# Ladybug Day

It is Ladybug Day at the Central Library and there is a line of strollers, mothers, and little ones lined up outside the story telling theater, waiting for the eleven o'clock adventure. The ten o'clock wave has transitioned to the Secret Garden.

This is a school day so the audience will be limited to preschoolers and their escorts. When the doors open there is an optional small door for little ones, and it gets enthusiastic use.

There is total chaos, 50 mothers, many with baby carriers hanging from their necks, some with babies wrapped in blankets. There are six fathers, a couple of grandmothers, and one grandfather. Did I mention it is total chaos?

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Miss Kari walks in with a colorful top emblazoned with red and black ladybugs. It does not get quiet. Miss Kari starts her presentation with recognition of colors and shapes, finally a few voices can be heard in response. There are some little ones in the audience who know their colors and shapes and are happy to participate. Now it is still chaos but with a little order.

After a song, to the tune of "Little Tea Pot," Miss Kari reads two books about ladybugs, and it is time to adjourn to the Secret Garden. The Secret Garden is located behind the library, so the mothers and caretakers load up the strollers and, taking the little ones by hand, trek back to the Secret Garden.

At the Secret Garden, they are met by a group handing out bowls, plates, or Tupperware, anything that can hold some wood chips and baby ladybugs. The ladybugs are exceedingly small and still all black. The little ones, 1 to 4 years old, are very curious and poke at the contents of their containers to uncover the ladybugs.

With unbelievable patience, they coax the ladybugs onto their fingers. They examine them like a scientist, checking out a brand-new species. They then crouch down close to the blades of long grass or shrubs where they want to deposit their new friend. The mothers, dads, grandmothers, grandfathers, or caregivers are right there with them.

The little ones, still crouched down close to the action, watch to make sure their ladybugs get settled in their new homes. From the attention they display, you might get the feeling that they will be back to see the adult colorful version of their new friend, the ladybug.





# VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT Martha Elliott

Libraries have been a part of my life since I checked out my first book in third grade, confessed Martha Elliott, the incoming president of the Friends of the Library.

Growing up in the Midwest, Martha's first public library was the Mount Washington Public Library. Although the building

was a bit intimidating to a third grader, she was allowed to take out up to five books at a time and that began her love of the library.

After living in Ohio and Tennessee where she continued to appreciate the value and enjoy the public libraries, Martha eventually moved to Long Island, New York. She was hoping for better weather and improved job opportunities. While in Long Island, she earned a BA in Accounting from SUNY. Continuing her association with libraries, Martha was elected to the Harborfields Library Board. While serving on the Board from 1986 to 1991, she served terms as President, Treasurer, and Secretary. During her tenure, she was instrumental in the construction that doubled the physical size of the library and added new technology services.

In 1991, after being disappointed in the weather in the Midwest and Long Island, she decided to try California and a new job in an emerging technology with Pac-Tel Wireless. Challenges in technology required new contractual relations with vendors and the public, so Martha went back to school and earned a Juris Doctorate. Pac-Tel became Verizon and Martha eventually retired from Verizon in 2019.

After joining FOTL in 2019, Martha served for two years as Treasurer and one year as Assistant Treasurer and will now lead the group as President.

On a more personal note, Martha has two children and four grandchildren. She is a Disney fanatic with an annual pass for the last 10 years. A highlight of her Disney experience was a trip to visit Shanghai Disneyland in 2017. She also enjoys musical theater, supports an animal rescue organization, and a children's organization with donations.

She could be more active with all her skills, but she must have time to read!




Is this a true story? That is the preface page that greets the reader at the beginning of *Next in Line* 




If you like books with tangled webs, this book has them. Criminals, police, lawyers, the Royal Family, and a few private individuals, all try to outsmart one each other. This is the fifth in the William Warwick Series, and Detective Chief Inspector is about to take on the Royal Protection Unit duties, while he waits for his nemesis Michael Faulkner to come to trial for prison escape. Booth Watson, Faulkner's solicitor, believing Faulkner is dead, is making off with Faulkner's collection of art and emptying their joint bank accounts, intending to flee to the South Seas.

A terrorist's plane lands to refuel at a local airport, is apprehended by Scotland Yard, placed in the same prison with Faulkner. Princess Diana becomes involved in yet another web that could turn out disastrous for the UK and deadly for her. But Margaret Thatcher and Warwick roll out the big guns to try to counteract the terrorist plot.

Jeffrey Archer is in the House of Lords and has worked for Margaret Thatcher. He was also a friend of Princess Diana and functioned as her auctioneer on numerous occasions. So,...Is this a true story?

#### **HB Council Votes to Vet Library Books**

After six hours of public comment, most in opposition, the City Council voted 4-3 to support the agenda item of the Mayor Pro Tem seeking that books deemed "obscene" or "pornographic" by the City be restricted in ways (to be determined) from children and teens. The vote was taken at 1 a.m. after more than 150 public comments were made. In addition, more than 650 emails were received by City Council members. Two overflow rooms were packed with concerned citizens. The measure is to be followed up with "options" that will be presented to the public at the City Council Meeting on September 5th.

It is important to note that the City of Huntington Beach and HBPL have existing policies in place with a process for library patrons who would like to request a review of any item in the Library's collection. The policy states that "The Library supports the right of all individuals to read freely. With such a diverse community and so many points of view, disagreement about the collection can arise. Patrons are asked to respect the right of others to use materials one might not personally endorse, and for parents to be responsible for the appropriateness of their children's choices. The library recognizes the right and responsibility of parents to guide their own children's library use while allowing other parents to do the same. The Library has a formal process for the review of materials. Library users may initiate the formal review of any item in the collection by completing a Library Materials Evaluation form."

In more positive news, the HB City Council approved a new budget that ended up allowing the three library branches (Banning, Main Street, and Helen Murphy) to remain open. The closures had been proposed as possible cost-cutting measures, along with restricting hours at Central Library, which was also struck down.

## Censorship

When I started going to the Library, I went with my mother. I didn't have a library card, so I checked out books on my mother's card. When I got a card, I would always show my mother what I was planning on reading. This was not in the way of permission but because I was proud of what I was planning on reading. That went on until I reached high school. After that, I read adult fiction or nonfiction. Sometimes, we read the same books.

When I had a family, I took my children to the library and helped them pick out books that I thought they might enjoy. Now we read the same books and discuss them.

When my children started having children of their own, I was asked to take the grandchildren to the library. I didn't know many of the children's authors, a quick perusal was usually enough to see if the reading level and content was appropriate. If there were any questions, I asked the librarian for advice.

This could be considered censorship, I suppose, but I just thought it was helping shape young minds by supplying thoughtful material.

Of the nine children I introduced to the library, two have master's degrees, two have BAs, one is in military intelligence, two are general contractors and millionaires, one is a graduate culinary artist and catering manger at Bixby Ranch nominated for Leadership Long Beach, and one is a stay-at-home mom expecting twins in July.

That's what censorship can accomplish if done right. By right, I mean through guidance from a family member with an assist from the librarians.


