Two mediums, multiple shows and lots of action is rocking the art world in February, and beyond. Pow Wow is pure drama. The 85th Annual Exhibition of the Honolulu Printmakers is history in technicolor as one of the two oldest printmaking groups in the U.S. showing world-renowned work by artists who practice alchemy, producing lithographs, etchings, engravings and more.

Rock stars of the mural world are here to do art. They carry cans. Making a drive through Kakaako provide a preview of the drama to come in the 2013 event called POW WOW. The murals from last year dramatically illustrate that these folks aren't "taggers", they are fine artists. Hailing from far-off places, like Melbourne and Mississippi, Cambodia and Canada, a gang of artists will take on thirty new walls in ten Kakaako locations

Check out names like Faith 47 from South Africa, Dal from China, Suitman from Hong Kong, Flying Fortress from Germany, Megs and Rome from Melbourne and Peap Tarr from Cambodia. Some have web sites, others are making

art of YouTube. The names of the local artists are equally fun and recognizable. Solomon Enos murals stretch across the Royal Hawaiian Center and the Sheraton Waikiki. PRIME is an artistic force for mural art and art education changing the lives of Hawaii's kids.

Thirty five international artists and forty-five local artists will descend like locusts with a spray can, on thirty walls in ten locations. The mural painting days stretch from February 11 to 16th. The finale will be a group mural, painted on the evening of the Night Market, February 16th.

Some artists are repeating their participation in Pow Wow. Others are first-timers to Hawaii. They will tour the island, dialog with anyone who comes to watch them paint and stay, not in Waikiki, but at an estate called Utopium the top of the mountain in Pupukea. They'll learn about Hawaii and will even grab a shovel to dig their own pit to cook a pig. Local style, they will dive in and assist with art and music workshops for at risk youth. Multiples, that's what printmaking is all about. The forms range from the age-old processes of lithograph drawn on stone, etchings on copper or zinc,

woodcut, engraving or any of the new techniques created in the last century. Except for mono-prints with only one image, the goal of a print plate or stone is to create an edition, from a

few to many, each print matching the others with perfect resolution. Painters and sculptors wonder

The 85th Annual Exhibition of the Honolulu Printmakers, runs from February 21st through March 15th at the Honolulu Museum of Art School gallery at Linekona on Victoria Street. Juror for the show is multi-media artist Hiroki Morinoue.

Laura Smith, director of the Honolulu Printmakers studio at Linekona, a printmaker herself, wonders how the art form got such deep roots in Hawaii. "That was eighty five years ago, back before trans-Pacific flights, when artists arrived by ship. I mean, who would bring a printing press for art on a ship headed for Hawaii."

This year four additional exhibitions have been added to celebrate prints and printmakers. "Lineage" at Hamilton Library at the University of Hawaii, was curated by Erika Molyneux, artist and a teacher at Sacred Hearts Academy. The exhibition showcases artists who have made great contributions to the printmaking tradition. David Smith, master printmaker and teacher of lithography at Linekona, calls the show "a view into the rich and varied history of printmaking by generations of teachers and students.'

In Chinatown the Louis Pohl Gallery presents the printmaking art of it's namesake, showing Pohl's stunning and subtle sea, volcano and bird series. A third show is the collection of the annual gift prints from decades of printmaker shows are on exhibit at the Robyn Buntin Gallery on Beretania Street. Each year an artist is invited to create a print, for sale while "supplies last." Many of the artists are now world renowned and many of the prints in the collections of national and international galleries and museums. The forth show is called Salon de Refuses - Rejects, showing at Ektopia on Waialae Avenue. The exhibit presents the alternate perspective, showing the work of artists who weren't selected for the 85th annual show. The show is inspired by the 1863 Salon de Refuses where painters Claude Monet and Edouard Manet displayed controversial and rejected imagery that today is viewed as a masterpiece. Organizer Jeremy Pang says the show confirms that "there are two sides to every story." ~ Lynn Cook


NEW TO AVIATION MUSEUM

good chocolate stout can be so this doesn't seem like a stretch.

Guests at the fest can learn about delicious desserts at Chocolate 101 classes where guest speakers will demystify the process of cacao becoming chocolate, visit exhibit booths with chocolate vodka and a chocolate fountain, and check out chef demonstrations. It doesn't stop inside the Dole Cannery Shops, don't forget to explore the grounds where a chocolate tea house has sprung up or sip something sweet at The Cocoa





The Hawaii artist, PRIME, counts in the hundreds the local kids he leads. At a street party event where he painted a stunning, four-foot high portrait of King David Kalakaua using only four spray cans. Then, he told a story that any parent, aunty or uncle can applaud.

