OCTOBER 19, 2000

**The Annual Membership Meeting** was held on Thursday, October 19, 2000 at the Sunset Lake Hall. The meeting began at 7:00 P.M. with all Board Directors present. President Lou Long stated that a quorum had been reached with 52 members present, plus 31 members represented by proxy, making a total of 83 Class "A" memberships eligible to vote.

**President's Remarks** Pres. Lou Long asked the new members to stand and identify themselves. Vicki Gaillard #116A and Evan & JoAnn Cain #131 stood and introduced themselves, and Pres. Lou Long welcomed them to the Lake. Pres. Lou Long acknowledged #286 Ed Snell, #277 Bob Sons and #3,4 Allan Sharp for attending Monthly meetings regularly. Lou said in the 5 years since he had been President, Ed Snell had only missed 2 meetings, and Bob Sons and Allan Sharp have been present at most meetings, as well, and he thanked them for their interest in the Association. Pres. Lou Long asked #89 Paul & Shirley Erley to stand and thanked them for volunteering to take lake water tests for the EPA twice a month.

**Approval of the Minutes of the 1999 Annual Meeting.** The motion to accept the Minutes was made by #51 Marvin Wingo, and seconded by #117 Roxine Burch. The motion carried.

#### **Committee Chairperson's Reports:**

**Aquatic Control, Recreation & Water Safety Committee.** Chairman John Munchalfen #221, said he is the "lake cop", but he also deals with the Dept. of Natural Resources and lake stocking. He said there were a lot of parties, picnics, fishing, boating and skiing on the lake this summer. On Safety issues, he towed boats that ran out of gas, pulled branches out of the lake, and had to slow some boaters down when they shouldn't be running fast. He asked everyone to please read the rules on fast times and days, because some were pushing the clock. He said he tries to give everyone the benefit of the doubt, but everyone needs to be aware of fast days and times. Members on the lake also watch and report problems to the office or to him. So remember that other members are watching, too.

On stocking the lake, John reported that 75% of the fish to be stocked will be Walleye and the other 25% will be Red Ear or Catfish from Opal's Fish Hatchery. They will be here around the end of October with our fish. John added that Walleye ship better in cooler weather than other species. John thanked those who helped him patrol the lake, and reported that there were no accidents. #62 John Schwandner asked if the lake was evaluated/shocked this year? John Munchalfen answered no. John Schwandner said it is supposed to be done every 3 years. Ray Reardon said the Dept. of Conservation couldn't come this year, but said they would be able to come out next spring. #117 Roxine Burch asked if the Dept. of Conservation dipped goose eggs this year, because there seemed to be more geese, now. John Munchalfen answered that Conservation doesn't do it now, because we take care of it ourselves through the Dept. of Fish & Wildlife. He said 2 Board members and Bill Hohimer dipped eggs several times this spring. We also have migrating geese as well, which can make it seem like there are a lot more.

**Building & Construction Committee.** Chairman Ed Smith reported that we had fewer permits this year because there were no new houses built and fewer lots available to sell and build on. Ed said there were 2 house additions, 3 new docks, 3 extensions on docks and 2 docks covered, 4 decks, and 5 sheds. He added that we will continue to get less revenue from Building Permits in the future.

**Farm Management.** Chairman John Earley reported that in his 16 years on the Board, he has seen a lot of changes: pastures turned into parks, brush turned into bushes, mud holes turned into bays after dredging, and he complimented Bill Hohimer for taking good care of our grounds. He added that this year there was more mowing than usual (over 300 hours), so Bill spent more time keeping our grounds looking nice. Fifteen (15) trees were planted around the south side of Circle Dr. and around the Hall. We will continue to plant ornamental trees around the lake to beautify our surroundings. But, everything that is planted means that Bill has to mow around them. He asked the members to try to keep up with leave raking this year, and if you can't, let us know, so we can help you find someone to do it. Otherwise, the leaves will blow into the lake and encourage aerobic matter to grow. If they come down in the bays, the leaves will take a long time to brake down.

