

BAPTISMS are generally administered on Easter Eve, Pentecost, All Saints' Sunday and the first Sunday after Epiphany. Pre-baptism classes are scheduled and held seasonally. A person of any age may receive the sacrament of Holy Baptism. The application form for baptismal candidates is available online under the WORSHIP tab. Next Baptism Date: Holy Saturday, April 11, 2020, at 4:00 p.m.

THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE requires a minimum of 90 days notice to our office and requires premarital counseling. An initial conference with the clergy should be scheduled by the couple to review the process and any special circumstances before commitments may be made. Please contact Jo Wood to schedule.

FUNERAL OR MEMORIAL SERVICES for communicants of the parish are customarily held in the church and may include the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

from the Rector

Just over two years ago, we gathered as a church and school community to dream about the future and to draft a new vision statement that would provide a clear focus and direction for our common life. As we prayed and discerned together, one thing became clear: God was calling us to more intentionally reach out to our community, to be a spiritual and educational resource, and to radiate God's unconditional love in everything we



do. Since completing our strategic plan, we have been seeking to live out God's calling and to cultivate new ways to share God's love with our families, neighborhoods, and communities.

The theme for this issue of *Tidings* is *radiate*. This word, of course, is an important part of our vision statement, so I thought it might be helpful to reflect more deeply on what precisely we mean when we talk about *radiating God's unconditional love*. The word *radiate* means "to spread abroad as if from a center." In terms of our spiritual lives, our *center* is Jesus Christ, who is our source of abundant and eternal life. But in terms of our shared ministry, our *center* is the community of prayer and belonging of which we are a part. We gather every Sunday to reconnect with Jesus, the *center* of our spiritual life, but we also gather to reconnect with our community, the *center* of our shared mission and ministry.

At the conclusion of every worship service, we ask God to "send us into the world in peace;" we pray that God would "grant us strength and courage" to go forth to share the love and light of Jesus. To *radiate* God's love means that we allow our lives to *move outward* from our spiritual *center* (Jesus) as well as our communal *center* (the life we share together as God's people). Just as a ray of light moves outward from its source, we are called to move outward to share God's unconditional love and to show forth God's mercy. This edition of *Tidings* will include articles, and stories about the ways in which we are already answering this call to move outward as well as future opportunities to share God's love in our community. May God's Holy Spirit continue to inspire, empower, and direct us in all we do!

Jesus Said, "Go!"

The Great Commission and Our Call to be Radiant

ccording to Matthew's gospel account, after his resurrection, lesus assembled his disciples on a mountain in Galilee. The last recorded words of Jesus to his disciples in Matthew's gospel are in the form of a commissioning, a sending forth into the world. Jesus said, "All authority in heaven and earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations." This is the moment when the disciples become apostles. A disciple is one who learns from and follows a teacher or mentor. An apostle literally means one who is sent with a commission. The small band of followers who had answered the call become Jesus' disciples were now commissioned to be apostles. The ones who had learned at the feet of Jesus were now the ones sent to be bearers of God's love and grace in the

world. However, in order to fully grasp the transformational power of this "great commission" from Jesus, we have to understand how God's mission is described in other parts of the Bible.

Centripetal Mission: Come!

In the Old Testament, God called the people of Israel to a special vocation. Israel was set apart as "a light to the nations" (Isaiah 49:6) and all the nations of the earth were called to come to that light – to come to Zion, the mountain of the Lord. Israel was described as the center of God's purposes and all nations were drawn into that center. This movement *into the center* is referred to by biblical scholars as *centripetal mission*. Jesus himself talks about this form of mission in the gospel of Matthew when he says, "You are the light of the world

- a city on a hill." A city, of course, doesn't move. It doesn't go anywhere. But rather, travelers come into the city. Jesus is describing a form of mission that moves from the outside in. For much of the church's history, we have relied on centripetal mission. We have built churches, started programs, organized ministries, and assumed that people would come walking through our doors. For decades, this model was sufficient. Throughout the middle part of the twentieth century, this model of mission worked just fine. But after his resurrection, Jesus empowered his disciples for a new form of mission, a form of mission that moved from the inside out. Jesus commissioned his apostles to "go!"


Centrifugal Mission: Go!

The "great commission" was only possible, because the first disciples had an experience of God's power and presence in their lives. For the first disciples, something life-changing happened in the city of Jerusalem. Their teacher, their master, and their Lord had been crucified and buried. All seemed lost. Death appeared to have won. Darkness seemed to have conquered. Yet, on that first Easter morning, the followers of Jesus discovered an empty tomb. They heard the proclamation of the angel, "He is not here; he is risen!" The experience of the resurrection compelled the first followers of Jesus to go to go into all the world to share good news, to promote justice, to seek healing, to cultivate reconciliation, and proclaim that the kingdom of God had come near. This new form of mission is what scholars call centrifugal mission - the movement outward from the center. In the book of Acts, Jesus defines the scope of this mission when he says to his disciples, "you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). The movement of mission begins right where you are, but then moves outward to the surrounding region, to your neighborhood and community. What's interesting is that lesus includes Samaria. For the lewish people in the first century, the Samaritans were viewed as outcasts who were not to be trusted. Yet, the apostles are sent to the margins of their society. They are sent to their enemies. They are sent to the ends of the earth!

