33rd Anniversary of our Fabulous Film Fest



Let's catch a movie takes on a whole new meaning at the Hawaii International Film Festival. Film fans travel from Asia, America and across the Hawaiian Islands to enjoy what HIFF has to offer. Taking a week off work may not be possible, but the idea is tempting. Happily, the Festival is not an all-or-nothing kind of event. Films fill days and evenings and individual tickets are available at the HIFF box office at the film locations. Ticket prices range from \$12 for general admission to \$8 for HIFF Ohana members and groups of 10 or more. Details are sketchy at press time but for all the info log onto www.hiff.org.

From October 10th through 20th in a variety of locations, the numbers tell the story. On the bill for 2013 – 200 films from 42 countries, 16 world premiers, 28 U.S. premieres, 2 North America premieres, 7 international premieres and 106 Hawaii premieres fill the bill.

Opening night, Saturday, October 12th at 7:00 p.m. Sunset on the Beach is free and the perfect setting to view the classic, **Blue Hawaii** starring Elvis Preseley. You may remember the story: After two years in the Army, Chad Gates returns to Hawaii, where he defies his wealthy and domineering Southern mother by refusing to take

a job in his father's prosperous pineapple business. Instead, he goes to work as a guide for the tourist agency where Maile, his French-Hawaiian girl friend, is employed.

His first assignment is to escort schoolteacher Abigail Prentace and four teenaged girls around the island. At a luau, Chad gets into a fight with a drunken tourist who has made advances toward one of the teenagers, and he is hauled off to jail. And so it goes with this don't-miss classic that gives you an opportunity to spot a few landmarks and bemoan the fact that Waikiki doesn't look like the "old days."

At other venues two additional opening night films being featured are **Final Recipe** and **The Wind Rises**, the last film from Hayao Miyazaki, dubbed the Disney of Japan. In recent years, rather than using satellite venues, HIFF was contained at one location.

Film showings this year are shared around the island, at convenient locations, reaching a variety of communities. Films will show at Dole Cannery Stadium 18 Theatres & IMAX, Consolidated Theatres Koko Marina 8, Doris Duke Theatre at the Honolulu Museum of Art, and the Hawaii Theatre Center in downtown Honolulu.

EXPLORE FASHION AT WARD CENTERS

Akihiko Izukura is a world-renowned natural fiber and textile artist who descends from a prestigious line of master silk weavers for the imperial family of Japan. Twenty of his pieces will be showcased in a gallery installation next to the runway for public viewing. In the massive space under the TJ Maxx store at Ward Center is the location for Hawaii Fashion Designers Market Kickoff Party, October 1st with food, wine, a gastropub plus the first-ever Hawaii fashion show by Izukura-san. The artist uses four different methods of fiber forming from scratch by hand: netting, braiding, weaving, and entwining. His creations are born out of his eco-friendly "zero waste" textile concept which takes the traditional process of fiber forming, dyeing, weaving, cutting, and sewing without creating any waste or throwing anything away. He suggests we must make this into a sustainable society. His silk worms are centuries ahead of us, making a thread that is highly prized. Be sure to check out all the fashion at OUTFIT. The Hawaii Fashion Designers Market follows on October 2nd and 3rd.

The Princess founded Kamehameha Schools (KS) in 1884. The Center is owned by the school and, according to Dee Jay Mailer, leader of KS, "the land of Hanohano Helumoa reflects the esteem that the kapuna, the elders have for the beloved wahi pana, a place rich in spirit and stories of our people."

Cultural advisor Manu Boyd says, "for six years our loyal fans sat on rocks and grass while dancers presented hula, dancing on slate stones. The expanded space and raised stage offers a showroom for Hawaiian heritage under the sheltering trees of Helumoa." He invites those who visit and all who work in Waikiki to visit Helumoa Hale where films, interactive information centers and staff are ready to share Hawaiian hospitality. 
NA KANE MOVE LOCATIONS

swing. What's also in full swing this October is Honolulu's arts and cultural scene. Hopefully the followings exhibits and performances will entice some of your guests – the ones who've had too much sun on their vacation and need something to distract them beyond the ever present Mai Tai at the bar and the lovely hula maiden in the lobby.