The farm was Cash Rented last year to Gary & Ron Hays, and this is the first year corn was planted since 1984. John added that many members don't want corn planted, but crops must be rotated and the price of wheat made it unprofitable to plant. So, beans and corn will be rotated, or we can renegotiate our contract. John added that some leveling will be done in the middle of the farm area due to settling. He said we will continue to Cash Rent the hay & grass filter strip on the East side to stop siltation from the fields. #149 Ernie Neuman asked how much we are getting on the farm per acre? John answered around \$111 per acre, but it was out of production for 4 years, so it hasn't been eligible for government payments, but will be in 2

years. We have just renewed our contract for another 2 years. #117 Roxine Burch said if we can afford to pay off the Silt Loan and the Building, plus getting this income on the farm, why aren't our assessments reduced? John answered that it would be up to the Board, and that the Association needs to build up a surplus for emergencies. John also added that the next project will be to replace the shed, which is getting pretty bad. All our equipment will not even fit into the old shed. He said we do not have a surplus, yet. Lou Long added that we have paid off our loans without raising assessments in 4 years, so we are doing really well at managing our funds. Lou added that we don't have enough for emergencies, such as repairing cracks in the dam, so we need to build up an emergency fund, plus we will have to replace the shed one of these days, as well. Ken Volz said that at Otter Lake, you pay \$750 a season and can't even live there year round. Roxine Burch said she wanted to make sure our assessments were being used efficiently, and she was under the impression that when the farm went back into production, there would be excess funds available to lower assessments. Lou Long said we have managed to keep our assessments the same for four years when our expenses have been going up.

Lou Long introduced Al Tretter next and added that Al won't be running for re-election, and will be greatly missed.

**Legal & Insurance.** Chairman Al Tretter reported on Legal issues first we try to collect on overdue accounts ourselves, and then turn them over to our Attorney, which has been done again this year. We also have a bankruptcy pending that will incur more legal expenses, but it should be over soon. Our attorney was also called in on a septic problem. Al said we don't call our attorney except when absolutely necessary. On insurance, Al said our coverage, company and agent remain the same, but our premiums are going up. We bought a new truck, so our Commercial Auto policy went up, as well as the normal increases one would expect. He suggested that the new Board would probably be going out for bids again.

**Roads & Grounds Maintenance.** Chairman George Madiar added in reference to Roxine Burch's question on assessments, that they were raised from \$235 to \$250 by #158 Fred Gates' motion to improve the roads. We now oil & rock 1/3 of the roads each year, and he wanted to thank Bill Hohimer for doing such a good job. George said that we put speed bumps on North Lake Dr. last year and it slowed most drivers down. Due to the rise in the cost of oil, the roads could cost us more this year and could next year, as well. He said that we budgeted \$7500 this year and next, and he hoped it would be enough. George thanked Bill Hohimer again for taking care of the roads so nicely.

**Sanitation, Shoreline & Boat Docks.** Chairman Ken Volz congratulated everyone for their cooperation on putting chlorine tablets in their septic systems this year. He said he was very appreciative of everyone's hard work to comply with our Sanitation program. He asked for a poll of the members on whether they would like to pay to have chlorine tablets in for them for a small fee? #2 Ron Morrow said everyone can take care of their own, and Ken should carry tablets with him to fill bottles that are empty, and then fine them. #152 Loudene Walker said she thought it was a good idea for the elderly or disabled members, who could use the help. There were no other comments. Ken said we have been in touch with the Dept. of Health and the IL. EPA concerning aeration systems, and we will continue to investigate this issue for the safety of the lake.

**Water Quality, Soil Conservation & Restoration.** Chairman Ray Reardon thanked the Erleys for volunteering to take water samples again this year, and he said we got free testing from the IL. EPA, which helps us establish a baseline to judge from. Ray reported that the phosphorous readings have gone down in the past year. He said this is probably the main reason we don't have much of a problem with algae or duckweed. The total nitrogen average was .035, which is very good. The total ammonia nitrogen averaged out to .32, and anything less than 15 is good. Total phosphorous was .028 and anything less than .05 is good, and between .05 and .08 is our normal reading, so this has really come down in the past few years. Ray said the reduction of water fowl and the use of no-phosphate or low phosphate soaps, plus chlorination of septic effluents has made a considerable difference. Total suspended solids came out to be 3 and anything equal to or less than 5 is considered minimal and has to do with blue-green algae staying so low the last 6 years. Volatile Suspended Solids' reading was 1.5 and is considered very low for this type of lake in Illinois. Ray said that we also test for chlorophyll, which tested out at an average of 8.96, and between 7.5 and 20 means there is a slight amount of algae. On Pheophytin, which is an indicator of dead algae, we had 7.09 and anything under 10 is considered good. Ray continued to say that we periodically test for fecal coliform, and the standard for bathing beaches is if there is a count of 200 milliliters there is cause for concern, and a test of 500 will shut down a beach. Our tests were taken while we had no water going over the spillway for over a year and the lake was down from lack of rain, and our tests ranged between 8 and 106, which is excellent under these conditions. Ray said that this test came out so well in large part due to Ken Volz checking on chlorine compliance and the membership doing so well at keeping chlorine tablets in their sanitation systems.

