From our Co-directors

Since opening in September 2018 the Learning Centre for Hamilton has been successfully meeting its goals. The Learning Centre has been up and running in-person Tuesdays and Thursdays since the end September. Nine tutors have been providing Orton-Gillingham lessons to 10 children. Our goal for next September is to extend our program include Mondays to also Wednesdays, therefore establishing more programming to help more children with dyslexia.

Every year has had its challenges but we have consistently found ways to keep providing programming. This fall's challenge has been getting everyone into the building. Sickness (colds, flu, COVID) has interfered with consistent programming and we see this may continue to be an issue throughout the winter. We have continued with requiring double

vaccinations and masking for the safety of all in the Learning Centre. We do not see this practice changing.

Even though lessons are irregular, growth is being seen in all children thanks to dedicated tutors. Children and families are very happy for the services provided through our Learning Centre.

The creation and completion of new marketing materials and social media platforms has been beneficial for awareness, support, and soliciting new children and tutors.

To all who make the Learning Centre for Hamilton such a special and growing place, have a safe holiday and enjoy this time with your loved ones.



An Honour for a Co-director

Barbara Baxter, co-director of and tutor at the Learning Centre for Hamilton was recently nominated for the 2022 Woman of Spirit Award, presented by the Women's Canadian Club of Hamilton.

In his letter of nomination Learning Centre Board President Mike Kirk explained that Barb and Mike Baxter first came to the Centre looking for a volunteer activity that allowed them to use their skills to give back to their community. He outlined how Barb became a tutor, detailing the training and commitment it took to become a certified OG tutor. He went on to explain how she became a co-director of the Centre and all that the position entailed. He wrote 'all this she undertook with grace and enthusiasm, determined to make things work for this new Learning Centre and the children it services.' The nomination spoke of Barb's generous nature, not only with her time and skills, but with acts and deeds such as ensuring there are peanut-free snacks for the children, special treats for special days, thank



Her nomination package also included information about Barb's involvement with the House of Hope, the first shelter for victims of domestic abuse in north-east Saskatchewan. Her efforts towards having the House of Hope funded and built (twice – in November 2014 as it neared completing the structure burned down) meant that victims of domestic violence in that part of the province didn't need to travel long distances to find safety.

The nomination letter ended by saying 'We are left to wonder what state the Learning Centre would be in today had Barbara and Michael Baxter not appeared on the scene, ready to do whatever needed to be done. We, their students and their families are forever grateful and deeply indebted to them'.

The Woman of Spirit Award was initiated to honour a famous Hamilton woman from our past and one from our present. The award is presented at a luncheon in October, which
