The service will be offered between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday. Pick-up/drop-off points will be Hilton Hawaiian Village (Kalia Road), the Duke Kahanamoku statue on Kalakaua Avenue, Aston Waikiki Beach Hotel, Ohana West and the Neal Blaisdell Canter.

Whether your guests are in need of the perfect omiyage or an original artwork to take home, this month they can choose from amazing local crafts, jewelry, foodstuffs, books, and much more created on the island of Oʻahu or flown in from around the state. The show is simply bursting at the seams with unique products, music by award-winning entertainers and cooking demonstrations by celebrity chefs. Both seasoned sellers and budding start-ups will be showcased. Creations from Oʻahu, Maui, Kauai, Molokai, and the Big Island reflect the best of locally-made products. Guests who have already made the rounds at familiar shopping destinations will be thrilled to check out this home-grown extravaganza.

What originated as a modest 61-booth exhibition to help Hawaii's local businesses network has now blossomed into a lucrative festival and is continuing to grow each year. Today over 35,000 attendees flock to the Blaisdell along with

over 1,000 American and international buyers eager to check out what's new and exciting in Hawai'i. With a wealth of food, music, and nonstop shopping, for the small admission fee of \$4, it's no wonder this festival just keeps getting bigger and bigger.

Along with the cuisine of sixteen top local restaurants, the festival is guaranteed to be a celebration not to miss and a rare treat for our visitors. This year the Honolulu Convention Center serves as backdrop for the world's largest sake celebration outside of Japan, held August 16 from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. Serving up top sakes from every sake-brewing region in Japan including many ultra-premium daiginjo sakes, festival-goers can taste 223 bottles not

available anywhere else in the United States. Prefest entertainment kicks off the event at 6 p.m. with the mesmerizing taiko drumming of Kenny Endo. Following that is a traditional kagami-biraki ceremony in which the sake barrel lid will be broken open with wooden mallets and dignitaries share cups of sake marking the official start of the festivalz. It's time for Polynesian Cultural Center's popular Maori Song and Dance Festival. What began as a series of Maori cultural competitions in the Center's Aotearoa marae (New Zealand village) has developed into its annual cultural Whakataetae (competition) with groups from PCC, around Oahu, and the mainland coming together to celebrate the traditions of the Maori as they vie for prizes and bragging rights. Audiences who get to see this annual event will be treated to some of the best performers around our island showcasing a variety of traditional Maori performance arts.

Despite Hawaii's definite Maori community, our performers have yet to participate in the national Te Matatini competition in New Zealand. With this ultimate goal in mind, though, the skill level of those competing in the annual Whakataetae is fierce, to say the least. Each year, hundreds of thousands of people attend one of the kapa haka (traditional Maori performing arts presentation) throughout New Zealand. Events are a lively and elegant blend of traditional chants, music, and dance with colorful piupiu skirts and the familiar poi ball dance. The famed, heart-pounding Maori war dances, known as the haka is always a crowd favorite. These dances were used to pump-up warriors before a battle and mesmerizes the audience with their rhythms, stomping, chanting, and that infamous Maori tongue.





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How many of you speak English, French, German, Hawaiian, Korean, Japanese, Mandarin and Spanish fluently? If you did, most likely you would be working at the United Nations and not at the guest services or

concierge desk at your hotel. Several of you out there are bi- or even tri-lingual, but I bet it would be hard to find anyone who spoke all eight languages perfectly. There are places in Honolulu's arts and cultural scene where language barriers are few and the experience for your guests extraordinary.

The big news this summer is BISHOP MUSEUM'S new audio tours in multiple languages that are accessible through smart-phones, tablets and other mobile devices. The tours were recorded in Chinese, Korean and Japanese as well as Hawaiian by native speakers. The audio tour includes a series of information short clips describing forty treasured objects throughout the Hawaiian Hall complex. Children's voices were used to create kid-friends versions of the audio tours targeted at children ages 5 to 12. Special audio resources like mele (song) and oli (chant), and recordings of Museum contributors such as Mary Kawena Pukui, are woven into a number of the audio tour stops, giving visitors a deeper understanding of the importance of the object they are looking at. To avoid the costs associated with using a third party company to provide the audio tour hardware, the Museum utilized the popularity of smart-phone devices, Wi-Fi hot spots, QR codes, and simple audio editing software like Garageband to build the audio tour system inhouse. Later phases of the audio tour will include objects in all of the Museum's major exhibit halls.



