MacGregor is entered in the Provincial Communities in Bloom competition. The project recognizes the efforts and involvement of all. Judging takes place on July 31st and focuses on general appearance and improved visual impact of the village in terms of landscaping, tidiness, floral arrangement and turf areas. Participation and environmental awareness are other important factors.

Your challenge is to adopt a pot or plot which you will look after. Let's make MacGregor the best bloomin' village in Manitoba. It's full steam ahead for Austin's greening program. May 18th was the first "round" of tree planting, with completion the following week. When all are planted there will be approximately 300 new green additions to Austin and surrounding area. About half of these are potted spruce trees from Whitemud Watershed Millennium tree project, ordered by local residents and the elementary school.



Grant Approved!

A fifty percent funding Manitoba Heritage Grant was approved for the Austin Millennium Committee application for their mural. Some other funding has been received from the North Norfolk - MacGregor Foundation. The 15' x 5' canvas mural will be hung in the Austin Community Hall for unveiling July 1st.

Local resident and artist Cathy Painter designed and painted this huge undertaking. With the help from husband Murray, two 7 1/2' x 5' frames were made into canvases. The mural depicts Austin and area from the beginnings in the 1880's to its future.

Two months of creating will finally be revealed to the public at a special ceremony July 1st at at 2:00 p.m. at the Community Hall. Refreshments will follow. Please plan to attend.

The Little Train That Could

The following piece was written as an application for a grant from the Alastair Gamble Memorial Award. The competition was open in two categories of foundation - those with assets over 3 million and those with assets under 3 million. We knew that we were a long, long way under but we applied anyway!

To borrow a line from the Vinyl Cafe "We may not be big, but we are small", do we qualify to fit the category - assets under \$3 million? Does \$2,917,367.00 under \$3 million count?

Assuming it does, and knowing that we are one of many fledgling foun-

dations, we are anxious to tell our story. It is the story of The Little Engine That Could. We are a small engine. Try as we might we couldn't grow big enough to qualify for any of the matching grants that we watched the big engines around us gather. Changing our identity from little village foundation to rural municipality plus little village foundation didn't help. We were to small. How disappointed we felt! How empty our talk.

Without that extra power that told people that their \$1,000 would be transformed magically into \$1,500, we came close to giving up. Recognizing our plight, TAP moved in to the rescue. "Don't give up," they said. "We'll help you make a plan." With their encouragement we made a plan. We'd invite our passengers to become members of a club - The Millennium Club. \$1,000 and more made you a founder, \$100 to \$999 - friend. Destination - \$100,000 by 2000. Now that's a long haul for a little engine on a three year journey, especially with what seemed like a big obstacle on the track - getting the story out to potential passengers.

Public meetings and annual celebrations brought out the passengers who'd already purchased their tickets. We were still a small engine. Coincidentally, our Millennium initiative was born. It was like a pusher engine! With Millennium funding support we could go further. We had published one foundation newsletter - "To Us - Community Counts" - filled with stories and pictures. New we could publish a second filled with millennium happenings and pictures. People started to notice our little engine.

Having a tough time getting coverage of our trip in the local newspaper (published outside the community), we resorted to purchasing space for updates of events. Christmas cards signed by all our directors were sent to all of our passengers. A Christmas greeting in the newspaper reminded people that the trip was going well.

Our newest initiative is picking up youth. They got interested in us through a tree planting millennium project where they climbed aboard. They continued their journey in the development of an International Year of Older Persons park. We're starting a Youth Millennium Club - \$2,000 by 2000. Think of the potential! When we're dropping grants, youth initiative projects are looked on with favor. Think of the directions they'll take us.

Our journey is just beginning. With endowment assets of \$82,633 we have to raise only \$14,000 more by December 31, 2000. Take heart little engines. Don't give up. If you listen in the distance you may hear a little engine saying "I think I can, I think I can, I think I can."

From January 1,1998 (endowment assets \$27,200) to January 1, 2000 (endowment assets \$82,633) we have tripled our endowment assets. The foundation has taken a leadership role gathering the steam (money) from generous donors along the trip. The directors have done this publicity and example. The foundation has assumed a strong leadership role in the directing of millennium projects throughout the district. Projects under the leadership of the foundation include: a greening of the village through a supportive grant, development of a park to honor seniors and pioneers, establishment of a permanent Christmas tree in the centre of town, assisting in grant writing and application for washrooms for the trailer park and campgrounds and visitors to Centennial Park, help with the construction and enhancement of the park, rock gardens, a Millennium reunion (several in fact), etc., etc. The foundation has enjoyed working with the Austin Millennium Committee in applying for grants, in town beautification in the mural and Canada Day celebrations. The foundation is becoming known as station to purchase a ticket on the Millennium Run. Donors have been generous to the point where we now have a new category of donor - a Builders' Club for donations in excess of \$4,000. The grants of the foundation have been used to assist all age categories in providing the means to make the community a better place in which to live.

So our little engine continues to move along the track to what is now perceived as a temporary location - \$100,000 by 2000. Once that goal is realized, a new destination will be determined.

Our mission - "to preserve and advance the quality of life in the community."

North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation didn't get the grant, but we did get a honorable mention. Once more, on our own, we'll charge forward to our destination - first stop. If you would like to come aboard we have space for another builder or two, a few more founders and many more friends and supporters. That's it for this trip - the one that ends December 31, 2000.

Can we count on you?

Just for clarification, in response to the question, "Can I change my ticket?"

Yes! Founders, friends and supporters can move from supporter to friend, from friend to founder, from founder to builder. The money you have contributed already is the down payment on the next category. Some of you have begun the trade in. Thanks for that!

Heritage Park A Bloom

What began as the I.Y.O.P. Park has been renamed as Heritage Park. Since the park has been created in honor of seniors and pioneers, Heritage Park seems to be a fitting name (and easier to remember than I.Y.O.P.!).

A plaque will acknowledge the International Year of Older Persons grants from the Senior Directorate which provided the seed money for the park and the MCC store for its co-operation in providing access to water for the park.

A brilliant array of tulips in the park heralded the coming of spring. Fall planted shrubs are leafing out and showing promise of what's to come. Some perennials have been planted and annuals were planted on June 1st. Donations of plants and shrubs are welcome.

Beautiful cedar benches have been installed. MacGregor Metals completed the metal work and Bill Wiebe provided the carpentry skills.

The benches will have engraved brass plates to recognize the generosity of community groups and individuals who made their purchases possible. To date, funds have been promised for six benches - two of them in memory.

The addition of lamps and waste containers will enhance the park area. By homecoming time, all should be in place and, in the meantime, many of us will have enjoyed the benches and the scenery. Ice-cream anyone?





"Reflections" - the Creation of a Mural



In January of this year, the Senior 4 Art class researched the art form of murals. They viewed the works of famous muralist like Pablo Picasso, Diego Rivera and Canada's own Alex Janvier. They discovered that there are several possible motives for choosing this art form. One such motive is to make a social comment, another may be to beautify a particular location. These two reasons are reflected in the mural the Senior 4 students and teacher created. Technical assistance for the mural was given by Manitoba artist Stephen Jackson and teacher Heather Martin-Rempel.

The mural is entitled Reflections, it consists of four rectangular panels. A senior couple dominate the scene as they survey the past. The seasons of nature are also used as a metaphor for the seasons

Centennial Park Bridge




