

John 15:1-8

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is part of Jesus' discourse at the Last Supper. Recall that John tells the story of Jesus' Last Supper differently from the other Evangelists. In John's Gospel, the Last Supper begins with Jesus washing his disciples' feet. Jesus then provides them with a series of instructions. We call this section the Last Supper discourse or Jesus' farewell discourse. In these chapters of John's Gospel, Jesus instructs his disciples about the importance of following his example of love and service, about the gift they will receive when Jesus sends them the Holy Spirit, and about their relationship with Jesus and with the world. The Last Supper discourse concludes with Jesus' prayer for his disciples.

Today's Gospel reading is taken from middle of the Last Supper discourse. Jesus speaks about his relationship to his disciples. In his metaphor of the vine and the branches, Jesus is referencing the Hebrew Scriptures. In the Hebrew Scriptures, Israel is the vineyard, and Yahweh himself tends the vineyard. One of the primary themes of John's Gospel is to show Jesus to be the fulfillment of God's promises to Israel.

In this passage, Jesus teaches his disciples that his relationship with them will not end after his death; he will remain with them always. This unity between Jesus and his disciples is the basis for their ability to continue to do the work that he began. Similarly, Jesus' presence with us through the Gift of the Holy Spirit enables us to continue the work of love and reconciliation that he began.

Jesus also teaches his disciples about the importance of the words he has taught to them. Just as Jesus will remain in the disciples, so too will his words. We come to know Jesus through the Scriptures, the living Word of God. Our commitment to be Christ's disciples is sustained through God's Word. This commitment is also strengthened by our life of prayer and nourished by the Eucharist. Through the Eucharist, Jesus dwells in us, remains with us, and transforms us so that we might bear fruit in his name.

Lay Leanings By Deacon Mike Stewart

Okay, I know I'm not alone on this; I'm certain of it. I tend to eat when I'm not hungry, and drink when I'm not thirsty. Which means what? Which means that I rarely allow myself to get hungry or thirsty. At the risk of sounding like a spiritual prude, isn't that what we might call a sin of abundance? How will I ever know what my heart is hungering for - what perhaps only God can satisfy me - if I never allow myself to experience hunger? How can I enter into communion with what much of the world experiences on a physical level every day?

I was cutting the grass this week, and as usual, rushing to fit it in between appointments. I suddenly became very aware of how thirsty I was; my throat dry and parched, and I marveled at how the feeling was so 'foreign' to me. In that moment, I recalled having spent a short time working in a mission in Central America, and how I came away from that experience forever grateful for the gift of clean water, something I know I take for granted so often.

In John's Gospel story of the crucifixion of Jesus, he speaks only a few words from the cross. In the midst of my thirsty lawn cutting, I was drawn to two of those powerful words of Jesus, "*I thirst.*" So powerful were those two little words of Jesus that they became mantra for the life of Mother Teresa of Calcutta. She knew what it meant to stand in that gap of thirst through the darkness of faith she experienced in her own life, and through serving the poorest of the poor throughout the world. So empowering were those words to her, that they became a visible theme in the chapel of every Missionaries of Charity house throughout the world, encouraging her sisters as they too stood in that gap in the service of others.

In our culture, many of us are blessed to have the option to satisfy both our wants and our needs. But do we do so at the expense of others in need all around us; even right here in our own midst? Do we serve ourselves first before noticing the hunger of the world in which we live? Are we in the habit of regularly satisfying our wants without ever examining what it is we most hunger for in this life? What is missing in your life that would lead you to wholeness?

Mother Teresa once said, "*The hunger for love is*

much more difficult to remove than the hunger for bread." So what about you? What do you most hunger and thirst for? Let's pray about that.