Bihop Museum just got a bit easier for foriegners that don't speak English with their Mobile Audio Tours.

There are several ways your guests can access the audio tours. First they will be instructed to access the Mobile Audio Tour site with their Wi-Fi enabled devices. Then at each object on the tour, they will be instructional signage giving them the various options to download the audio tour:

QR CODES: Your guests can use a barcode scanning app on their mobile device to scan each QR code related to a particular object in the collection to access the each of the language tours online

STOP NUMBER: Each tour stop also has a

human readable three digit number that can be entered by hand on the Mobile Audio Tour site.

BROWSE LOCATION: When on the Mobile Audio Tours site, if your guests cannot find one of the audio tour signs, they can just browse by building and floor to see all of the tours available nearest their location.

Admission into Bishop Museum: Adults \$19.95; Seniors (65+) \$16.95; and Youth (4-12) \$14.95; Children age 16 and younger must be accompanied by an adult. Bishop Museum is open from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.; closed on Tuesdays and Dec. 25. For information, visit BishopMuseum.org or call 847-3511.

In addition to those languages, IOLANI PALACE has its own audio tour, but the equipment is more traditional in the form of a wand device; however, the Palace's language selection is larger than Bishop Museum. It includes English, French, German, Hawaiian, Japanese, Mandarin and Spanish. It's not a surprise that the Palace offers tours in more languages than any other museum in Hawai'i, since King Kalākaua, who built 'Iolani Palace in 1882, was the first reigning monarch to travel around the world. The audio tours have added features of music and sound effects, including excerpts from the writings of Queen Lili'uokalani as she recalls her imprisonment in the Palace. Of course in addition to all these audio tours, the Palace provides docent lead tours in Japanese at 11:30 a.m. Monday through Saturday (subject to docent availability) in addition guided tours are available in Mandarin and American Sign Language but must be pre-arranged. For more details on these specialty tours as well as general tour information please call 522-0822 or visit IolaniPalace.org. Palace regular tours are Mondays 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Tuesdays, Wednesdays, & Thursdays 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Fridays & Saturdays 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. Audio tours are \$14.75 for adults and \$6 for children 5 to 12. Docent lead tours are \$21.75 for adults and \$6 for children 5 to 12.

DORIS DUKE'S SHANGRI LA offers tours in Japanese on the last Friday of every month at noon. Reservations are a must and can be made up to one month in advance for groups no larger than 12 people. For reservations please call 532-3852 or email shangrilatickets@HonoluluMusuem.org. As most of you know tours for Shangri La are offered through the HONOLULU MUSEUM OF ARTS, which itself is open Tuesdays through Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m. General admission is \$10 for adults and for children 17 and under admission is free. Their Japanese docent lead tours are Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 1:30 p.m. Guests can also request private hour-long guided tours for up to 15 people in English or Japanese for an additional \$25 on top of the regular museum admission. This is a great way for your guests to create a specialty tour tailored to what they want to learn about. Please submit your requests for these tours at least 3 weeks in advance and payment is Call 532-8700 or visit due upon arrival. 

You'll be invited to stretch VHS tape, composing it into a collective memory landscape on the gallery floor and think about our capacity to store, replay, retrieve, and distinguish our own memories in this media age. Huh? Not sure. Come on, chance 'em! And, bring your own old tapes to add to the collective memory. Maika'i Tubbs is one of the most creative young artists I've had the opportunity to interview. That was the day he showed me his gas mask and blow-torch tucked into an art box on the tiny studio apartment lanai. He melted plastic forks when his neighbors weren't home. He is about to go off to Parsons in New York to get an MBA. He is pressing eject to play in NY.

