## Dyslexia as a Gift

There are amazing people in our world who are very successful and have dyslexia. They succeeded not despite their dyslexia, but because of it. Rather than dyslexia being seen as a disability it can be seen as a gift. What does this mean?

Dyslexia was first identified in the 1880s as a condition or learning disability that interfered with the ability to read, spell, and write fluently. Historically, dyslexia has been thought as a deficit, but through a large body of research dyslexia is associated with several cognitive strengths. Often those with dyslexia share these common strengths: higher-than-normal intelligence, use the brain to alter and create perceptions, are highly aware of the environment, more curious than average, think in pictures instead of words, highly intuitive and insightful, use all the senses, have vivid imaginations, can see the big picture, divergent thinkers, can come up with multiple solutions, extraordinary creative abilities, so often excel in fields like art, architecture, and engineering.


