

TUTOR TRAINER'S MESSAGE

I am so pleased to be able to update you about the progress of training at the Learning Centre for Hamilton.

During the summer, four new tutors began their training with the first two modules of the nine required to become a Certified Orton-Gillingham Practitioner. The third module was delivered in September, and this covers all the phonograms and concepts that will be taught in Level 1 of the 5-level program we teach at the Learning Centre. Once these three modules have been taught, tutors can begin to work with their child. So, immediately following the training, these new tutors watched while the tutor trainer delivered the first lesson to their child. The Baxters had prepared all the tutoring rooms beautifully, so each child felt special and welcomed with their materials all ready and labelled with their names.

TUTOR TRAINER'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

The new children all seemed to fit in well to the routines and parents were excited to see the process begin for their children. It is exciting to see these new matches get started! The new tutors have prepared first lessons and had the tutor trainer look these over before delivering to their child. This process will continue for a minimum of 100 lessons with at least two children over the next two years. The training process is like an apprenticeship and is intensive.

In a few weeks, once lessons have been delivered for a few weeks, the new tutors will be observed, and feedback provided to ensure that the OG technique is being delivered with precision. Two observations have been scheduled with these new tutors for the fall. In addition, returning tutors are also scheduled to be observed and receive further training as they continue their process to become certified.

Also, this fall, the new tutors will receive further training to prepare them to tutor Level 2 concepts with their children during the winter and spring months.

We are very lucky to have a Speech Language Pathologist join us a tutor in training. Collen Reinhart has agreed to deliver a presentation about the development of language in children which is part of the training program for all tutors. We hope to have her provide this information during an online session, during the winter months when the tutor trainer does not travel to the Learning Centre. This will give us a lovely opportunity to come together as a group over the winter months!

With our growing numbers, the tutor trainer is also scheduled to meet with children and their parents who have applied and been accepted to receive tutoring services at the Learning Centre. This will provide us with baselines for these children. Baselines help us know where to start the tutoring process, provide the tutor trainer and Centre Directors a chance to get to know the children a bit so they can be best matched with a tutor, and provide some data for us to track the progress of children over their three years at the Learning Centre.

In addition to the new tutors, we have our three tutors in training returning, our certified tutors, the Baxters, potentially another group of tutors to begin training, and a tutor returning from a maternity leave! We can soon boast that we have ten tutors working with a dozen children!

This is huge progress, and everyone involved with the Learning Centre for Hamilton should feel very proud of how far we have come so quickly, and despite a pandemic!

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