"My son said he was pau, he couldn't compete."

Other graduate kumu will be joined by the olapa, the accomplished dancers, who graduated in the same class when they became kumu. It will be an opportunity for the audience to see generations of dancers who carry on the tradition of "Aunty Maiki

The second half of the concert will feature the first public performance of the most recent kumu, presenting their 2012 graduation challenge. Each of the five new kumu wrote a mele, a chant, translated and choreographed it, put drumming, hula and voice to it, then taught it to their hula sisters to perform.

In addition, the concert will include presentations by a select class of keiki, children, the men's class and the ladies of the Merrie Monarch class as they prepare for the 50th Annual Merrie Monarch Festival. Tickets, priced at \$25 and \$35, for the February 16th, 6 p.m. concert at Hawaii Theatre are available at the box office, or at www.hawaiitheatre.com

The outrigger canoe race is a quarter-mile race open to all skill levels and takes to the open ocean, just as teams participate in stand up paddle along the lagoon. Guests can learn and compete in Makahiki games including O'o Ihe (spear throwing), Moa Pahe'e (dart sliding), Pohaku Hoʻoikaika (stone throw), or even get down and dirty in the Huki Kaula (tug of war). Spectators are welcome to just watch and cheer on the competitors for free.

In addition to sports, visitors will enjoy ono local fare, handmade Hawaiian arts and crafts, and live local entertainment such Melveen Leed, Natalie Ai Kamauu, and the Royal Hawaiian Band. 

Chef's Corner

We're sticking on the same properyt as last month since the Outrigger Reef Hotel has recently hired industry veteran Guido Ulmann to take over the helm of Kani Ka Pila Grille. Guido brings years of experience both here in Hawaii and around the world to this local hotspot.

What was your first job in the culinary industry?

I found my way into the culinary industry quite early in life. Growing up, I enjoyed helping my mom in the kitchen and knew I wanted to be a chef by the time I was 12 years old. At 14, I became an apprentice at the Professional Cooking School in Lucerne, Switzerland. After three years of being schooled in international standards of fine dining, classic food preparation and world class service, I was able to graduate as a professional cook.

Who would you consider your mentor and why? I have had several chefs who have poured their skills and expertise into me throughout my culinary journey which began in 1966; however the most influential chef I've worked alongside was Peter Kleiser, food and beverage director at Hilton Corporation. Peter encouraged me to take the position at the Hilton Hawaiian Village, where

What first brought you to Hawaii?

I worked as the executive chef for 25 years.

I first came to Hawai'i to take the position of executive sous chef at the Hilton Hawaiian Village. I then opened up the Prince Kuhio Hotel as executive chef. I left the islands to take a position as executive chef of the Los Angeles Hilton, but couldn't stay away for long -- after 15 months I moved back to the islands.

What's your favorite thing living in the islands? I can never get enough of the amazing weather and friendly people here in the islands.

Please describe your food philosophy.

My philosophy is pretty simple -- I believe that using the best products and the freshest ingredients will set you up for a great dish or meal. Beyond that, recipes are to be followed and timing is just as -- if not, more -- important.

Favorite (and or least favorite) food trend? I really enjoy Italian and Mediterranean dishes; both styles are favorites of mine. What do you like to do best when not working? I really enjoy gardening and growing bonsai. I can do it at my own pace, and the plants don't talk back!

What's your favorite dish to cook at home?

Most of the time I find myself craving "home-y" foods – dishes like braised beef short ribs, Japanese-style beef curry, Italian veal osso bucco, or a simple spaghetti Bolognese.

What's always in your fridge?

On any given day, you might find a beer in my fridge, but you can always count on at least a half gallon of milk in there.

What's your favorite midnight snack?

Lately I'm in bed before midnight, but if I happen to be up, I enjoy a glass of red wine paired with some nice cheese and fruit.

What is the strangest food you have ever tried?

While visiting a Hong Kong open market, I once tried a Chinese soup with fresh squeezed liver from a live snake. It is definitely a dish I'm not used to!

Do you return to Switzerland often?

I try to fly home to Switzerland almost every other year, especially since my seven brothers and two sisters live there.

Biggest pet peeve working in the kitchen?

One of the challenges I face while working in the kitchen is when customers order a special meal but don't show up.

What do you have planned next at Kani Ka Pila Grille?

I'm very excited for what we have in store for Kani Ka Pila Grille. Some of the plans I'm already working on are revised menus and recipes for higher quality and more versatile options. We can't wait to share these changes with our customers!






