

Ministry Fair with more than 20 workshops, worship with a worship band, round table conversations and a service project to support area food pantries. The event starts at 9, is open to all, and costs \$50/person. SJB will pick up the cost of your registration. Two workshop times in the morning and two in the afternoon. Play an instrument? We learned that each mat takes about 500 grocery sacks. The loom will remain set up at SJB, so feel free to help when it works for you! Directions for how to cut the bags and make the PLARN (plastic yarn) will be posted. The mat making process is similar to weaving potholders on a loom. To firm up the mat, a person can snug up the strings by hand or by using the old-fashioned potato masher that's now on-site. Your work means someone won't have to sleep on the bare ground!

Church council notes:

The church council met on April 21 after worship.

Financial reports shared by Amy and Jim. Amy informed group that Church Mutual will have a new name, and we will have the same representative.

Pastor reported on the new C3 event coming up and encouraged people to attend. More information will be forthcoming. She also talked about how as the congregational needs for care arise due to health and aging-related issues, she wants to explore creating a Care Callers program here. Lay people who are interested would be trained to bring the care of the congregation to people. This builds on natural care we already have, incorporating things that we already do such as calls, cards and visits, but it would also add in the elements of prayer and communion.

Old business saw the council get updates on St Grubby's day projects, the CPR training options, the memorial tree planting and facility usage and access planning.

New business discussed determining the date to recognize our senior. Summer planning was also discussed: worship schedule change is June 2, with church at 9 a.m. Fellowship activities to be aware of include the parade in July and doing a cookout and having games at the July semi-annual meeting. Josh to oversee grilling.

Summer collections to include birthday cake kits in May, snacks for Alive and Running in June, and school supplies for the LWR kits in July and August. September collection is TBD.

Council engaged in conversation about how best to receive art for the church and M-S-C to have a policy in place that includes both pastoral and council approval ahead of time so that the council is empowered to accept or decline gifts. Concern is for precedence, artistic and theological integrity and for having an approach in place that accords flexibility of response and gives guides for suitability.
