MacGregor Collegiate YIP group, Stephanie Tomchuk and Jamie Watson, as well as the two staff advisors, Heather Martens-Rempel and Elspeth Finch-Chambers, attended information sessions on the program in Winnipeg on October 11, 2007.

The next step in the process will be to determine the particular values of the YIP group in the high school and to do some research into the variety of charitable endeavors we could support in our community and outlying areas. Grants will be given to projects which fit the nature of the values outlined by the group and which correspond to the stipulations of the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation. Monies for these projects will initially be supplied by the Thomas Sill Foundation. Students will first conduct research to ascertain the number and the nature of charitable organizations in the North Norfolk-MacGregor area, and then invite applications for grants for specific projects. Interviews will be conducted with representatives of the groups in order to determine how the funds would be used and to decide whether the projects in question correspond to the values of the MCI YIP group. Finally, decisions will be made as to which groups will ultimately receive grants from YIP. YIP will meet with NNMF to present their recommendations for approval. These grants will be presented at a celebration event to be held in late spring of 2008.

Our thanks to the Thomas Sill Foundation, the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation and especially to Vivian MacGregor and Antoinette Blankvoort, who have been instrumental in the promotion of this joint project. Thanks also to Ruth Mulligan of the Portage Collegiate YIP program for all of her help and advice in the setting up of our own program here at MCI. We look forward to working together to encourage philanthropy in our students and to help to advance worthy causes in our area.





Mrs. Miriam Nichol, former Health Centre matron and Sharon Stewart, Community Integrated Health Services Leader, cut the ribbon as part of the Health Centres 25th year Anniversary Celebrations. A large crowd was in attendance to mark the event, including members of the C.W. Lye family who donated their home and grounds in 1951 for the provision of Health Services in the area. Many long time community members, former matrons, physicians, hospital board members, former and present staff, and ladies auxiliary members were acknowledged for their contributions to health care over the last 25 years.

The staff and residents of the MacGregor Health Centre appreciate the support of the community in making projects such as the quiet room a reality. "Buddies" for Life!

Once again, worthwhile projects are completed with community partnerships from our area. The MacGregor Community is pleased to have received a generous donation from the North Norfolk Community Foundation, MacGregor HealthCare Foundation, The MacGregor Healthcare Centre Auxiliary, MacGregor Lions and the MacGregor Kinettes towards First Aid equipment upgrades which meet the new First Aid standards. This equipment, being readily available, allows for more First Aid/CPR training within our community.

Purchases included ten Lifeform Basic Buddy Adults, ten Lifeform Basic Buddy babies, three AED Trainers with remotes, Epi-pen trainers, bag-valve mask, lungs, inhaler spacer trainer, carry bags and storage suitcase. The Lifeform Mannequins are equipped with their own lungs so that there is less chance of infection transfer; as it allows for one student per mannequin during practice sessions. The AED trainers are replicas of public use AED machines so they

imitate the simplicity of AED machines allowing for hands on practice. These items are utilized by our healthcare centre for staff training, available for training of our Volunteer Fire/Ambulance Service and community trainings. The MacGregor Healthcare Centre is storing the items to ensure their security and maintenance.

Recently, MacGregor Collegiate grade 10 physical education students participated in a CPR demonstration and practice session. We look forward to more opportunities of this kind to prepare youth and community members on what to do in case of an emergency.

Without NNMF's generous donation, it becomes very challenging to complete worthwhile community projects, such as this one, that can benefit everyone in the area. The North Norfolk Community Foundation willingly partnered with other groups to make this project successful. Thanks to all partners for their commitment to creating a healthy community for all of us!



It's Multi-Plex Time!

This is an exciting time for our community! The clubhouse project has grown into a multi-plex project! This multi-plex will include the clubhouse, meeting room and hall, with many options to open up or section off each area depending on the event.

The layout is being finalized, the land is being negotiated and a new push on fundraising is occurring. We are relatively close considering how far we have come, but we still need community support to reach our final

goal.

To date our committee has raised over \$180,000 in cash donations, letters of intent and through fundraising projects (including \$16,000 from the Foundation!!) The Village of MacGregor has committed over \$200,000 and the RM of North Norfolk has committed \$50,000. We also had success in planting a crop with the help of Lincoln Wolfe, Jason McKelvy and numerous other people who helped seed, fertilize, spray and take the crop off. This fundraising event is expected to net our committee over \$30,000!!