Clearly, that lovely hula maiden in the lobby is you - the concierge/travel desk expert reading this column (or handsome Hawaiian kane for you male readers). And what's the first thing that is going to come out of your mouth after the word "aloha"? It's "LEGO"! Yes, that's right, LEGO, that popular line of construction toys we all played with as kids is is bringing the blockbuster children's exhibit LEGO® Travel Adventure to BISHOP MUSEUM! In this exhibit, your guests' children are invited to create vehicles that can fly, drive and surf or even one that can do all three. The exhibit encourages children to plan for a trip to an exotic location. They must use their creativity and build a vehicle that can maneuver through all kinds of terrain such as mountain, oceans, jungles and deserts, just like Hawai'i if we consider our beaches to stand in for desert terrain. This newest LEGO exhibit, produced by the Children's Museum of Indianapolis, is filled with colorful backdrops, kidfriendly (adult friendly as well) building activities and eye-popping LEGO sculptures. The show opens October 5 and runs until January 5, 2014 so you can suggest this to your guests with children until the end of the year. This exhibit may not the Hawaiian experience your guests were looking for while visiting Hawai'i but it will be an adventure their kids will not forget.

Another thing your guests will not forget while visiting BISHOP MUSEUM is the three floors of Hawaiian Hall where you guests take a journey through the different realms of Hawai'i from the gods, legends and beliefs of pre-contact Hawai'i to the importance of the land and finally to the key moments in Hawaiian history that make these islands one of the most distinctive places to live on the planet. Don't forget to tell your guests to visit the new Pacific Hall, (formerly known as Polynesian Hall), which explores the various historical and cultural connections between the peoples of the Pacific. This new and improved exhibit tells the story of where Hawaiians came from and the larger account of Pacific cultures and their migration around the world. This permanent exhibit features archaeological findings, many of them never seen before, along with objects of beauty and power that help tell the rich stories of Pacific Islanders. Your guests will see one of the world's best collections of model canoes, including one made by master navigator Mau Piailug. In addition, your guests will see a Tahitian mourning costume collected during Captain Cook's voyages, a trio of imposing wooden slit drums from Vanuatu (CBS's Survivor reality show did a season there); and an actual

fishing canoe with outrigger and sail from Fiji.

And if all of the above isn't enough to entertain your guests, suggest they stop by the Museum's Long Gallery to see a private collection of over 60 stunning and pristine lei that make up an exhibit entitled

Ni'ihau Shell Lei: Ocean Origins, Living Traditions. Your guests will examine the science behind Ni'ihau shells, as well as its manufacturing history and the mast craftsmen who make them. This exhibit opens on October 26 and runs through January 27, 2014. General admission for BISHOP MUSEUM is \$19.95 for adults, \$16.95 for seniors 65 and over, \$14.95 for kids 4 to 12 and FREE for 3 and under. The museum is open Wednesday to Monday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Museum is closed to the public on Tuesdays and on Christmas Day. For more information on this and other exhibits and special events go to BishopMuseum.org.

If your guests are fans of artist Georgia O'Keefe and photographer Ansel Adams, you should send them down to the HONOLULU MUSEUM OF **ART** this fall to experience how these two artists unmasked what they saw beyond the beaches of Hawai'i. Both artists are famously associated with specific places - O'Keeffe with the American Southwest and Adams for his photography of Yosemite National Park. Both artists also visited Hawai'i at the height of their careers and captured the islands' extraordinary sense of place. The exhibit, The Hawai'i Pictures, reexamines each artist's Hawaiian interlude to reveal that the islands profoundly moved them and had an enduring influence on their subsequent work. The exhibition includes a selection of painting associated with O'Keeffe's 1939 trip to Hawai'i to create illustrations for print advertisements for the Hawaiian Pineapple Company (now the Dole Company). During her twomonth stay, O'Keeffe visited O'ahu, Maui, Kaua'i, and Hawai'i Island, painting dramatic coastlines, volcanic terrain, traditional tools, and exotic flora. Adams's photographs of Hawai'i were also the result of a commission. He first visited the islands in 1948 to take photographs for a series on national parks for the Department of the Interior, and returned in 1957 for a commemorative publication for Bishop National Bank of Hawai'i (now First Hawaiian Bank). The show travels to the Georgia O'Keefe Museum in February 2014, so there is still plenty of time for your guests to enjoy how two of America's respected artists saw and experienced Hawai'i. 

