PAN-TASTIC MATSURI



One of Hawaii's largest and most popular festivals returns this month, uniting cultures from around the Pacific. Colorful dancers, rhythmic taiko drums, and ono ethnic foods are just a smattering of the fun-filled weekend in store for visitors June 7 through 9. Thirty-four years ago the Pan-Pacific Festival Matsuri began on a much smaller scale and was envisioned to advance intercultural exchange between Japan and Hawaii. Through the sharing of cultural traditions, this fest has expanded to celebrate the historical diversity in Hawaii including the music, arts, and cuisine of our Pacific neighbors. Since its inception in 1980, the Matsuri has exploded into an extravagant annual celebration that incorporates cultural influences from around the Pacific and this year's events continue to grow.

This year's Matsuri kicks off a weekend of wonder on Friday, June 7 with the Performing Arts Showcase at two new locations. Waikiki Beach Walk Plaza Stage and Ala Moana Centertainment Stage (3rd floor, Nordstrom Wing) will serve as the backdrops for exciting international performances. Evening brings the start of the Pan-Pacific Hula Festival at the Kuhio Beach Hula Mound as well as Waikiki's famous Ho'olaule'a taking over the strip. Featuring multiple entertainment stages set up along Kalakaua, visitors can wind their way through a maze of ethnic food stands, craft booths, and throngs of festival-goers. Revelers can sample everything from stir-fry to spam while watching Korean dancers, hula, and much more. Omiyage

will be easy to find at any of the vendor booths selling Island crafts and other unique items. Don't forget to remind your guests that the main thoroughfare of Waikiki will be shut down on between 7 p.m. and 10 p.m. so taxis and feet are your guests' best friends.

Throughout the three day festival, nearly 100 performers and cultural groups from around Hawaii and the world are scheduled to perform daily, showcasing traditions from Korea, Thailand, Philippines, among others. Performances feature traditional Japanese song and dance as well as hula and other cultural presentations, beginning at 10 a.m. on Friday and Saturday, and noon on Sunday. Continuing each evening is the 13th Annual Pan-Pacific Hula Festival featuring over 200,000 performers from both local and Japanese halau.

An amazing weekend culminates in the thrilling Grand Finale Pan-Pacific Parade proceeding with brilliant pomp and flourish down the streets of Waikiki. Over 1,000 marchers will take to the streets on Sunday, June 9 from 5 to 7 p.m. with music, food, people, and pageantry. Colorful floats light up Kalakaua as marching bands from Hawaii and the Mainland add to the exciting din including the Farrington High School football Team carrying the Omikoshi Shrine. The Summer Fests have begun

Festival season is upon us. This means there is going to be a multitude of events to choose from that should please just about everybody no matter what their tastes.... and it means if you want to get through Waikiki... park. Seriously, park your car, grab your bike, put one foot in front of another, but don't even think about driving unless you want to sit in the traffic created by all the upcoming road closures. Specifically this first weekend. Think I'm kidding? Check out this schedule. Friday night June 7th is the Matsuri Hoʻolauleʻa. Kalakaua will begin shutting down beginning at 4:30 p.m. for set-up of this street festival expecting over 30,000 participants. The street should start opening up somewhere between 11 p.m. and midnight. Don't get excited though because the King Kamehameha Floral Parade is the next morning and Kalakaua will again shut down around 8:30 a.m. for the parade which is expecting over 6,000 marchers let alone how many people on the street watching. Sunday June 9th brings another parade to Kalakaua, this one for the Matsuri Festival. On a much smaller scale this one only expects about 2,000 marchers plus event-goers, but Kalakaua will again close around 4:30 until sometime after 8 p.m. Kalakaua looks pretty good the rest of the month, but after that weekend, we've earned it!

On the bright side, summertime is in full swing with plenty of activities to do outside and enjoy the wonderful weather we've been seeing recently. Kapiolani Park will be hopping all month long with craft fairs and events most every weekend. Surf's been up recently though so please remember to remind your guests to exercise caution in the water at all times. The south shore isn't used to swells and surges like the one we had in late May and tourists could get hurt. One of the best websites out there that you should all bookmark and check regularly is Hawaii Beach Safety. Go to their website, http://oceansafety.soest.hawaii.edu for the latest up-to-date information on any beach on the island, any island actually, but click on Oahu beaches and you can get detailed info on whatever beach your guest is including surf conditions, jellyfish warnings, shark sightings and more. Another great resource is the Hawaii Beach Safety Facebook page. Only 31 people like it right now which means a lot of people aren't getting their updates, but they're pretty good about keeping it updated regularly especially with any breaking news such as when Hanauma Bay is closed due to surf or jellyfish, always a great thing to know right away. As summer begins, let's make sure we all enjoy the ocean in the safety possible way, and knowledge is key. As they say on TV... the more you know... Aloha!



Born on the Big Island, Hawai'i between 1748 and 1761, King Kamehameha I was destined for greatness from the beginning. In a tale befitting a fabled prince, the Kahuna predicted that he would become a great leader and unit the islands' warring clans, but this daring prediction terrified and angered the Ali`i at the time who ordered the baby be put to death. In order to save the life of the infant boy, he was hidden away in Waipio Valley and raised by foster parents until it was safe to return to his family in Kailua-Kona. It was then that young Kamehameha earned his nickname "The Lonely One." By and by, it came to pass that the future ruler was to fulfill the Kahunas' prediction. When Captain Cook came to the islands, Kamehameha was eager to learn about foreign vessels and weaponry. With his newlygained knowledge, he was able to amass a strong army and unite the Hawaiian Islands, bringing peace to the land and justice to his people. He went on to establish foreign trade and introduced

the modern Hawaiian flag with eight stripes representing the main Hawaiian Islands and the Union Jack in the corner. Kamehameha died in his hometown of Kailua-Kona on May 8, 1819 and his bones were buried in an undisclosed grave as tradition dictates to protect their mana. To this day, no one knows his final resting place.

