FUNERAL OR MEMORIAL SERVICES for communicants of the parish are customarily held in the church and may include the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.





The season of Advent is a time of expectation and waiting. Each year, we encounter the same cast of biblical characters, including John the Baptist. Originally, Advent was focused on the second coming of Jesus in power and glory, not his first coming as a human being. The ministry of John the Baptist can help us understand these two dimensions of Advent and how the celebration of Christmas is more than just the adoration of a baby in a creche, but the declaration that Jesus has come and will come again. **Begins December 4**<sup>th</sup>

#### Windows into the Kingdom

A Six-Week Study of the Parables of Jesus

Throughout his earthly ministry, Jesus frequently taught using parables, which often have been defined as "earthly stories with heavenly meanings." Some of the most famous parables of Jesus are found only in Luke's gospel. This six-week study will focus on these parables which are unique to Luke. We will explore the meaning and significance of these parables for our lives and how they relate to God's mission in the world. **Begins January 8**<sup>th</sup>




Each fourth Sunday, the forum provides an opportunity for conversation about important issues facing our world today. Over the next three months, we will focus various topics which will be announced as they are developed.

**December I** (Date changed) Is the Church Relevant? Faithful Living in a Post-Christian World

The numbers are in and they aren't looking good for Christianity in America. Over the past few decades, the percentage of Americans that claim "no religious affiliation" has increased exponentially. In the midst of this changing religious landscape, some are questioning the relevancy of Church and Christian leadership. So, is the Church relevant in this post-Christian era?

There will be two Rector's Forum presentations in December. The second one will be held on December 22, at 9:15 a.m. Topic to be announced.

In the New Testament, the Greek word *ekklesia* (ek-klay-see-ya) is most commonly translated as *church*. The word was originally used to refer to any public assembly or gathering of citizens, but was adopted by Christians to describe their gatherings for worship and the celebration of the Eucharist. Although the word occurs over one hundred times in the New Testament, it never refers to a building or physical space. It is always used to refer to the gathering of God's *people*. For the first few centuries of the church's life, it existed without the benefit of buildings and property. Instead, Christians gathered in one another's homes or places of business. This focus on the *people of God* explains why all of the central metaphors used to describe the church in the New Testament are *relational* in nature. Here are some examples:

**The Family of God** – Followers of Jesus quickly began to refer to one another in familial terms. Christians thought of themselves as brothers and sisters, those who had been adopted as children of God. In the letter to the Ephesians the church is referred to as the *household* of God, the *family* of believers (Ephesians 2:19).

**The Body of Christ** – One of the most developed metaphors in the New Testament is the image of the *body* of Christ. In his first letter to the Corinthians, the Apostle Paul reminds the members of his congregation that they actually are members of the *body* of Christ. And just as each part of our physical bodies, even those less honorable parts, are necessary to our health and wholeness, so also every member of the spiritual *body* of Christ is necessary to our common life (1 Corinthians 12:12).

The Temple of the Lord – Both Peter and Paul used the image of the temple to describe the gathering of the people of God. In the letter of First Peter, the individual members of the community are referred to as living stones, who are being built together into a spiritual house (I Peter 2:4). Long before the construction of any physical buildings, the leaders of the early church envisioned God's people as a living structure being built by God's Spirit.

**The Saints of God** – When Paul addressed his congregations, he would frequently refer to God's people as *saints* (Romans 1:7). Of course, Paul is not using this word in the traditional sense, referring to an especially holy person who has been canonized by the church. Instead, Paul used the *saint* to describe the spiritual identity of God's people as those *set apart* for God's purpose and mission.

All of these images and metaphors are used to describe the *church* as the *people* of God. Long before the acquisition of property and the construction of buildings, the *church* existed as a community of faith, a gathering of the followers of Jesus. Centuries before the first stained glass windows were created, the *church* reflected the light and beauty of God's glory through the lives of its members. Before the forging of the first gold candlestick or the first silver chalice, the *people* of God gathered for a simple meal to celebrate God's goodness and to give thanks for God's gifts.

Of course, the ministry we share today in the 21st century is supported and made possible by our facilities and buildings. It is hard to imagine the church sustaining its ministry without these important resources and assets. However, let us not forget that at its core, the *church* is the people, gathered around a common purpose and held together by God's abundant and everlasting love.



# Pastoral Care: Always Active Yet Seldom Seen

Churches are busy places with many people participating in various aspects of parish life. And then there are ministries like Pastoral Care which are private and very insulated from the bustle of day-to-day ministry. Pastoral Care meets the emotional, spiritual and social needs of parishioners who may not

otherwise be able to attend church, receive communion, or just have a conversation with another person due to being homebound or hospitalized. This special brand of support doesn't require ordination, and if you have ever been that shoulder to cry on or spent time to be still and listen to another person or just visit, then you have offered pastoral care.

At Good Shepherd, we have a dedicated team that meets regularly to discuss many people in varying degrees of need. Relationships are at the very heart of this good work. Our team is coordinated by Jeanne Couillard and there are multiple ministries under the umbrella of pastoral care such as Flower Delivery, Healing Team, Hospital Calls, Prayer List/Prayer Chain, Knitting Ministries, and Greeting Card Ministry. Even OWLS, Kairos prison ministry, and GriefShare provide pastoral support. Communion is administered by Eucharistic Visitors, licensed by the Diocese, and coordinated by Meredith Smith. We meet people where they are. Their faces may not be familiar to the greater parish, but they are in our thoughts and prayers always. We bring not only communion in its literal sense, but *communion*, the sharing of one person with another, that feeds spiritually and emotionally.

When we send forth Eucharistic Visitors from church services on Sunday, we are reminded that "we who are many are one body, because we all share one bread and one cup."

Communion to go. Clergy and licensed Eucharistic Visitors take communion to the hospitalized and homebound on a regular basis. If you would like communion for yourself or a friend, please contact Meredith at meredithsmith360@me.com

Remember the garlands we used to make for the Christmas tree out of colored construction paper? Well, this year we will have strips of construction paper and glue in the Narthex. And each person can write their SOMETHING on a piece of

construction paper and add it to the chain. By Christmas eve, we hope to have a chain that will reach all the way around the church, embracing each one of us – and the wider community beyond. #### **AUTUMN 2019**

**St. George's Mission:** Good Shepherd helped to collect, pack, and distribute toiletries, towels, and clothes to participants in "Dare to Care" shower ministry, and sent weekly teams to facilitate the program.