There are moments in music, art and adventure that are so good that I need to call for a replay! OK, too many hours watching what my Aussie pals call the "footie", and shouting "show me that again" so they

can sort out their bets. I told them, here we call it hana hou!

ROYAL MOMENTS - For those who missed the big day of celebration or the month of walking tours in and around the 'Iolani Palace that told the history of Queen Lili'uokalani, be assured, the music lingers on. A state-wide library tour, called "He Lei, He Aloha, A Lei of Love" travels Oahu first, followed by each of the neighbor islands. The program celebrates the queen and the fact that our library system is one hundred years old this year. The schedule is available on librarieshawaii.org and the presentations are free. Times vary from morning to mid-day to evening. Meleanna Aluli Meyer, artist, art-educator, filmmaker, and decendant of Emma Nawahi, a close confidante of the Queen, will facilitate the 45-minute presentations. The program will feature readings from "Hawaii's Story by Hawaii's Queen", a 10minute film vignette, "Ku'u 'Aina Aloha", expressing love for the islands and a sing-along of some of the Queen's music, no doubt including "Aloha 'Oe", written by the Queen after she observed two sweethearts walking and talking, and eventually, she surmised, bidding each other

Maile Meyer, organizer of the programs and sister to Meleanna, says they have no less than twenty-four books on the Queen at her store, Na Mea Native Books at Ward Warehouse. Presenting my cultural programs in Waikiki, I get dozens of questions from visitors about the royalty, the Palace and our Queen. The library programs are suitable for age 12 and up and a call in advance can organize a sign language interpreter or other special accommodation.

MAGIC MOMENTS – Another "don't miss" is any chance to you get to see the Brothers Cazimero. Their September Hawaii Theatre concert tribute to the Queen was "take your breath away" great. Several fans described it as "like having the Caz in our living room."

The thing about the Brothers is that they are the only musicians that chit-chat on stage loud enough so we can all hear, and they are engaging and funny. These sometimes-stand-up-comics sing what pleases them and can toss in a song if they think the audience needs to hear it. (causing the sound and lights folks to go, "huh? what?") So, put it on the calendar now, and send friends and

guests. Really, this sells out! The Brothers will be singing in the season with their Cazimero Christmas concert on the weekend of December 13th, again at Hawaii Theatre.

MOVIE MOMENTS – See the page one story on the Hawaii International Film Festival and find a way to work a few films into your life. Sunset on the Beach is a reason to facebook, tweet, twitter and hash tag, from Waikiki, to every mainland friend you have. I think they call it gloating.

MAKING WAVES – Laura Smith, extraordinary wood cut artist and former head of the Honolulu Printmakers shop at Linekona, takes viewers on a swim with her intricate prints, using the grain of the wood like water. Her work is showing in ektopia. No, that isn't a country, it's a gallery in Kaimuki created by Allan Jim. The artist's postcard has the tag line, "ek-topos – "out of place." The factory high walls give Smith's work the space to swim and 3167 Waialae Avenue in Kaimuki is a perfect place for a gallery.

MOM (and dad) MOMENTS — The pristine valley of Kualoa is a place of adventure with a Jurrasic feel. ATV's and horseback tours are thrilling if you are ready for adventure. 

Chef's Corner

Park Restaurant Executive Chef Michael Collantes

Park Restaurant recently opened in the former Diamond Head Grill location, or for you old-school types, Bobby McGee's. Having worked for some of the best chefs in the world, he was in Florida trying to open his own restaurnt when he saw an ad recruiting for this position. The rest as they say.. is history.

When did you get your start as a chef?

I went to culinary school right after high school but I have been working with food since I was 16. It wasn't until I landed a position at Joel Robuchon's L'Atelier at 23 when I knew I was on a serious path to be a chef.

What sparked your passion about the kitchen?

I grew up in the age of chefs on TV and it was nothing more than "Yang Can Cook" to late night episodes of "Iron Chef" that caused me to even entertain the thought of going to cooking school. Besides that I was a C+ student at best.

What is your favorite childhood food memory?

I was a chubby kid, and I remember one time I could not sleep so my Grandmother made me these breakfast sausages. It was nothing special, just the frozen ones from the store but it was just perfect. I was young but remember her speaking to me about the Philippines and my Grandfather, and that's what I knew love was - to get up in the middle of the night and sit with me. Food is so much about time and place.