Unlikely pen pals, Minnesota and Hawaii artists started talking. The result, Changing Places, is a print show from August 12 to 25th in the Mezzanine Gallery of the HMA Art School at Linekona, Victoria and Beretania Street across Thomas Square.

FOR EAR CANDY - There is a place to rest your feet and re-group at the Made In Hawaii show. Half-way through 399 vendors filling 482 booths you can settle into a chair in the Blaisdell Center's Pikake Room on Saturday, August 17th. From 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. the Kani Ka Pila Grille talent search finalists will serenade, judged by Cyril Pahinui, Keala Chock, Jason Genegabus and Luana Maitland, events and activities manager for the Outrigger Reef on the Beach. If you love the winner, count on seeing them, four Thursday performances in September at the Grille.

Hawaii Theatre on August 24th for the 29th, Annual Ka Himeni Ana Hawaiian Music Competition. Be there. You may have friends and family performing. Count on thankful guests if you send them to Chinatown for this event with major harmony and some humor from emcee Manu Boyd.

FIND A KID – Young minds really make for summer magic. Read the BeachHouse Press book Twinkle, Twinkle Small Honu board book or mouse and mongoose Find a Rainbow in Hawaii. It is good if you have or can borrow a kid to read with you - but, really, no-need. Take a tide pool walk. "Like" the Waikiki Aquarium's Facebook page and enter an underwater photo. The rules say "photos taken in the Hawaiian Island Chain (including the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands). Wow, wish I had a chance to take over, under or on top of water photos at Papahanaumokuakea. Personally, I'm still working on saying that name without notes. See you there?



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



proceeded to break his own record in the next attempt from 1912 to 1932.

Duke became the first person to be inducted into both the International Swimming Hall of Fame (1965) and the International Surfing Hall of Fame (1966). This fame was what landed him in the glamorous lights of Hollywood for several years where he played extra or bit parts. It was also through swimming that, for an exhibition, he traveled to Australia and forever influenced the rise of surfing in what is now one of the most popular places to ride. The board he rode at Sydney's Freshwater Beach is still kept there by the caretaker, and a statue stands as a tribute to his impact. A tall, powerful athlete and lover of Hawai'i and traditional ways, his beloved surfboard was a sixteen-foot koa board that towered over him. It was through his international fame and travels that Duke brought attention to the talents and beauty of Hawai'i, gaining him the title of "Ambassador of Aloha." But for world travel, he hauled his ten-foot, round-nosed, redwood board to the mainland and beyond, sharing the thrill of surfing. After years and years of swimming and longboarding, and close to thirty movie appearances that helped rocket surfing to international popularity, Duke returned to his hometown to become sheriff of Honolulu, a position he held for 26 years.

The Festival kick off in the morning of August 17th followed by a lei-draping at the Duke Kahanamoku statue at 5 p.m. and things heat up from there. For event times and information go to dukesoceanfest.com or follow them on Facebook.


That's right, a pirate ship has sailed off of

Chef's Corner

Executive Chef Anita Lo

Chef Anita Lo is the chef and owner of Annisa in New York City and one of the most respected chefs in the country. Revered by many she is also the first female chef to ever win an Iron Chef challenge and you can meet her when she comes to Honolulu as part of next month's Hawaii Food & Wine Festival.

How made you decide to pursue a culinary career, You've participated in Iron Chef, Top Chef and Chopped. especially after you had already graduated college?

I've always loved to eat and to work with my hands, and frankly, what's one to do with a degree in French?;) It seemed at the time the best of all possible worlds to go work in a French speaking kitchen and I wound up at

What was your first job in the industry?

I made canapes for David Bouley at his eponymous, one year old restaurant. Every guest got a plate of five different amuses bouches.

Who's would you consider your mentor and why? David Waltuck has really helped me over the years. He taught me about flavor and about small restaurants

These days you're considered by many to be one of their mentors. What words of advice would you offer them? You need to read as much as possible--food publications, cookbooks, etc, and eat out as much as possible to stay relevant.