We do need an additional \$150,000 to complete the fundraising of this project. We are going to continue pursuing individuals and businesses for donations. If you are interested in hearing about the project and are interested in giving a donation, please talk to anyone on the committee... we are all ready to talk about it.

We also had several events. On November 15th, we had a wine and cheese at the MacGregor Memorial Hall, where people looked at the plans and asked questions. On December 8th, we had the MacGregor Christmas Party once again. This event was very successful. Many businesses and people used it as their Christmas party.

A \$1,000,000 Dream

Report of the Chair, North Norfolk-MacGregor Community Foundation Inc., Presented June 13, 2007

In 1996 the NN-MCF came into being. The remainder of the legacy from MacGregor's Centennial celebrations provided the seed money. That \$15,200 was turned over by the MacGregor and District Centennial Foundation in the hope that a larger area would attract more funds. And it has done just that!

It took until 2002 before assets reached slightly more than \$200,000. Fast forward to 2007 and NN-MCF's assets are \$40,000 away from \$1,000,000! Residents and former residents have added their contributions to the pot,

creating their own legacies.

People are including the Foundation in their estate planning and what a difference that has made. It's wonderful. Mr. Carl McGregor and Mr. Jim Price taught us about leaving a legacy that will last beyond a lifetime. That's what philantrophy is all about and we thank them and all of you who have given so generously.

Donors contribute to the Foundation because of their commitment to our community's future. The Board, comprised of volunteers, is motivated by the impact that the Foundation has today and will have in the future. Community organizations access grants from the Foundation to make the community served by the Foundation a better place to live. The partnership of donors, board, and community is what makes the Foundation such a vital part of the community.

In 2006, our tenth anniversary year, the NN-MCF made grants totaling more than \$25,000 - grants that impacted the work of several different charitable groups. That is powerful in our community. The pot remains intact and its earnings work for the changing needs of the community.

What can we do to reach the 1 million (\$1,000,000)? That "Each one, teach one" philosophy needs to come into play. We have to help others to understand the power of foundations. We have to let people know how important it is to be a part of a foundation by making a contribution, big or small, so that they, too, are leaving a legacy in a

community where they lived and made a living and a life. We have to encourage people to talk to their financail advisor regarding the advantages to them and to the future by remembering the foundation in their estate planning. Let's go for that million!

Manitoba has more community foundations than any other province. Giving is rooted in our prairie tradition. Giving to the foundation is a demonstration of hope for the future. Ours is just one of 39 community foundations in Manitoba that strengthens our province. The Winnipeg Foundation, Manitoba's first and largest foundation, helps rural foundations in so many ways. It partners with Manitoba Hydro to offer grants to support administration and reporting, The Scholarship and Bursary Builder Incentive Program launched by the province in 2005 is administered by the Winnipeg Foundation. NN-MCF is one of 14 community foundations thaking part in the five year program. The program's intent is to build new and existing scholarship and bursary funds at community foundations. Up to \$100,000 annually is available from the province for matching. In 2005, our funds were matched by \$18,681.11 and by more than \$10,000 in 2006. In 2005 our program was the most successful in the province in matching grants. Familes have seen their memorial scholarships grown under this program. It's a good one and it's still available.

Another exciting initiative in its beginning stages is the Youth in Philanthropy Program at MacGregor Collegiate. The students will learn about foundation philanthropy with a \$3500 grant provided by the Thomas Sill Foundation. The Board applauds the staff of the high school for its commitment to the program. We look forward to seeing the youth in action as they prepare to be responsible for the foundations of the future.

Foundations are an important part of community. Their job - to ensure that communities will always continue to grow and to flourish. Thank you for sharing the dream.

Nursery School Relocation

We have moved! After 31 years at the MacGregor Memorial Hall, the MacGregor Day Nursery School has relocated to MacGregor Collegiate Institute.

Founded by Marg Jonasson and Margaret Smith in 1976, the MacGregor Nursery School, offered a program of two mornings a week to three and four year old children. With the support of the community, board members and




director, Edith Chant, the nursery school later offered three mornings a week for up to 20 children.