Ray addressed the re-establishment of water weeds in the lake after the chemical treatment in 1990. Water Willow, Cattail, Arrowhead and Water Primrose are re-establishing themselves in the lake. Water Primrose should be watched. He said that the DNR will be available in early spring 2001 to come out and sample the croppies to find out if they have health problems or are over-populated, because they are staying so small. #117 Roxine Burch asked if this information will be in the newsletter? Ray answered yes, if the in-

formation is available at the time, because sometimes they have to come back for more samples to determine the problem.

Pres. Lou Long introduced the new Finance Chairman, Joe Clevenger, explaining that Bob Hanauer was forced to resign in July due to his health. Lou said that Joe has done a very good job acquainting himself with his new duties in the last three months, and that he has put a good Budget together for the year 2001.

**Finance.** Chairman Joe Clevenger said that our current financial position is excellent. He informed the membership that the Secretary, Peggy Volz, has computerized our accounting using QuickBooksPro, the Silt Loan was paid off last spring, eliminating the extra \$120.00 Silt Assessment some are paying on. Joe continued by saying that we bought a new  $\frac{3}{4}$  ton Chev. Pickup truck with a hoist and snow plow, all paid for from the Equipment Reserve that had built up over the years. We also purchased a new Dell computer with a modem and are now on-line at [sunset@royell.net](mailto:sunset@royell.net). He said that Bill Hohimer keeps our equipment maintained in excellent condition, and oversaw the roadwork and driveways. Joe also informed the members that the Accounts Receivables has been reduced from \$7600 to \$5852 so far this year. #96,96A Dan Lawson agreed to pay \$300 per month for 16 months, and March and Secrist were turned over to our attorney, after they failed to respond to our enquires. Joe referred to the Cash Position and said that after our bills are paid, we will have a carry-over of about \$15,000. He said we need to build up a surplus to possibly replace our lawn mower, build a new shed and to pay any unforeseen expenses, such as repair of the dam. Otherwise, we are in excellent financial condition.

**Questions & Answers** - #62 Carol Schwandner asked if the Board or the Secretary have a list of chemicals not to use around the lake? Ray Reardon answered that soaps with low or no phosphates should be used, but not to use powdered soaps for clothes or dishes. Carol also asked about the use of Rid-X in the septic system, and Ray said to use it or a similar product, like Enforcer, to encourage bacterial growth.

#113 Laura Mauk added that we shouldn't use bacteria-killing soaps, because that will go into the septic and kill the bacteria there, too. John Earley said in the late 1980's, no-till was really pushed to help stop erosion and run-off, but more fertilizers were used on the surface, which ran off into the lake. We saw an explosion of aquatic weeds in the lake. Chemicals were introduced to the lake to kill off the weeds and we haven't had to do it again. Plus, farmers stopped spreading manure and have no livestock in our watershed, which decreased the fecal coliform count as well.

**Approval of 2001 Budget** - Joe Clevenger explained that most of our income comes from assessments and then transfer fees. He noted that income from Boat Stickers, Building Permits and Cable TV were down a bit, but Bill Hohimer made extra money for the Association, which offsets that. The total Budget for 2001 is up \$1200 from last year, at \$102,400. He said the expenses are about the same except for salaries. He explained that Bill makes us extra money, and Peggy has more responsibilities now, particularly New Member Orientations done at the buyers' convenience in the evenings or Saturdays. Joe submitted the Budget for approval to the membership. #62 John Schwandner asked why Boat Permits were lower than last year, and Joe said the figures are based on this year's Budget and we didn't get as many Boat Stickers. John Schwandner said he saw 4 boats without stickers last Sunday out on the lake. John Munchalfen said he went around and left a reminder on members' boats to get new stickers last spring, so there must have been a reduction in the number of boats registered in the office, and this is hard to predict. John Munchalfen said that Boat Permits are now annual and some may not remember that it was changed several years ago. #219 Jim Rice made the motion to accept the Budget as proposed, and #115,116 George Toepfer seconded it. It passed overwhelmingly with 1 nay.