Who would you consider your mentor and why?

I worked for Jennifer Carroll at 10 Arts Bistro by Eric Ripert (and *Top Chef* fame) for a short amount of time and we worked together in other projects since then. She has and will always be someone who showed me what a chef really is, inside and out of the kitchen. I was her sous chef on and off the clock and she really let me run wild with creativity and find my own path.

Robuchon. The name is iconic. You worked for a guy that was named Chef of the Century. How was that?

I didn't know what it meant to work for perfection until I worked there. That experience was HARD, plain and simple. To be at that level of service, cuisine and focus you have to be humble and have the desire to work extremely hard. I took away from that restaurant more than just an amazing name on the CV and great techniques but the mentality to keep high standards and expect only the best and give only the best to our guests.

Describe your culinary point of view.

Keep cooking progressive. Not just in the technique but continually evolve, adapt and move forward in the cuisine. So much of cooking is personal and when you come to the restaurant you'll find food we are extremely proud of. Our food may change with the seasons or be inspired by new ingredients and interesting techniques or occasion.

be the result of culinary mishaps that may just turn out better than anticipated or desired.

What was the one dish you remember the most?

The dish that I crave and desire the most would be a simple spaghetti with meat sauce that my father has always made since we were kids. It is nothing more than what it is - tomatoes from a can, oddly cut and cooked green peppers, ground meat and some chopped up hotdogs and, you cannot forget the amazing pre-grated parmesan with that green label. I get to have that single dish maybe once a year when I see them and it makes me feel safe, at peace and at home and the familiarity of that equals comfort.

Who would you be most excited to see in your restaurant? Any of my old chefs would make me feel excited. Any of them who has seen and remember me in their kitchen and can see my progression to where I am today would be great. It would be validation that the hard work they put into me payed off and I am hopefully doing something special and note worthy for them. We all put so much into being a chef that the one great thing I would like to see is someone I mentored really be successful.

What ingredients should one always have on hand?

Fleur de sel. I'm so used to tasting food that is well seasoned during service that our palates are less prone to salt then most so I usually have a little bit stashed with me.

What's your favorite midnight snack?

I usually go with something Asian. Asian food, for me, just always has what I am looking for - spicy, salty, acidic, sweet, crunchy all at the same time.

Where are you from originally?

I spent a good amount of my early years in New Jersey and my young adult life in Florida. I have been traveling for my career at an early age of 21 and it really grew into a love for travel.

What's your favorite part about living in the islands?

The weather! I also have an amazing church and community of people who really took us in to be part of the aloha spirit.

What do you have planned for Park?

We are seriously working hard to bring a new experience to the already great food scene here and we want to offer a place you can come back to again and again for any occasion.

Watermelon Salad

INGREDIENTS

5 oz. Watermelon 2 oz. Watermelon Marinade 2 tbsp Smoked Paprika Oil Popcorn

1 oz. Citrus Vinaigrette .2 oz Micro greens Shallot brunoise ½ oz. Stilton blue cheese

¹/₂ cup Arugula 1 tbsp Mint

Salt and Pepper

WATERMELON MARINADE

2 ea. lime (juice and zest) 250 gr. olive oil

10 gr. salt 15 gr. harissa

CITRUS VINAIGRETTE

1 ea. lemon juice and zest 1 ea. lime juice and zest 200 gr. ver jus vinegar 400g olive oil



SMOKED PAPRIKA OIL

100g olive oil & $15g\ smoke$ paprika Mix & bring up to 62c. for one hour. Cool

METHOD: 1. Take rind off watermelon and reserve. Cut watermelon into five 1-inch thick cubes and place into a vac bag with watermelon marinade and compress in vacuum machine. Let marinade for an hour. Grill watermelon on plancha and brush watermelon marinade on top, char all sides. 2. In a dry pot add popcorn and cover with foil. Once popped add paprika oil and tsp salt. 3. Toss arugula with citrus vinaigrette, salt and pepper then plate. Toss watermelon with shallots, mint, salt and citrus vinaigrette and plate on top of arugula. 4. Garnish with blue cheese, popcorn and mound of arugula salad on the side. Garnish plate with smoked paprika oil.




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
