BIOS of Presenters

Dr. Joy K. Lintelman is a Professor Emeritus of history at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. Her specialties include immigration history and women's history. She is the author of *I Go to America: Swedish American Women and the Life of Mina Anderson.* This award-winning book provides a portrait of young Swedish women who immigrated to America in the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth century's. This study, a winner of the Minnesota Book Award for Nonfiction, provides us with a glimpse into the questions - who what, when, where, why and how - as they relate to our immigrant ancestors.

Elizabeth Williams Gomoll, CG®, is a professional board-certified genealogist. In addition to researching for clients across the country, she is co-editor of the *Minnesota Genealogist* quarterly journal and president of the APG Northland Chapter. Liz has served as a Director for the Minnesota Genealogical Society and the Swedish Genealogical Society of Minnesota. Her books, *With Love to All*, a collection of WWI letters and photographs, and the co-authored guide *Husförhörslängder*, *Swedish Household Examination Records*, have garnered several awards. She researches and lectures as Red Bird Genealogy Services (www.RedBirdGen.com). Liz also plays flute and piccolo professionally and holds a private pilot's license.

Craig Rhombs is a retired software project manager. He has done genealogical research since 1971. He holds a B.S. in Physics and Astronomy (Vanderbilt University) and M.S. degrees in Astronomy (University of Iowa) and Solar Energy Studies with an emphasis on Computing and Information Sciences (Trinity University). Recently, he spent a year researching his paternal line in Alsace and Rheinland-Pfalz. He discovered a line of teachers spanning many decades in areas in small Catholic villages. His purpose here is to share skills that were useful in this research.

Colleen Gordon, has been a librarian at Minnesota State University Moorhead since 2015 and a member of the Heritage Education Commission since 2020. Genealogy has been her main hobby since 2017. She teaches research and information literacy to college students and assists students and faculty with individual research needs. Her current genealogy research interests include Swedish, Norwegian, and Irish immigration; genetic genealogy; and writing family histories. She lives in Fargo with her husband and two cats.

Kevin Zepper, Professor of English, has taught at Minnesota State University Moorhead for over twenty years. He is the author of several books of poetry, his most recent being *The Shaman Said* (Audience Askew Chapbook, 2023). Zepper has served as an instructor and judge for the North Dakota Council of the Humanities Poetry Out Loud initiative for over five years. In 2023, he joined the Minnesota chapter of Poetry Out Loud. Also in 2023, He taught memoir writing through the Eventide University initiative, continuing education in a local retirement committee. Zepper is also a semi-professional photographer and is a TV/film actor represented by Natalie Sparrow Management in Fargo, North Dakota.

Trista Raezer-Stursa, has been an archivist for 15 years, spending the last 5 years as the university archivist at Minnesota State University Moorhead. Previously she has worked at the North Dakota State University Archives, Santa Clara County Archives, and Santa Clara University Special Collections. She received her master's degree in Library and Information Science from San Jose State University. She loves to work on her own genealogy in her spare time.

John Hallberg, grew up in Willmar, Minnesota. He attended Minnesota State University Moorhead, where he received his B.A. in History in 1993. He has worked for the NDSU Archives and Institute for Regional Studies Archives since 1999. For the past 23 years he has done reference service, processed, cataloged and digitized collections, and has become quite familiar with North Dakota regional genealogical resources. He has also extensively researched his own Swedish and Danish genealogy.

Allison Bundy, is the College Archivist & Digital Collections Librarian in the Carl B. Ylvisaker Library at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. She originally started at Concordia as a student (Class of 2017!) and was fortunate enough to get the position of archives associate after graduation. She transitioned into the role of Archivist in January of 2023 upon completing my master's degree. She hasa huge interest in born-digital archiving, digital preservation, and the preservation of audio-visual resources. Her goal is to one day have the digital content of Concordia's archives fully inventoried

and accessible to researchers. Allison lives in Moorhead with her husband and corgi, Merlin. She likes to fill her time outside of work by playing Dungeons & Dragons with friends, hiking through the nearby state parks, or reading from the ever-growing pile of books on her nightstand.