In commemoration of this great leader, King David Kalakaua commissioned American sculptor Thomas Gould to create a statue of King Kamehameha I. Gould created the 9-foot-tall masterpiece while living in Italy and sent it to Paris for bronzing. But on the journey from Paris to Hawai'i, the ship that was transporting the king's likeness was sunk in the Falkland Islands. Insurance money allowed a second statue to be made from the preserved mold and arrived safely in Honolulu in 1883 to take its place at Ali'iolani Hale (the Hawaii Supreme Court Building) on King Street. Much to everyone's surprise, just weeks after its arrival, though, an English ship arrived with the salvaged original. Since a Kahuna (priest) had prophesized at its inception that the statue would only be happy in Kamehameha's birthplace, this original was sent to the town of Kapaau on the Big Island.

In honor of the just and tolerant King Kamehameha I, his grandson King Kamehameha V established June 11th as his day. This state holiday is celebrated around the islands through tributes to the great Ali'i including an elaborate flower lei decoration hung about his statues and a floral parade with floats, bands, mounted pa'u riders, and traditional hula.

Events kick off early this year with the Kamehameha Statue Lei Draping Ceremony on Friday, June 7 at 3:30 p.m. on the lawn in front of the Ali`iolani Judiciary Building. The following morning brings the colorful 97th Annual King Kamehameha Floral Parade proceeding from King and Richard Streets through Waikiki to end at Kapiolani Park. This year's King Kamehameha Day Makeke and Luau Celebration at Kawaiaha'o Church takes place Saturday, June 8 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The parade kicks off at 'Iolani Palace at 9 a.m. with special seating available for VIP Dine-In Lu'au ticket holders (\$40). The Makeke brings together local artisans offering up their hand-crafted gifts and goods. Visitors will have a ball at this annual lu`au from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. featuring homemade 'imu kalua pua'a, lomilomi salmon, poke, 'opihi, haupia, and much much more, along with live entertainment. Guests who are on the go can pick up a take out boxed lu'au lunch (\$20) from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. available to walk-ins or at a drive-through location on Mission Lane behind Kawaiaha'o School. For tickets or information, visit www.kawaiahao.org or call 469-3000. All proceeds support the vision and programs of Kawaiaha`o Church. ~ Kathryn

Chef de Cuisine William Chen

Will Chen is everywhere these days. Stop by a food event and he'll be serving up a dish with a smile. Food demonstrations at the Blaisdell? Chances are he'll be there. With a wicked sense of humor and easy going personality we thought you'd like to learn more about this personable chef about town.

When did you first decide you wanted to be a chef?

I've always enjoyed being in the kitchen, eating, and have worked in restaurants my entire life. It was probably sometime during college where I thought a business degree and a cubical sounded terribly boring and set my sight on professionally cooking.

What was your first job in the culinary industry?

My first live kitchen was at Restaurant Ledoyen in Paris. I spoke nominal French (still do) and everyone was silently working at furious speeds. On my first day I literally just stood there gawking at everyone's maddening precision, until the Chef Christian Le Squer came up, literally took me by the shoulders, and gave me a hard shake. "Only the Chef gets to stand and watch everyone, go find something to do." Not that culinary school didn't give me my chops, but this is where I learned everything. And while I am certain that I wasn't feeling this way at the time, those are some of the fondest memories I have of my culinary journey.

Who's would you consider your mentor and why?

Brian Hunnings always has been a huge support, friend and teacher. He has a great way of guiding and inspiring his team and never wants the credit. But it's always his genius behind the scenes.

How would you describe your style of cooking?

Straight forward. I like food to look like what it is, not hyper manipulated or overly worked. I have a great appreciation for that style of cooking but for me, if it says beet on the menu, I want to see a beet, not pink dust.

What's the most unique dish you've created?

Oh I'm sure there's many "unique" plates that I've concocted through the years, whether they were successful to the palate, would be arguable. Something that has really gotten people talking is our Foie Gras Toast we have for beachhouse at the Moana. It's really not complicated and an approachable way for people to try foie gras who aren't familiar with it. Seared Foie over a buttered baguette with an onion marmalade, parsley salad and blackberry. Crunchy, crusty, buttery, fresh, sweet and savory. And a gut buster. Publisher's Note: Agreed! Delicious!!!

Best ingredient you like to work with and why?

I don't use them that often here because quality is hit or miss but I love scallops. I always ate them growing up and have an affinity for them, whether sashimi, fresh seared, fried, as a mousse. Just adore them.

What's always in your fridge?

What's your favorite thing to do when not working?

Eating? Cooking? Or reading about eating and cooking; following other people's food adventures. My life really does revolve around food. On the rare occasion that do find the time, I love reliving my youth and hanging out with a bunch of comic books. A true nerd at the core. I dream of the day where I can be independently rich and just hang out in an enormous kitchen all day and cook whatever, having friends swing by "unannounced" like I see on those tv cooking shows. Just cooking and eating the day away and not have to worry about the mundane details of life like who folds the laundry or managing your daily caloric intake

Favorite (or least favorite) food trend?

Favorite food trend? Eating clean. Surprise! I actually do feel good and not heavy after eating "clean". Least favorite? Nothing. How can anyone not like food or things related to food? And anyone who is out there promoting their culinary creations does it because they have passion. You can't fault them for that.

What's your favorite dish to cook at home?

Since I never have a team to clean up after me at home, it's easiest to have 1 pot meals. So normally it's a big pot of soup that I can eat a couple of times, or pasta sauce. I know, not very romantic.


METHOD




