Jesus had been raised from the dead. Paul goes on to make a case for the importance of Jesus' resurrection. Its importance cannot be over-stressed. "If Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:14). "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied" (1 Corinthians 15:17-19).

Fortunately for us, "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Corinthians 15:20).

Jesus' resurrection is thus of utmost importance because if Jesus had not been raised from the dead His death would have been a monumental tragedy, a travesty of justice. But the fact that Jesus was raised from the dead is proof that Jesus is whom He said He was, that His death was an atoning sacrifice for our sins, and that He has conquered death. In Jesus' resurrection is the hope of our resurrection. "Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting" (1 Corinthians 15:54-55).

During the Lenten Season let us not forget what is coming, the celebration of the resurrection. And as we celebrate Easter let us remember the absolute necessity of Jesus' resurrection for our faith.

Meet Our St. Stephen's Family Patsy Kuhn

Patsy was born and grew up here in Oklahoma City. Her parents were Dr. John (Jack) Kuhn, an OB, Gyn physician, and Agnes Adair Kuhn. Her older brother Fred, now retired, lives in Savanah, Georgia, was an ENT doctor. Her sister Sarah was the second sibling, she is now deceased and was a St. Stephen's member. Our own Jaquelyn is the youngest of the siblings.

Patsy has one adopted son, Jacob, born in 1986. In the 1980's, Patsy felt "called to be a parent". After an extensive search for a child, while on a mission trip to the Yucatan region of Mexico, God answered her prayers. She periodically visited there where she worked with a Presbyterian minister named Sixto Castillo. He was involved in arranging adoptions for children in need of a permanent home. He introduced Patsy to a precious tiny baby boy, and helped to facilitate the adoption. Jacob and Patsy were all part of God's plan for both their lives. She is blessed by Jacob, and a grandson Mason (11).

Patsy currently resides in her home in NW Oklahoma City with nieces Anna and Holly (also part of our St. Stephen's family). She has many other relatives, but maintains close touch with cousins: Steve in Harrah, Mike in Edmond, Kitty in Vinita, and Dorothy in McAlister.

After graduating from Harding High School in 1964, Patsy went to OSU, and graduated with a B. S. degree in elementary education in 1968. She studied the Montessori Method of education at OCU. Later in 1992 she received a master's degree in early childhood education from UCO.

Her first job in 1968 was teaching 2nd grade at Parker Elementary in Oklahoma City. In 1970 Patsy and her sister Sarah founded Pathways Child Development Centers and served as co-directors. Sarah later moved to Colorado and Patsy became the sole director. The original facility was opened in the Dunger Oklahoma City housing project. At the request of the Oklahoma City Housing Authority, they planned a school at 36th and Kelly, but the building was burned down twice. They went on to establish other school locations at the Zachary Taylor School, Epworth Methodist Church and St. Andrews Church.

After 22 years at Pathways, Patsy took a new job as Resource Coordinator for the Oklahoma State Department of Education; she stayed there for five and half years. After she received her master's degree, she went to work for Rose State College as the Child Development Lab Center director. As part of this job she taught child development courses to childcare workers.

At 65, Patsy retired after many years dedicated to the children and families of our community. "God calls us to live for ideas bigger than ourselves and to invest in things bigger than ourselves. And if we do, we bring lasting change and hope to the world."

Throughout her life music has always been dear to her heart. Patsy was a majorette in high school, and since her childhood she has loved vocal music, participating in choir. She has performed singing with the Oklahoma City Symphany Orchestra. Once on a choir trip abroad she sang at the Vatican. She considers singing a "valuable part of worship"; and is heartbroken that since she suffered a stroke, she is no longer able to sing.

Patsy's favorite Bible verse is Romans 8:38-39 "For I am convinced that neither death, not life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jeus our Lord."

Some of Patsy's favorite everyday activities include spending time with Jacob and her grandson, gathering with six other neighbors on her neighbor's porch, swimming and water exercises, Women's Fellowship, and volunteering at the Civic Center.

Patsy has traveled extensively abroad to Germany, Italy, England, France, Egypt, Lebanon, Israel, and the middle east. She has visited Mexico, Florida, Canada, California, New England, just to name a few.

For 55 years Patsy has been a member of the P.E.O. sorority, promoting women's education and providing financial assistance for female students.

Patsy, her brother and her parents were charter members of St. Stephen's. She helped with renovations of our first church building on Military Road in Britton. Patsy has been ordained both as deacon and elder, serving multiple times and she was a member of the choir for many years. Her list of accomplishments and contributions to St. Stephen's are impressive and numerous including: organizing a church art festival, teaching pre-school and Sunday school, serving as president of the Women's Fellowship, and volunteering for vacation Bible school. She loves the "family, spirit-filled" people at our church who "accept people for who they are". She believes Pastor Mark is a "gift from God".

Patsy served as a board member for LOGAS, youth conference held in Estes Park, Colorado and

she filled the role of Dean of Women at the conference many times.

Patsy's life has been blessed by "heroes"! Her #1 hero is son Jacob, a "smart, kind hearted young man" who she says, "has taken such good care of me". Others are her dear friend Harriet, who was by her side when she suffered a stroke while vacationing in Maine; Pastor Sixto Castillo who helped to find Jacob, and facilitate the adopting; and Holly who rescued her last spring during a seizure event.

Patsy says, "As I mature in my faith, I walk the path God has for me". I especially feel blessed "God gave me the responsibility to guide Jacob in the faith." When speaking of her life events and crisis's she says, "God had a hand in it all." She is a "prayer warrior" believing in the power of prayer, she is always ready to accept other's prayer requests!

A life led by faith, Patsy is an example of dedication to a better life for children and families, to her own family, to her church, and first and foremost to her Lord.

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OUR FEEBLE PRAYERS, OUR FATHER'S RESPONSE

In He Still Moves Stones, Max Lucado recalls the story of Derek Redmond, a 1992 Olympic competitor in the 400-meter race. Halfway through Redmond's semifinal run, a torn hamstring sent him tumbling to the ground. His dad, Jim, immediately ran onto the track. He met up with Derek, who, though crying, had managed to stand and was hopping forward. "You don't have to do this," Jim said. But Derek insisted. "Well, then, we're going to finish this together," said Jim, who supported his son as

he hobbled to the finish line. The crowd cheered and wept as Derek, with Dad's assistance, finished the race.

Lucado writes: "What made the father do it? ... Was it the strength of his child? No, it was the pain of his child. ... God does the same. Our prayers may be awkward. Our attempts may be feeble. But since the power of prayer is in the One who hears it and not in the one who says it, our prayers do make a difference."







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