Being Radiant

Our call to radiate God's love encompasses both facets of God's mission. As with the people of Israel, we are called to be a light, a city built upon a hill. Our congregations are called to be places of love, justice, and hope – places toward which people are drawn and welcomed. Yet, as with first followers of Jesus, we also are called to go - to be God's "light-bearers" in the world, to take the good news of God's love to neighborhoods and communities, to go to the margins and perhaps even to our enemies. This is our call. This our mission. This is our purpose. To radiate God's unconditional love for everyone, everywhere – even to the ends of the earth.

Good Shepherd Youth Group participates in annual mission trips, pilgrimages, service projects, and community events. It is an example of ministry actively radiating God's love in the community.

Good Shepherd School radiates their God story every day: They Believe Out Loud

The quarterly theme of Radiance can easily be applied to the culture of the school. The minds of our students and staff are open to the acceptance of knowledge, love, and community outreach. These three areas of focus help to develop our students and staff into active participants who live by example and radiate God's love everywhere they go. One must believe fiercely in something with one's inner-being and heart before one can "BELIEVE OUT LOUD." We at Good Shepherd Episcopal School do just that!

Philanthropy was a cornerstone for the school throughout the holiday season. Our newest mission was spearheaded by Molly Daniels and involved a new relationship between our school and Jupiter Elementary. Taking this low-economic ESOL population under our wing, gifts were given as the first of many exchanges, beginning what we hope will be a warm relationship that will fulfill needs between both groups of students. In addition, we continued our work with Cross Ministries, the Pennies Fashion Show, the Outreach & Missions Committee and The Warfield School to provide services as needed. There is no better way to spread God's word than through our actions and BELIEVEING OUT LOUD.

The Annual Report and the State of the School Address both serve as a perfect platform to emphasize the wonderful work being done at the School. This past year showed positive changes in security, technology and curriculum, all while keeping a balanced budget with a surplus. But it is the future of the school that shines the brightest and creates the desire to BELIEVE OUT LOUD!

As we continue to move in the direction of Good Shepherd Episcopal School Academy of Arts and Sciences, we have refurbished our science lab which is now ready to open with a dedicated STEAM science educator beginning in August. (Until that time the classroom teachers will use the lab for science lessons). Our Arts program will expand to include a Band Class and a beginning instrumentation program. Gifted services will be added for qualifying students and an



additional class of Early Learners will be added to the south hallway. These are just some of the highlights that are in place for the next school year.

The Strategic Plan continues to be our compass on our journey as we once again begin the tedious process of Florida Council of Independent Schools (FCIS) accreditation. Next year we will review and evaluate our school program through self-study, readying our campus for an evaluation visit by a team of educators from across the state. Of course this happens at the same time as the Master Plan is put into effect and the next five-year Strategic Plan goes to the drawing board. Needless to say, the immediate future at Good Shepherd Episcopal School will be a busy one as we share the many wonderful happenings of our school and we BELIEVE OUT LOUD for all to read and see!

TRY THIS

A great exercise during this Lenten season is to write out your God story as if you were going to tell it to someone you just met. Here are some of the questions I used to help write my "God Story". Maybe they will be helpful for you as well.

My Life Before Christ

What about my life before Christ will relate most to the non-Christians I know? What did my life revolve around? Where did I get my security, identity or happiness? How did those things begin to let me down?

How I Came to Christ

When was the first time I heard the gospel? What were my initial reactions? When and why did my perspective of Christ begin to change? What were the final thoughts and struggles that went through my mind just before I acknowledged Christ as Savior? Why did I finally decide to give Christ complete control of my life?

My Life After Coming to Christ

How is my life different now? What are some specific changes in my character, attitude and perspective on life? What motivates me now? What do I live for? Even though my life still isn't perfect, how does knowing Christ help me deal with that fact?

What's Your God Story?

Which is the most difficult era of human life? Is it infancy? Adolescence? Mature adulthood? Agedness? How you might answer probably depends upon where you are at the moment. While many might suggest that one's sunset years are the hardest, my experience working with youth leads me to say the period designated as youth might be the most challenging.

Youth is a frustrating time in life. It is that period when one is hardly old enough to be on their own, and yet they are feeling a sense of independence. Youth are always attempting to find some sense of identity. That is why they sometimes act and dress so weird. They are bizarre!

But then, so were we.

Youth is difficult, there is no doubt about it. Especially in today's volatile environment. Trying to balance life as a student, perhaps an employee and an active participant in social or sport activities can be demanding. Striving to be all things can leave our youth feeling confused and overwhelmed.

When you think about it, the Bible is filled with stories about everyday people, many who were young and facing similar struggles with identity and purpose. These stories, God stories, demonstrate how God takes people who are very ordinary and inspires them to live a life that is extraordinary. They are stories that convey how our life journey follows the one God has planned for us, a God story. At a very pivotal moment in the gospels Jesus asks his disciples a question that is really a question that Jesus asks all of us; "Who do you say I am?"