**Election of Directors** - Pres. Lou Long explained that there are 9 Board members, who serve for 3-year terms. Joe Clevenger was appointed to fill the 2-year term of Bob Hanauer, and Joe is running for the remainder of that 2-year term. Lou Long called for nominations. #62 Carol Schwandner nominated Joe Clevenger, and #269-270 Ken Boyd seconded it. There were no other nominations. Joe Clevenger was overwhelming elected by acclamation.

Pres. Lou Long explained that the three-year terms of Ed Smith, Al Tretter and himself were up, and Al Tretter and Lou Long were not running for re-election. He called for nominations from the floor. #66 George Madiar nominated #54 Ed Smith, and #277 Bob Sons seconded it. #286 Ed Snell nominated #277 Bob Sons, and #149 Ernie Neuman seconded it. #62 John Schwandner nominated #49C Greg Carpenter, and #89 Paul Erley seconded it. #277 Bob Sons nominated #3,4 Allan Sharp, and #256A,257 Ray Reardon seconded it. #122-123 Marilyn Galvan made the motion to close the nominations, and #9B Ken Volz seconded it. Pres. Lou Long called for a ballot vote, but first he asked each nominee to come to the front and introduce themselves to the membership. #3,4 Allan Sharp introduced himself first. Allan Sharp said he & his wife, Delores, have been married for 20+ years, and they have lived on the lake for 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  years. The main reason they moved to Sunset Lake was because of the Rules enacted by this Board. He said he is a retired truck driver and owns several businesses, worked for an insurance company at their home office in Chicago, has an inactive real estate & broker's license, plus further education at Lincoln Land Community College, and would like to do a good job for the Association if elected. #277 Bob Sons introduced himself, and said his wife's name is Teresa,

and he runs Bob Sons Construction, comes to the meetings regularly because he cares about the lake and wants to help out as much as he can. #54 Ed Smith said he has lived in the area for 20+ years, ran a bait business on the other side of Otter Lake, has been on the Board for the past 3 years and served as the Building Permit Chairman, and he would like to continue the direction the Board has been going in the last few years. #62 John Schwandner spoke for #49C Greg Carpenter, who was not in attendance. John said Greg retired from AT&T up around Chicago and is presently working at the State Bank of Auburn, and would like to serve on the Board. Pres. Lou Long said that Directors are not honorary positions, but must follow the Rules & Regulations, and conduct business with diligence and dispatch. He said we need good representatives who will work for the betterment of the lake and the membership. A ballot vote was called for the four (4) nominations. #149 Ernie Newman served as an impartial observer of the vote count. The vote was 63 for Ed Smith, 71 for Bob Sons, 71 for Allan Sharp and 24 for Greg Carpenter. Lou Long announced that Ed Smith, Bob Sons and Allan Sharp won.

**Old Business** - Lou Long asked that all members who have not filled out the forms for the Girard Fire Dept., to please do so as soon as possible. John Munchalfen said he is on the Fire Dept. and this information is vital in an emergency or fire. The information has not been updated since 1993 and lets the Fire & Rescue Squad know how many people to look for in a fire, the directions to your house, where the propane tank and electrical is, etc. John said the forms can be mailed directly to the address at the top of the form or dropped off at the office.

**New Business** - Lou Long asked if there was any new business. #286 Ed Snell said he commended the Board who built the Community Center, and particularly Bob Hanauer, who was instrumental in getting the project done. Ed Snell made the motion to name the hall Hanauer Hall, in appreciation to Bob Hanauer. Lou Long agreed and added that Bob Hanauer will be honored at the Girard Football game coming up. #223 Sue Long said that Bob is very ill and needs all our prayers, and agreed with Ed Snell's motion. #51 Marv Wingo seconded the motion to name the hall Hanauer Hall. The motion passed by unanimous consensus.