Unfortunately the culinary world is often more difficult for a woman to succeed in than a man Did you run into much gender disparity and how did you overcome it?

It's a lot easier than it was when I was coming up in the food world. That being said, it's still not equitable. Its important to stay focused, to be tenacious, and to believe in yourself without being overconfident.

If you had to choose one country (other than France) as your favorite for food, what would it be?

Japan. I love the zen contemplation of ingredients at the height of the season.

What's your favorite thing to do when not working? I love to fish.

What are your thoughts on the TV culinary craze?

Its great for business and great in general for culinary awareness.

In 2005 you became the first female to win Iron Chef. How was that experience and what happened because of it?

It was a blast. They Iron Chef team is amazing, and no one is more fun than Mario Batali. We were in a downturn in business, and this show saved us.

What's the farthest you have traveled in search of a food item and the strangest food you've ever tried?

I've been a lot of places, so the farthest? Not sure, but I've certainly had my share of 24 hour flights to the other side of the globe. The strangest food I've ever tried? Hakarl, fermented shark from Iceland? Various insects? (didn't love the water bug in Thailand nor the silkworms in Korea). Blow-torched marmot in Mongolia?

Have you ever been to Hawaii before?

Yes, at least twice. I spent an amazing Christmas in

What's on your must-do list while you're here? Eat something amazing!

What do you have planned for the Festival?

I will be using some of your local ingredients for a walk around tasting at the Modern Honolulu and for the "Girls Got Game" brunch.

What ingredients should everyone have on hand?

Lemons, onions, oil and soy sauce, and a million other things...

quart balsamic vinegar

slices ginger

cups Chinese black vinegar

teaspoon black peppercorns

foie gras scraps; salt and pepper

lobe Foie Gras B, cleaned

What's next for you?

Not sure! Hopefully something fun and delicious.

Seared Foie Gras with Foie Gras Soup Dumplings by Chef Anita Lo. annisa

INGREDIENTS

- 1 oz. slice Foie Gras A, deveined salt and pepper wondra
- 2 pig feet, split
- 1 pint veal stock
- pints chicken stock
- large stick cinnamon
- pieces star anise
- dried shitake mushrooms
- 2 slices ginger soy sauce to taste black pepper



part boiling water salt and pepper sov oil pieces each jicama macedoine pinch each scallion top julienne

DIRECTIONS: MAKE THE "SOUP": place the pig feet in a pot with the stocks and bring to a boil. Skim and add the remaining ingredients and simmer, skimming every so often, until pig feet are soft, about 3 hours. Strain. Taste and adjust seasonings; you may have to add a little water to dilute the soy. Shock and refrigerate until set.

MAKE THE FOIE MOUSSE: season the foie liberally with salt and pepper and let sit overnight. Pack into a terrine mould, cover and place in a hot water bath. Cook in a 275 oven about 45 minutes until it just starts to melt and is warm in the center. Place all in a food processor and run until smooth. Pass through a tamis and repack into the terrine mould. Cover and

MAKE THE VINEGAR REDUCTION: Place the vinegars, the ginger and peppercorns in a saucepot and reduce to a glaze. Strain and refrigerate.

MAKE THE DUMPLING WRAPPERS: Mix the salt and

flour and add the boiling water. Knead until smooth and place in an oiled bowl, covered. Allow to rest 30 minutes, then roll to about <1/8" thickness and cut into 3.5" rounds

TO FORM THE DUMPLINGS: brush each wrapper with eggwash and place a small square of foie mousse in the center of a wrapper, along with a few pieces jicama and a small dollop of the "soup". Fold in half and crease the top to form half moons. Freeze or cook immediately.

TO SERVE: steam 3 dumplings per order (if frozen, from the frozen state) until puffed. In the meantime, season and dredge in wondra the foie gras and sear. Decorate plate with the black vinegar reduction and organize the three dumplings on top. Top each dumpling with a third of the seared foie gras and place a pinch of the scallion julienne in the center. Serve with chopsticks and a Chinese soup spoon so that the diner can experience the juice.

