Father Gabriel's Reflection for the 5th Sunday Yr B

Beloved Parish Family of St. Anselm

Health care and the onset of debilitating illness are crucial issues to us– a concern of the readings for this weekend. Job laments his endless suffering and sleepless nights. In the Gospel reading, Jesus continues to enter the world of the sick and suffering with healing touches and words. His presence brings healing just as it brought the man with unclean spirits in the Synagogue last Sunday.

In the first reading, we encounter Job, a prosperous and happy man. Suddenly, he lost everything; hostile tribes destroyed his cattle and his workers. His house collapsed and killed his children who were gathered for a meal all at once. Soon after, Job's health began to deteriorate, and his skin was covered with sores. When this book was written, God's people believed that if one is good, all will go well, and if not, all kinds of terrible things will happen to you. As a faithful Jew, Job struggled to figure out why he had to suffer even as a good man.

The Gospel reading narrates in compact form the healing of Simon's mother-in-law. Jesus grasps her hand, and helps her up. The fever leaves, and immediately, she begins to serve them (wait on them). At the heart of this narrative is a strong indication that the healing power of Jesus can be a liberation, leading to more excellent service to others.

Like Job, many of us continue to experience pain and challenges in our daily lives. Jesus intervenes to bring us spiritual and physical solace, inviting us all to bring his liberating presence to those in need. Like the crowds pressing in and bringing their sick for healing, our nation and cities are filled with people seeking help and solutions to all problems.

As Catholics, Jesus continues to bring his healing and liberating presence to us through the sacraments, the scriptures, visits to the Blessed Sacrament, and personal prayer. As we receive healing and strength from God in our challenges, like Peter's mother-in-law, Jesus equally expects us to be his presence in the lives of others: the sick, the lonely, the aged, orphans, the poor, the homeless, the stranger and alien, those who grieve. People should be able to see us and remark like the guy cured of evil spirits in the Synagogue: I know who you are!

Notice how Jesus would withdraw to a deserted place by himself in prayer. Our source of strength and inspiration to carry out the mission of bringing salvation and help to others will always be contact with Jesus himself in our private prayer.

In a world filled with so much noise and confusing voices, we need quiet moments with God to discern his will for us. In the week ahead, let us commit to maintaining some good silence when we come to Church to be well-focused in prayer. Amen.


