### Fr. Gabriel's Reflection for the 4th Sunday of Lent Yr B

Beloved Parish Family of St Anselm,

This Fourth Sunday of Lent, traditionally known as "Laetare Sunday," is permeated with a joy which, to some extent, attenuates the penitential atmosphere of this holy season: "Rejoice Jerusalem!" the Church says in the Entrance Antiphon. We spontaneously ask ourselves: but why should we rejoice? While the approaching Easter gives us a foretaste of the joy of the encounter with the Risen Christ, the most profound reason lies in the biblical readings, which remind us that despite our unworthiness, God's infinite mercy is destined for us.

To demonstrate this truth, our reading from the book of Chronicles gives us a summary of over seven centuries of infidelities on the part of God's people to their covenant, which led to the destruction of their temple and the people being exiled. However, the Lord, demonstrating the absolute primacy of his initiative over every purely human effort, used a pagan, King Cyrus of Persia, to set Israel free.

Our gospel comes from the third chapter of St. John, beginning with Nicodemus coming to talk with Jesus. We only hear about Nicodemus from St. John about three times. He was a Pharisee and a Jewish religious leader, which means he was one of the 71 members of the Sanhedrin, the supreme ruling council of the Jews. John tells us Nicodemus came to Jesus *at night*: (1) Practically, he was avoiding the possibility of being seen associating with this preacher from Nazareth by any of his peers who were hostile to Jesus (2) John symbolically implies that Nicodemus came from the *darkness* to Jesus, who is the *light*.

John uses light and darkness throughout his gospel to symbolize truth vs error and grace vs sin. John employs this same symbolism after Judas betrays Jesus. Judas left the upper room at the Last Supper, and John said it was night once he went out. In effect, he left Jesus the light into darkness. Thus, repeatedly, Jesus would tell his disciples, you, and me, to be the light of the world. Lent invites us to bring light into our families. Lent invites us to bring light to the kinds of conversations that go on in our offices, gatherings, and neighborhoods.

Lastly, Jesus goes on to say that his death and resurrection are the basis of the spiritual life to be revealed by him. The word "raised" in John is taken from an event from the book of Numbers, where the Jews encountered a nest of poisonous snakes on their journey through the desert. Many were bitten with a painful bite and died. God, however, told Moses to make a bronze serpent and "raise it" on a pole, and all who looked upon it were healed and saved. Thus, God "raises" his son Jesus for us to look up to in all our pains.

We can, however, choose to approach the "light"- Jesus or remain in the darkness of sin. We can "look up" to Jesus as our guide in our choices or insist on having it our way. Only in the light of Jesus can we "raise" the so many around us who are bitten by the various poisonous conditions of life: Poverty, racism, loneliness, homelessness, abuse, ill health, family crisis, betrayals, and discrimination.