Politely telling me that the seats were reserved for people who were coming in for dinner later and we couldn't stay long would have worked as well. However, all he ended up doing is offend the living daylights out of somebody who not only lives right near the restaurant, but one who also happens to have the means to share the story with others. Remember that shopping scene in Pretty Woman where Julia Roberts walks back in to the store that wouldn't help her the day before and says "Big mistake. Big. Huge." Applies perfectly here. and being rude and offensive? The bartender didn't even have the courtesy to wait until I had left the immediate area before speaking. This is the third time the customer service has offended me at this restaurant — and it was the last. I see no reason to waste any more time or money on a place that just doesn't want it. It really is the little things that make all the difference and reinforces just how important customer service can be. A smile goes a long way.

Cyril Pahinui, and his wife, Chelle, honor Cyril's dad by putting on a party in classic Gabby style. On Saturday, August 10th, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., the 6th Annual Gabby Pahinui Waimanalo Kanikapila will bring together 150 musicians

to jam. The thousands of fans who savor the free day of music at the beach park are the beneficiaries of their hard work. Musicians play solo or in their usual groups. Then someone will say, "hey, we are short a guitar player," and in the time it takes to tune the strings someone jumps in and a new group is formed. This concert is a time machine into Hawaii's music.

Stories of weekends at the Pahinui home in Waimanalo are about one long jam session. Word would go out, Gabby was playing. The yard would fill with guys with guitars. Fans just followed the sound of Gabby's voice – somewhere between a bulldozer and a train wreck, with moments of falsetto that made everyone cry. Hard work, a dozen kids and a hard life took Gabby away early – born in 1921, he died in 1980 at the young age of 59. Musicians who were in his backyard never forgot.

Cyril Pahanui laughs and says his dad's legendary music history sometimes makes people remember creatively. "Often young musicians who were too young to hold a guitar come up with a memory of playing with my dad, and, who knows, maybe their own dad did."

Cyril and Chelle Pahanui started the now 6 year-old festival to honor Gabby, keeping the backyard -style kanikapila alive with musicians who play for love and a plate lunch. "They jam and stay all day," Chelle Pahinui says, "hanging out in the open pavilion at Waimanalo Beach Park." She says the musicians are very accessible for photos or music questions, with answers coming from half a dozen of their music heros.

The day opens with a hula halau who present hula and chant and then take over the shave ice booth. Plate lunch, community organization and cultural booths are plentiful. The talent line-up is a hundred names long. The list includes dozens of Na Hoku Hanohano Award winners. Cyril says,"the only musicians not playing have a gig somewhere else, usually out of state."

The sale of \$15 Gabby t-shirts helps fund the musicians food and the security. Calling the shirt a "collectors item" is for real. A first year shirt was recently listed on e-bay for \$500. Concert details: www.gabbypahinui.com

The Waimanalo Kanaikapila happens on Saturday, August 10th, followed on Sunday, August 18th by the Annual Hawaiian Slack Key Guitar Festival in Kapiolani Park. This month's winner is another of our highly regarded Les Clefs D'Or members and we are thrilled to have a chance to learn a little bit more about this hotel vet-

eran who is very helpful assisting guests according to his coworkers. Congratulations David!

- Q: How long have you been at Halekulani??
- **A**: 9 years
- Q: How big is your team there now?
- **A:** We have a total of 10 concierges, 7 of which are members of Les Clefs d'Or.
- Q: Do you work in conjunction with an activities
- A: We are actually a full service concierge desk and don't have an activities desk on property
- Q: How did you come to work in the industry?
- A: I always enjoyed working with guests and customer service and thought it only made sense in Hawaii to work in the industry. Prior to Halekulani, I started at the front desk of a smaller hotel [where] we had to do everything from check in, phone operator, concierge, [etc.].
- Q: What's the biggest perk of being a concierge?
- A: [Being] able to interact with guests from all over the world. This is helpful when traveling as I can ask guests what they recommend in their hometown or country.
- Q: What do you think is the one skill that a good concierge has to have to succeed?

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
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