While meditating on my own "God Story", and how I might answer someone who asks me the question, "Who is Jesus?"; or, "Why are you a Christian?", I was reminded of a passage in I Peter that states, "If someone asks about your hope as a believer, always be ready to explain it. But do this in a gentle and respectful way" (I Peter 3:15-16, NLT). As I began to reflect back on my life with Christ, my journey through the years, a few questions came to mind. What was my life like before Christ? How did I come to Christ?

How has my life been since coming to Christ? These questions help to direct my own God story—a meaningful Lenten practice.

In 2019, Good Shepherd became a member the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes, otherwise known as CEEP. The mission of CEEP is "to celebrate, inspire and equip its member parishes, seminaries, and other Episcopal institutions for effective leadership, stewardship and transformation in the church and in the world." For the past two years, a team from Good Shepherd has



attended the Annual Gathering of CEEP. This event gathers leaders from around the Episcopal Church for training and education. It is also a time for leaders to share resources and ideas related to congregational growth and development. This year the conference was attended by Fr. Doug along with our Parish Administrator, Merike Seely; our Giving Team Chairperson, Patti Hamilton; and Investment Committee member, Teresa Grashof.

Two New Formation Design Teams

We are all called to growth in our faith. We are all called to deepen our commitment as followers of Jesus. We are all called to more fully activate the spiritual gifts God has entrusted to us. To do this, it is imperative that we are engaged in ongoing formation, study, and spiritual development. This might take the form of a weekly Bible study, a prayer gathering, a book study group, or any other intentional form of spiritual practice.

As part of phase two of our strategic plan, we are working to develop and implement additional opportunities for intergenerational spiritual formation and Christian education. To facilitate this important work, we have developed two new design teams that will be charged with the task of generating new and creative ideas for Christian formation, and then developing a plan to implement these new ideas by the Fall of this year.

Youth and Family Ministry Design Team

Under the direction of our Youth and Family Minister, David Dixon, this group is in the process of assessing the needs of our children, youth, and families, and developing new strategies to grow and develop these important ministries.

Adult Formation Design Team

Fr. Doug has gathered a team of leaders who will be developing new ideas for Bible study and Christian formation. This coming Fall, we hope to be able to offer additional education and formation opportunities on Sunday mornings and weekday evenings.

Outreach & Missions: Radiating God's Love

"We are called to radiate God's love.....to everyone, everywhere." Outreach & Mission doesn't reach "everyone, everywhere," but it's not for lack of trying! The holiday season saw us reaching out to our community through a wide variety of programs. In gratitude for God's great and unexpected gift to us of His Son, our Savior, we asked members of our Good Shepherd community to do "unexpected acts of kindness" for someone else as their Advent gift. The response was heartening, as members of our parish reached out to the lonely or the grieving, gave generously to the homeless and needy, helped strangers in a grocery store or on the roadside, and touched uncounted lives.

But we didn't stop there: we had three other projects going at the same time! Our SAMS missionary, Ana Reid, was preparing for a mission trip to Honduras, and Pennies for Heaven pitched in to provide clothing and sporting goods for the community it serves. Closer to home, Pennies for Heaven and Good Shepherd School, along with other generous donors, provided clothing - especially pants and underwear - for the children at the Warfield School in Indiantown. And Good Shepherd School, under the guidance of their Outreach Coordinator, Molly Daniels, organized a Giving Tree! Molly's pre-K class adopted a class at Jupiter Elementary School, and the project soon spread to involve all of Good Shepherd School as well as members of our parish, making it possible to provide Christmas gifts for many children who might otherwise receive nothing. Plans are already underway to make this an annual project, involving BOTH School and Church.

As we entered the New Year, our major focus was on mobilizing support for our annual Food Packing event for Haiti. On February I, 2020, over 50 members of the Good Shepherd community traveled to St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Palm Beach Gardens where they helped to pack more than 75,000 meals for our sister parish in Bondeau, Haiti. Next year it will be our turn to host, and we look forward to having this event back at Good Shepherd in 2021! Also in February, we conducted our annual Hygiene Kit drive for the Warfield School. Every year we assemble Ziploc bags of toiletries - toothbrushes and toothpaste, soaps, shampoo, combs, and other items - which are distributed as needed by the school nurses, who also use these items to teach the children about good hygiene practices.

And now we are in Lent! Working closely with Episcopal Charities, the Diocese of Southeast Florida, and Bishop Boyd in the Bahamas, we will be partnering with an Episcopal parish in the Bahamas and aiding them in their long-term recovery from Hurricane Dorian. In late January, Mike Grashof from Good Shepherd joined with a team from Episcopal Charities to make an exploratory trip to St. Ann's Parish in Green Turtle Cay and Treasure Cay. The Parish is comprised of five churches, two of which - St. Peter's on Green Turtle Cay and St. Simon's by the Sea on Treasure Cay - were badly damaged in the storm. Cleanup is still

underway, and there is no electricity or water. As Bishop Boyd and Fr. Ward, the Rector of the Parish, identify their needs and goals, we will be assembling teams to join them in their recovery efforts. Please watch your bulletin and upcoming announcements about a plan to help in Lent.
