From our Co-directors

Bigger and better!

In September of 2018 the Learning Centre for Hamilton officially opened on Tuesdays and Thursdays with four tutors providing two Orton-Gillingham lessons per week to four children with dyslexia. The goal was to improve the reading and spelling skills of those children. Since then, those children have graduated from the Learning Centre program and have either successfully graduated from or are experiencing success in their last years of secondary school.

In September of 2023 the certified and accredited Learning Centre for Hamilton officially opens Monday through Thursday with 14 tutors providing two Orton-Gillingham lessons per week to 16 children with dyslexia. With training from Meredith Hutchings and the involvement of 45 volunteers (including Board members, tutors, volunteer co-ordinator and Bear Bulletin editor) and various service people from Hamilton and surrounding areas, a very successful program has been established and will be delivered.

In five years, we have grown and have learned to be better each year in having a welcoming, supportive, and professional Learning Centre.

In August, after a 2-year process, the Learning Centre for Hamilton was officially accredited by IMSLEC (International Multisensory Structured Language Education Council). Since officially opening in September 2018, many people involved with the Learning Centre for Hamilton have worked hard to have it become a professional Learning Centre recognized by the Scottish Rite and now also acknowledged by IMSLEC. Great thanks and congratulations to Tutor-Trainer Meredith Hutchings and every individual involved in the extensive process to become IMSLEC accredited. Everyone connected to the Learning Centre for Hamilton will continue to work hard to provide the best professional services and standards to children with dyslexia.

Welcome to the new and welcome back to the returning children and their families, tutors and volunteers! Welcome back to the Board members. Welcome back tutor-trainer Meredith Hutchings. They say it takes a community to raise a child. At the Learning Centre for Hamilton, it takes a dedicated and committed team to give a child with dyslexia the gift of reading and spelling.

From our Tutor-Trainer

We are very lucky to have attracted some very experienced new tutors to the Learning Centre for Hamilton. Five new tutors have begun training and will start tutoring in early October. This brings our tutor count to a grand total of thirteen tutoring sixteen children. The Centre is growing nicely!

This summer six days of training saw the five new tutors get started, as well as additional training delivered to five other tutors. Welcome Margaret, Barb, Leah, Megan and Iris. You can learn more about them on the next page and see what an accomplished group they are. Training will continue throughout the fall with more modules being taught to the new tutors, and everyone being observed at least once.

Observations are a mandatory part of the training with every tutor required to have at least eight observations completed successfully to become a Certified Orton-Gillingham Practitioner. Written feedback is provided about every part of the lesson to ensure that the delivery of the lesson is smooth, accurate, and at as brisk a pace as the child can manage. This apprenticeship approach ensures that each child receives a quality lesson delivered with complete integrity to the OG technique which has been designed to rewire the dyslexic brain. Each lesion is crafted according to what the tutor sees is required for that child to progress towards fluency in reading and spelling.

The other big news is that the Scottish Rite Charitable Foundation Learning Centre for Hamilton has been accredited by the International Multisensory Structured Language Education Council! IMSLEC is considered one of the finest organizations training Certified Orton-Gillingham Practitioners and is recognized as such by the International Dyslexia Association. The process for our Centre to become accredited has involved a team from the Centre. All aspects of the Centre have been scrutinized to meet the stringent criteria for accreditation. The Hamilton Centre can now share the IMSLEC logo with all Certified tutors. We are confident this will help us to gain recognition as a Centre delivering high-quality intervention for children with dyslexia. We look forward to sharing and learning from other IMSLEC accredited Centres to help us as we grow.