The nursery school still offers three mornings a week with enrollment for the 2007/08 school year being at 14 children for the Wednesday three year old class and the four year old classes being full at 20 children, both Tuesday and Thursday mornings. The program is run by director Melodie Wieler and assistant, Jennifer Giesbrecht. The program relies on help from many parent volunteers and a board of directors. It's with that support that the program has succeeded in the past and continues to do so.

With the vision of serving our community for years to come, an opportunity to move into the Collegiate setting arose. With time and effort, the new location has been achieved. The program has been running at its new home since September without many obstacles. The Collegiate has been very obliging and welcoming during this transition. By working in conjunction with MCI, the nursery school is optimistic that there will be a program offered for many generations.

Sidney Welcome

Last year, Sidney residents erected "Welcome to Sidney" signs on each side of the village. The North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation was able to help with a \$500 grant towards the cost. Phase two is to add shrubs for colour and interest in a reasonably maintenance-free design. Highway signage is important to mark our place in the province.

Austin Rink Canteen Gets New Tables

Earlier this year the Austin Skating rink was in need of some interior improvements. New seating in the canteen area was a priority. Two sets of round tables, each with eight chairs, were purchased by the Rink committee, with most of the cost covered by the \$1000 grant from the North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation.

Austin Hall Nearer Reality

On September 25, over 100 people attended a public meeting regarding the status of the new Austin Hall. The committee called the meeting to explain to the community, even though the dollar mandate had been reached why construction had not started. The initial estimate in early 2005 has increased due to material and labour cost increases. The committee asked the community to give them to the spring of 2008 to secure some grant money.

Focus over the next few months is on securing government infrastructure money, providing sustainability after the structure is built, and completing the fine-tuning of features to be included.

Lobbying of provincial and federal politicians is being done with some positive responses being received already. Grant applications are being made with revised objectives.

Over the past year a sub-committee has visited a few other halls to look at ideas - what has worked, what hasn't

and little inexpensive details that could be added. Ideas brought back have been compiled and prioritized.

Sustainability ideas include a long-term core tenant, a hall manager and a wellness/fitness component. A hall manager would not only look after bookings but also secure meetings and do fundraising events with the intent of covering that person's salary and making extra money. Another idea being looked into is the interest in and feasibility of a wellness/fitness component.

As \$472,000 has been raised or pledged, the local fundraising now is the Cash Calendar and a Fish Fry in the spring with the possibility of a Quiz Night as well. The Ag Project was deemed another success this fall with dollars from 235 acres going into the Hall Building Fund.

The North Norfolk-MacGregor Foundation has contributed \$15,000 to the building of this facility and will consider helping again, if needed.

Remembering when... Glen Sawatzky and the late Doug Lamb recognized the potential of a community foundation. They approached the Village of MacGregor Council about the possibility of establishing a foundation using the left-over money from MacGregor's 75th. MacGregor Foundation was born but matching donations dollars for new unavailable from the Thomas Sill Foundation due to our size. Darwin Crabbe and Vivian McGregor joined the team and the decision to go bigger was The NNMF was established. The organization's mandate - the promotion of philanthropic activity in the area.

The NNMF added the late Bob McKelvy, Arlene Jarema, Danny Rintoul and Ed Penner to its board and made its first grants in 1997.

O \$200 Kidsport for local youngsters For a total of \$500.

Granting ability in 2008 is estimated at \$34,000 with our endowment undesignated fund sitting at \$753,395! How did that happen? By January 2, 1998, our endowments had grown to \$27,200 as Founders and Friends came on board. The endowment continued to grow as more people understood the concept and wanted to be a part of it. Memorial gifts began to happen and people remembered the foundation in their estate planning. In the last two years, grants in excess of \$30,000 have been given to worthy charitable community projects. Quite a jump!

From December 1997 to October 2007, \$129,455 has been given back to the community and the pot stays intact!

Giving back to a community, which provided us and our families with so much, feels right and that's how our endowment grows. There is a hope and an expectation that our endowment fund will see significant growth as baby boomers retire. The potential of a community foundation is unlimited. Your help is appreciated.