Lou Long said how proud he was of the entire Board for all the work they have done. He presented a plaque to Al Tretter, who is retiring after 11 years on the Board. Lou praised the work Al had done on reducing our insurance and taking care of our legal matters, and for serving in a voluntary capacity for 11 years. Al Tretter was honored and surprised to receive his plaque. Lou continued by saying, we also have a plaque for Bob Hanauer who worked very hard for 5 years to improve conditions for all the membership. He said Bob could not be here, but that he would present the plaque to Bob the next day at his home. Lou said it was a real pleasure to work with a Vice President as energetic and hard working as Bob always was, and that the Association was very lucky to have such a man on the Board.

John Earley got up and told the membership that those weren't the only plaques to be awarded this evening. John presented Lou Long with a plaque for 6 years of hard work as President, and added that he was like a wonderful Grandfather to not only his children as they grew up, but to the Association as well. John said that Lou's heart was always in the best interest of the Association and he thanked Lou for his diligence, his gift of arbitration and for representing the Association in the best light possible. Lou Long was overwhelmed by the surprise of getting a plaque in his honor and was most grateful and appreciative. Lou said it was his honor to serve the Association and work with such wonderful people. The Secretary, Peggy Volz, told the members that a few days ago, fresh flowers were delivered to her at the office from Lou Long for assisting him during his time as President, and she wanted to tell everyone how much that meant to her.

#2 Ron Morrow referred back to the straw poll Ken Volz had asked the members to consider about having someone put chlorine in their chlorine chambers for a fee. Ron Morrow suggested that Ken carry chlorine with him to put in systems that were out, and put tablets in, but only charge for the tablets. Basically, that is what Ken has already done in the past.

Ed Smith told the membership that if anyone would like to donate some time to assist those who can not clean up their leaves for health reasons or to help with anything else, please leave your name with the Secretary, because sometimes we can use all the help we can get. Ed added that the office is open Monday through Friday for the members to stop in for any reason.

#286 Ed Snell made the motion to adjourn, and #141 Hilda Bettis seconded it. The motion carried by acclamation. The meeting adjourned at 8:40PM.

### **REASON FOR BYLAW:**

All Lake Membership have a vested interest in the actions and decisions made by the Board of Directors of the Sunset Lake Association. This Board represents the Membership as a whole and their decisions can either improve Sunset Lake or cause potential harm. Since the Lake Membership has the right to elect Board Members, the Lake Membership has the right to remove Board Members.

### **REASONS FOR REMOVAL:**

The following is a list of reasons for removal. This is not a comprehensive list but is a starting point. This Amendment can only be changed with approval of Lake Membership.

- Missing the minimum required meetings to remain a Board Member.
- Negligence caused from not following the rules, regulations and bylaws resulting in:
  - Any action, Legal or otherwise that may cause a financial burden to Lake Membership (assessments).
  - Any action, Legal or otherwise that might cause financial burden to the Lake Association funds for maintaining the lake.
- Conflict of Interest.
- Gross unprofessional behavior resulting in physical or verbal abuse of any Lake Membership.
- Flagrant violation of existing rules, regulations and by-laws that we all live by.

### **WAYS OF REMOVAL:**

A Board Member can be removed from office two ways.

- A majority vote of the other Board Members with a majority quorum vote approval by the Lake Membership.
- Any Lake Member providing a petition with signatures from at least 10% of the Lake Membership.

### **ACTIONS FOR REMOVAL:**

#### ***Board Member Majority Vote:***

1. The Board must have reason and evidence for removal.
2. The Board will notify the Lake Membership of meeting either in next normal meeting or possible special meeting, providing date and time.
3. The Lake Membership will be given at least two weeks notice for review. The only exception would be an emergency.
4. The expected meeting place is the SUNSET LAKE ASSOCIATION offices.
5. Requires a majority quorum vote of Lake Members at the meeting to approve or disapprove, including proxy votes.

#### ***Lake Membership Petition:***

- The petition with signatures is presented to a Board member.
- The petition must list the reason and evidence for removal.
- Petition must have at signatures from at least 10% of the Lake Membership.
- Steps two thru five above would be followed.

This amendment is to apply to the existing Board Members and all future Board Members once it is passed.
